Quesada's Group Gains Franchise

New York (UPI)—It was two down and two to go today for the American league which went into session for a second straight day in an effort to complete its plans for expansion into a 10-team circuit by 1961.

Already cleared after a hectic session which started at 10 a.m. (EST) Thursday and ended well past the dinner hour, were the awarding of the new Washington franchise to a syndicate headed by Gen. Elwood R. (Pete) Quesada, administrator of the Federal Aviation agency, and an elaborate plan to stock the league's two newest members with players from the existing eight clubs.

Today, the club owners were listening to bids for the new Los Angeles franchise and then attempt to either amend baseball's Rule One-C or agree on a plan for its circumvention which would be acceptable to Baseball Commissioner Ford Frick.

Frick warned both the National and American leagues a couple of days ago that he would not tolerate new franchises in cities where a major league club already is in operation, citing Rule One-C which states that a unanimous vote must be had before a franchise can be awarded to a city where one already exists. The rule thus applies to Los Angeles, where the AL is seeking to place a team, and New York, where the NL hopes to have a team in 1962.

C. Arnhold Smith, wealthy San Diego businessman and an owner of the San Diego Padres of the Pacific Coast league, is believed to be one of the leading figures in the bidding for the Los Angeles franchise. His syndicate includes his brother, J. A. Smith, and according to some reports, Greenberg and Ralph Kiner, general manager of the Padres.

How Plan Works
Here is how the owners voted to stock the two new franchises with players:

—Each team was to present a list of 15 players by noon today from which Washington and Los Angeles can choose. Seven of the players must have been on the active roster as of Aug. 31, 1960, and all must have been on the 40-man roster when they were frozen by Frick on Nov. 7.

—Each club will lose seven players for a total of 56 to be evenly divided between the two new clubs.

—Lots will be drawn by the new clubs to see which will take first pick. One team will take four men and the other three and then they will alternate until they have drawn 28 players each. Ten of the players must be pitchers, two catchers, six infielders, and four outfielders with each one costing \$75,000. The clubs will have until Nov. 20 to select their 28 players for a total investment of \$2,100,000.

—The two new clubs will get two draft selections from the minor leagues after the regular player draft at Louisville, Nov. 28. No first year man can be taken and no more than one from any one club at a cost of \$25,000 per man.

—Each of the new teams will be permitted to pick one more player from each AL club's

State Final Grid Berth At Stake

Oregon Class A-1 high school football spotlight beams tonight on the turf at Medford stadium. For the key game in the big school title playoffs is anticipated.

Powerhouse Medford, a reigning giant with a long colorful history in sports takes on David Douglas, relatively new school rising in athletic prowess. It will be a state semifinal game. Kickoff is at 8 p.m.

This is "the" championship game, some prognosticators say. Yet, either North Salem or Newberg will be around next Friday to dispute those with this contention. The two vie tonight at Salem in the other A-1 semifinal. Tonight's victor here, however, will rule the favorite in the Nov. 25 finale scrap.

Medford's Black Tornado this evening bears the favored role. But, the Hurricane, which has cut a destructive swath against 10 adversaries in as many weeks, encounters no easy task. David Douglas comes with a fine 9-1 record. It was 8-1, with some wins by substantial scores, in highly competitive Metropolitan league. And, those who've seen both the Tornado and Douglas in action feel that the Scots are fully capable of upsetting Medford high.

No Direct Comparison
The Big Wind, which has triumphed so often in a breeze, is figured to have a real battle on its hand.

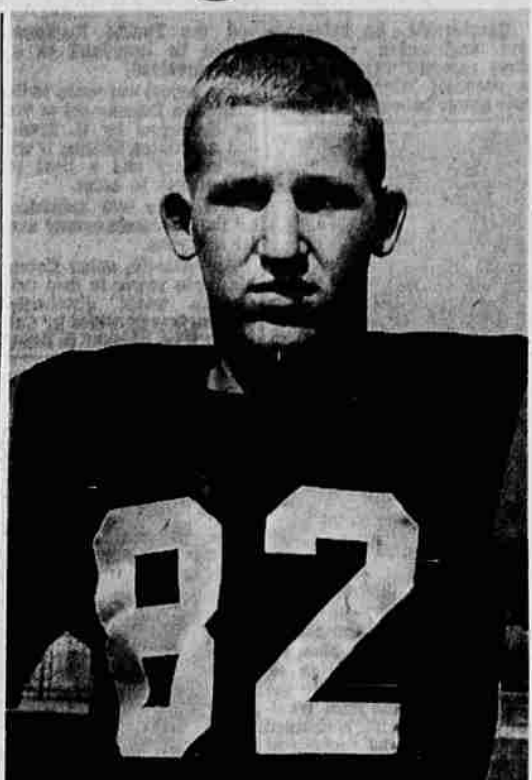
There are no direct comparative scores by which to measure as the teams did not meet a common foe. David Douglas, which play nine league games to Medford's five and then eliminated Jefferson, Portland champ, may claim a more grueling conference schedule. Still, the Black Tornado humbled the top ranked team in northern California and bounced another Cal aggregation by a larger margin than did a pair of clubs that went on to win their conference crowns.

Both clubs have versatile offenses and the outcome tonight could depend on how well rival defenses can hold opposing offense down. A week of on and off rains has soaked the field, hindering top offensive operation.

David Douglas has vanquished its opposition with attacks from T, wing T and double wing. Terry DeSylvia, a sophomore, is second in the nation in total individual offense, and Kasso is one of the best runners of the Pacific Coast.

Oregon has shown more on defense, with a stout line headed by tackles Steve Barnett and guard Dave Urell. The Webfoots have given up but 31 points in their last six games.

The two teams have a habit of upsetting each other. In 1956, when Oregon State went to the Rose Bowl, Ore-

Webfoot-Beaver Clash Rated Even

Corvallis (UPI)—The far west's top two independent football powers, Oregon State and Oregon, collide for the 64th time Saturday in a game rated dead-even and which might see a bowl bid go to the winner.

Coaches Tommy Prothro of Oregon State and Len Casanova of Oregon were hoping that rain which has fallen most of the week would let up. But the forecast called for rain Saturday afternoon.

Both clubs have indicated they would be receptive to a post-season bowl game. Oregon is 7-2 and Oregon State 6-3. Much of the bowl talk has centered around the Liberty, Gotham and Bluebonnet Bowls Dec. 17 and the Gator Bowl Dec. 31.

Gross Key Man
Oregon relies a lot on the speed of halfbacks Dave Grayson and Cleveland Jones and the excellent all-around play of quarterback Dave Grosz. Grosz is just 186 yards short of George Shaw's career Oregon offense mark of 3,106.

Oregon State's offense is headed by tailbacks Terry Baker and Don Kasso. Baker, a sophomore, is second in the nation in total individual offense, and Kasso is one of the best runners of the Pacific Coast.

Traditional Rivalries Highlighted

Missouri can clinch the first perfect season in its history, the Big Eight championship, a trip to the Orange Bowl and probably the national collegiate football title in its game against old rival Kansas on Saturday.

In a week end that highlights the spirited clashes of old rivalries, past performances and current records of ten count for little. Mindful of this, Kansas is keyed to dethrone the team voted No. 1 in the nation by the latest United Press International Board of Coaches ratings.

Although Missouri is a seven-point favorite to win its 10th straight of the season, a Kansas reversal wouldn't come as too great a surprise to these two schools who have met 68 times in the past only to be deadlocked with 30 victories each and eight ties.

The Jayhawkers are 6-2-1 on the campaign and since they are undefeated in Big Eight play they can walk off with the conference title by beating Missouri. However, Kansas is on NCAA probation and therefore ineligible for post-season play.

First In 70 Years
Missouri never has completed a perfect season since it started playing football in 1890, although the Tigers did go undefeated in 1909 with only a tie to Iowa State marking their record.

The "tradition" game of the East this week end matches undefeated and untied Yale against Harvard. The Elis, soaring toward their first perfect season since 1923, are picked by 10 points in the 76th renewal of this bitter rivalry that started in 1875. Yale leads in the series, 43-26, with seven ties. Victory for Yale also will bring the Elis the Ivy league crown.

Moving further inland into the Big Ten country, fourth-ranked Minnesota must beat Wisconsin to tie for the loop's championship and a possible bid to the Rose Bowl. The Gophers are favored by a touchdown to add their 39th victory in the series that dates back to 1890. Wisconsin has won 23 times and there have been eight ties.

Duke Over N.C.
Sixth-ranked Duke is favored by 14 over North Carolina in the 47th game of a series that started in 1888; Pittsburgh and Penn State, who started their rivalry in 1893, are rated even; and ninth-ranked Ohio State is a seven and one-half point pick over Michigan, rivals since 1897.

'Terrible' Clubs Vie Saturday

The "big game" between California and Stanford remains the "big daddy" of West Coast traditionals even if both teams are terrible.

A total of 78,780-a sellout—is scheduled to cram the Memorial Stadium at Berkeley on Saturday to watch the oft-buffed eleven fight it out for nothing except the ax trophy. The latter disappeared Thursday in a typical pre-big game mystery.

Washington, the power of the Coast and its representative for the second straight year in the Rose Bowl, will meet Washington State at Spokane before around 30,000 while UCLA and Southern California tangle at mammoth Memorial Coliseum before an expected 60,000.

California (1-7-1) is rated a four point choice over Stanford which is expected to close out the season with 10 losses in as many games.

Washington is a 12-point pick over Washington State. The Cougars don't have the Huskies' power but could be troublesome with quarterback Mel Melin and end Hugh Campbell, the best passing combination in the nation.

UCLA, a 12-point favorite, is expected to knock off Southern California which now has lost two key men at the guard posts in Mike McKeever and Britt Williams. The Trojans have dropped five out of eight while the Bruins, led by tailback Bill Kilmer, are 5-1-1.

Oregon and Oregon State, who are expecting a crowd of 29,000 at Corvallis, both have bowl bids in mind and are rated even. The Ducks have an edge on speed however, and a sharp quarterback in Dave Grosz.

Forty Niners Open Roadtrip

San Francisco (UPI)—The San Francisco Forty Niners hit the trail today on their last big road trip of the campaign.

Sunday, they meet win-hungry Dallas at the latter's lair. Then it's on to Baltimore for a meeting with the high-flying Baltimore Colts.

The Forty Niners are 14½ point favorites to upend winless Dallas. Coach Red Hickey has announced a startling backfield that sounds more like the speaker's rostrum at a banker's convention.

The starters all eschew use of normal first names what with Y. A. Tittle starting at quarterback, C. R. Roberts and J. D. Smith at tight backs and R. C. Owens on the flank.

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Crusaders Take On Umatilla In Oregon Prep Semi Tangle

A week end of contests which have focused prep football attention on Jackson county, concludes Saturday night when the third of three state semifinal conflicts in this area will be played.

St. Mary's, defending its state B grid co-champion in 1959, will entertain strong Umatilla which has rolled over opposition in north central and northeastern Oregon. The game is set for 8 p.m. at the Medford stadium.

Saturday's triumphant team will roll on into state B finals on Nov. 25 or 26 and hinging largely on outcomes of this week end's playoff tiffs, Siletz and Harrisburg are the other B semifinalists and scrap at Newport also Saturday.

Multiple offenses will be matched when the Crusaders of SM go out against the Vikings of Umatilla. It will be St. Mary's speed against heavier Umatilla weight. The teams will come together on a chopped turf since Medford and David Douglas, in their A-1 game, use the field tonight. Soggy, muddy playing area may be advantageous to the Vikings since it could slow the SM speed.

Hold Down Touchdowns
Coach Milt Durand's Umatillas should show a strong

defense. They've done extremely well in holding rival scoring down. But, St. Mary's has been stingy also in allowing touchdowns. And, Coach Bill McKibbin, who has done some platooning, said that the Crusaders tomorrow will go with their strength. This means a number of the parochial school gridders will be in action on both offense and defense.

Running of Vane Ostrom and Terry Vaughn has sparked the Vikings on attack. St. Mary's has the backfield efforts of Jim Calhoun, Fred Lucas, Alex Mete, Dick Evans

and Andre Knutson. Lucas has been pestered by a hip pointer this week and Knutson may receive the fullback call.

St. Mary's and Umatilla carry undefeated records. Each has beaten A-2 opposition.

The schools have encountered only one common rival. The Crusaders won from Wasco County high of Maupin 20 to 0 last week. Umatilla beat that same team earlier 31 to 7.

All seats are general admission for the Saturday game here.
