Five Recovering From Bus Plunge

Coos Bay—Four loggers and a bus driver were recovering today from injuries suffered when a bus with 25 woods workers aboard plunged into a stream east of here. All aboard escaped.

The accident happened while the bus was carrying the men to work in the woods near Allegany. A rock slide struck a milk tank truck which veered into the bus.

The loggers broke windows and were helped by others following in other buses to escape.

Most seriously hurt was Gerald Baker, 39, Coos Bay, the bus driver. Others hospitalized included Sidney Silton, George Walter Reid, Richard Earl Mitts and J. C. Grizzle.

One of the loggers, Henry Ellsworth, said the men were calm and did not panic.

Socialized Medicine in England Is Not Perfect

Sir Arthur Porritt, the President of the British Medical association, recently made a number of suggestions in regard to improving the British form of socialized medicine. He says that from the start, the medical plan has been be-

lieved by party politics, and so he thinks it ought to be turned over to a bi-partisan commission which would not play politics. He went on to say that there probably are very few people in England who would want ever to see the Health Service abolished, but they would be very happy to see a lot of the red tape and regulation taken out of it. As he says, the system just hasn't worked out the way it was planned. When it was set up, around 1950, a year's cost was \$1,200,000,000. In 1959, the cost was \$1,878,000,000. Only 20 per cent of this cost is supplied through weekly payments by the public. The expense will now go up decided-

ly because patients with mental ailments are going to be cared for. Mental disease, of course, is the commonest disease of all.

One difficulty with the Medical Act is that a young woman in an office in London can tell all the physicians of England that they must not

use a certain drug because it is expensive. She also can decide whether or not an ambitious and hard-working doctor can have a chance to become a specialist. Both the doctors and the patients are unhappy because the workload on each doctor is too great. It is so great that the doctor just cannot spend any time with a patient. Because he gets only \$2.52 a year per patient, in order to make a living, he must take charge of at least 2,000 people a year. The average general practitioner now makes \$8,221 a year. Naturally, out of this moderate income he cannot afford to buy an x-ray machine or much equipment for his office. As a result, a patient who needs a careful examination has to wait perhaps months until he can be admitted to a hospital.

The doctors have been losing the respect of the public because they are no longer free agents; they are just employees of the government. The most frequent complaint of the British people is that they have to wait so long to get in to see a doctor, and then he hasn't time to give them much attention. Worse yet, if a man needs an operation which can be put off for a while, he may have to wait for as long as three years before he can get into a hospital! The hospitals are nearly all ancient and terribly overcrowded. Only lately has an effort been made to build some new ones.

Animals Said To Be Expecting Mild Winter

Madison, Wis.—A wild game expert says animals are expecting a mild winter.

Dr. N. O. Calloway of the Grand Marsh (Wis.) Wildlife Ranch predicted a mild winter because "all the North American animals—the buffalo, long horn cattle, elk and deer—have exceptionally short hair this year. Their hides are barely covered."

Calloway said the animals would have thick coverings of fur if the winter were going to be severe.
