Nuclear Tanker Reactors Studied

Washington (Science Service)-Nuclear power is approaching the cost of conventional power for large fast ships operating on long trade routes. Capital costs for three different types of nuclear-powered ships range from 29 per cent to 70 per cent more than the cost of conventional powered ships, an Atomic Energy Commission study has shown. The study covered systems using a pressurized-water reactor, a boiling-water reactor with an indirect-cycle non-radioactive secondary steam characteristic, and a boiling-water reactor with a direct-cycle steam characteristic.

Woman Arrested For Shoplifting

Medford police took Roma Geraldene Clark, 38, of 375 South Central ave., into custody Wednesday on a charge of petty larceny after the woman was allegedly seen shoplifting several items from a local super market. A citizen's complaint charging Mrs. Clark with petty larceny was signed by the store manager who said he apprehended the woman outside of the store with the stolen goods. Mrs. Clark entered a plea of guilty to the charge in district court this morning and was given a six month suspended jail sentence and placed on informal court probation.

New Drugs Treat Blood Pressure

Washington (Science Service)-The first large-scale controlled test of newer antihypertensive drugs in general use has been announced by the Veterans Administration after nearly two years of research in eight VA hospitals. Dr. Edward D. Freis of the Washington, D.C. VA hospital, was chairman of the study which involved some 320 patients with high blood pressure. Patients with severe and moderately severe cases were given combinations of the tranquilizer reserpine with each of three nerve-blocking drugs-mecamylamine, chlorisondamine and pentolinium tartrate. All three were about equally effective in producing significant reductions in blood pressure. But undesirable reactions varied slightly, producing slightly more dryness of mouth and bladder difficulty with mecamylamine than the other two drugs. Chlorisondamine treatment caused some visual disturbance.

Two Burglaries Reported in City

Burglars broke into the Medford Gospel Mission and a hamburger restaurant early this morning but the loss in both burglaries, according to Medford police, was small.

Entry to the mission, located at 33 South Front st., was gained by breaking a window, police said. The burglar reportedly took a wallet containing about \$1 from a man who was sleeping at the mission.

The other burglary was at Dell's Hamburgers, 323 East Sixth st., where entry also was gained by breaking a window. Missing are about a half-dozen hamburgers and an undetermined number of cigarettes, police said.

Live Parasite Is Used in Cattle Disease Vaccine

Washington-(Science Service)-A vaccine made of weakened live parasites is being used in Great Britain to combat increasing parasitic infections in cattle. Irradiation of larvae by X-rays during the molting period weakens but does not kill the parasites.

Dr. Ernest J. L. Soulsby, University of Cambridge, England, said that a heavy dose of 90,000 roentgen units was used to weaken the larvae so that a live parasite vaccine could be made.

The tiny larvae are like minute worms, a third of a millimeter in length and one-fiftieth of a millimeter across. They are collected from the excreta of infected cattle, then irradiated before being put into vaccine that is injected into healthy cattle to prevent infestation.

Vaccine Expensive
 The vaccine is expensive, Soulsby said, but a single shot, double strength, is effective, and costs the equivalent of about \$3.50 in U.S. money.

Parasitic bronchitis is especially prevalent among English cattle. This sets up an irritation leading to pneumonia and secondary infections that may be fatal.

Although it is possible to work only with animals at present on parasitic immunology, Soulsby said that not too far in the future it would have application for human beings.

In an interview preceding his lecture, which was under the auspices of American Institute of Biological Sciences, Soulsby said there are common parasitic cross-overs between cats, dogs and humans. Soulsby has just completed a lecture series at universities throughout the U.S., arranged and administered by a National Science foundation grant.
