Local Option DST Bill To Be Offered

Portland—(UPI)—Rep. Edwin E. Benedict announced Thursday he will introduce a bill in the 1961 legislature permitting daylight time in Oregon by local option.

The state currently has standard time through law and no governmental group in the state may advance the clock under current statutes. Daylight saving time was turned down by Oregon voters in the Nov. 8 general election.

Benedict, from Multnomah county, was chairman of the planning and development committee in the 1959 legislature handling daylight time, which resulted in the measure being placed on this year's ballot.
