Russia Says U.S. Is Choking Off Congo Freedom

United Nations, N. Y.—(UPI)—The Soviet Union Saturday accused the United States of attempting to choke off the Nationalist movement in the Congo, called Belgium "impudent" for threatening to quit the United Nations and said the NATO allies sought to impose an anti-democratic regime in the African country. General Assembly President Frederick H. Boland called a Saturday session to speed the work of the World Parliament, which now has virtually no hope of meeting its Dec. 17 adjournment deadline. He achieved the hearing of speeches only from the Philippines, Russia and Romania before delegate pressure for a week end off forced him to adjourn until Monday morning debate to give the Congo's assembly seat to a delegation appointed by pro-western President Joseph Kasavubu. Soviet Ambassador Valerian A. Zorin used the short session to unload a new cargo of propaganda charges against the United States and its western allies. Question of Substance He declared that the seating of a Congolese delegation was a question of substance, rather than procedure. This was an apparent attempt to force a two-thirds vote of the assembly to seat the Kasavubu delegation. "The United States has revealed its hand for good," Zorin said. "The whole world sees now what kind of a game the United States and the other NATO countries are playing in the Congo. The sense and purpose of that game have been revealed for quite a while by the press and radio of the western countries, especially in the United States. . . . "The whole history of the international crisis relating to the Congo is a history of direct U.S. and NATO interference in the affairs of the country. . . ."

Crazed Negro Youth Shot in New Orleans After Stabbing Child

New Orleans—(UPI)—A teenage Negro boy, shouting obscenities about the courts and the white people, ran amuck with a knife in the famed French quarter Saturday and severely wounded a small white boy before he was shot down by police. The Negro, who appeared crazed by dope, slashed away at whites along Dauphine street—just a block away from famed Bourbon street—in the latest outbreak of racial violence brought on by tensions over integration of New Orleans schools. The Negro, identified as Donald Erion, 17, was taken to a hospital in critical condition with a severe head wound. His victim, Byron Walter Goss, 7, was severely cut under the left arm after the Negro attacked the boy as he stood on his front steps playing a ukelele. The rampage and shooting drew a big crowd in the streets of the quarter. It was an ominous start for a period which the city had hoped would be peaceful with the schools closed until Nov. 28. The city had been relatively quiet since mob scenes and violence of Wednesday. It was awaiting the ruling of a federal court on state and school board attempts to reverse integration and get four first grade Negro girls out of the schools. It was about noon when the morning-after quiet of the quarter was shattered by the Negro boy suddenly running into white bars and shops and cursing the proprietors. Started Slashing Then he drew a four-inch knife and began slashing away at whites, screaming he didn't "give a—about the federal government, the courts, the white people." Then Erion came upon the Goss boy. He broke the ukelele, kicked and stomped the boy and cut him. It was feared the boy had a skull fracture, too. Women began screaming "get him, get him." A police officer in a three-wheel traffic cycle took his pistol and shot from about 20 feet as Erion ducked between a small sports car and the wall. One bullet hit him in the hand and the other in the head.

Littrell, Eve Nye Say They Would Accept Senate Job

Two more persons Saturday said publicly they would accept an appointment as state senator from Jackson county if recommended by the Republican Central committee and named by the county court. They are Al Littrell, Medford, former state representative, and Mrs. Evelyn Nye, Medford, who was defeated in her bid for reelection as state representative in the Nov. 8 general election. Littrell was state representative for two terms ending in 1958. The Jackson County Republican Central committee will meet at 7 p.m. Monday in the Medford hotel to consider and make a recommendation for state senator to the county court. Will Replace Durno The county court, which may or may not consider the recommendation of the central committee, makes the appointment to replace Dr. Edwin R. Durno, Medford, who defeated Congressman Charles O. Porter, Eugene, in Porter's bid for reelection as fourth district representative. GOP Central Committee Chairman Joseph Walsh said women will vote on nominations for state senator. Candidates for the recommendation, or their representatives, will be given time to review their qualifications, Walsh said. Mrs. Nye and Littrell are the third and fourth to indicate they would accept the appointment if recommended and named. Others are Don Stathos, Medford, and L. W. (Lynn) Newbury, Ashland. Dr. Durno has not yet resigned his post as state senator.

Japanese Voters At Polls Today

Tokyo—(UPI)—Japanese voters with the memory of the June anti-Eisenhower riot's fresh in mind, voted for a new parliament today in a test of the government's pro-American policies. The race was among 940 candidates for 467 seats in the lower house of parliament and pre-election polls indicated the conservative Liberal-Democrat party of Premier Hayato Ikeda would crush the leftist opposition. Officials reported 56,554,475 persons had registered to vote in this country where turnout of 97 per cent of the eligible electorate are common. Among the candidates are 21 women. Results will be known Monday. Foreign policy was a key issue in the bitter campaign quarrels between the Liberal-Democrats and the Socialists and Communists.

Waves Do Damage On Oregon Coast

By United Press International Waves whipped by heavy winds and rain caused severe damage along the Oregon coast Friday. There was minor flooding in the first heavy rainstorm of the season. Summer homes were struck by waves at Cannon Beach late Friday morning. The ocean swept across the seawall at Tolovana and rocks were hurled against homes and Dave Logan's Greenhouse causing some \$1500 to \$2000 damages, according to Dudley Unser, manager of the Logan property at Tolovana park. Other residents of the area reported damage. An ocean front home belonging to Russell Stevens was damaged by logs swept in on high waves. At Seaside, logs were rolled over Cove road demolishing fences. A log floated through of Medford Reed's home at Seaside. Waves destroyed a fence and sidewalk at the Seaside residences of Bob Seally. The Santiam river rose to flood stage at Jefferson. The Willamette river at Salem rose to 3.5 feet Friday morning. East of Cascades the rain turned to snow. Washington—(UPI)—Edward J. Glendale, Calif.—(UPI)—Hollywood paid final homage to Clark Gable Saturday in a private military funeral which fulfilled the "king" of the movie stars' wish for a quiet, dignified service. Grieving members of the movie colony filled the Church of the Resurrection at Forest Lawn Memorial park as scores of policemen turned away curious crowds at barricades and road blocks throughout the hillside cemetery. The 59-year-old actor's widow, Kay, dressed in black and accompanied by her two children from a previous marriage, tearfully listened to the service, her eyes intent on the closed solid bronze casket. She is expecting his first child in March.

Nye Elected New Head of Oregon Horticulturists

Spatz, Hamilton Named to Board

Stephen G. Nye, partner of Nye and Naumes Packing company, Medford, was elected president of the Oregon State Horticultural society during its meeting in Corvallis Thursday and Friday. Nye was chairman of the apple and pear section during the 75th annual diamond jubilee meeting. He was also first vice president last year. Paul Culbertson, a Medford pear grower, was elected third vice president. Two on Board Other vice presidents named were James Smart, Salem, and William Bollmer, Parkdale. Ward Spatz, Medford, and Orville Hamilton, Central Point, were named to the board of trustees. Both are former society presidents, Spatz in 1951 and Hamilton in 1958. Spatz was the first man to receive the Hartman trophy. Robert Shinn, Salem, manager of the Willamette Cherry Briners, was awarded the Hartman trophy for having made a major contribution to the horticultural industry during the year. Growers Attend Approximately 1,200 growers and industry representatives attended the annual meeting held on the Oregon State college campus. The society passed a resolution that "no persons should be deprived of the right to work because of membership or lack of membership in any organization." The horticultural society members feel that Oregon may be the target next year in an attempt to unionize workers who harvest horticultural products. The society has directed its legislative committee to work on a program to insure their labor practices as applied to use of farm labor, a society spokesman said.

Treasury Agents Arrest 9 Persons in Portland Raid

Portland—(UPI)—Nine persons were arrested here Friday as U.S. Treasury agents staged a nation-wide crackdown on persons accused of willful failure to purchase occupational tax stamps on wagers. The Portland arrests were made simultaneously with raids of 120 gambling places in 54 cities across the nation. A total of 109 arrests were made and \$65,000 in gambling money confiscated. Principal Targets Jack Savage, the chief of the intelligence division of the U.S. Internal Revenue Service in Portland, said the principal targets were locations which are believed to have taken bets on football games. Twelve establishments were raided in Portland. Savage listed those arrested, dek. Edward G. Cooper, Maude Underwood, Clare H. Phelps, Sidney Wegner, Paul C. Jennings and Benjamin A. Brandtner, Portland, and Allen Persinger, Beaverton.

29 of 31 Members Pick Medford Man For Second Term

Party Postpones Senate Caucus

Salem, Ore.—(UPI)—Oregon House Democrats emerged from a 4½-hour caucus here last night all but pledged to back Rep. Robert Duncan of Medford as House speaker of the 1961 Legislature. It would be an unprecedented second term for Duncan, who was speaker last year. Following break up of the caucus, it was announced that Duncan had 29 of the 81 Democratic votes and efforts were being made to get commitments from other representatives. They were George Annala, Hood River, and Juanita Orr, Lake Grove. Both left the caucus before the last vote was taken. Democrats have a 31-29 majority in the House and want to make sure of a united front in selecting the speaker when the Legislature meets Jan. 9. Twenty-Eight Attend Twenty-eight House members attended the caucus but Duncan had proxy votes from the other two missing representatives, Katherine Mussa of The Dalles and Grace Peck of Portland. In earlier balloting, four legislators beside Duncan received votes for speaker. They were Reps. W. H. Holstrom, Gearhart; Annala; Norman Howard, Portland and Clinton Haight Jr., Baker. Oregon Democratic Senators had planned a caucus of their own Saturday but only nine of the 20 turned up and the session was merely an informal discussion period. Caucus Rescheduled Sen. Robert Straub, Eugene, Oregon Democratic chairman, said a caucus of the Democratic Senators would be rescheduled later. Democrats have a 20-10 majority in the Senate but a struggle for Senate president is going on between Sens. Harry Bolvin, Klamath Falls, and Alfred Corbett, Portland. Corbett claims strong Democratic support but Bolvin is said to have a winning number of votes among conservative Democrats and Republicans. It had been rumored that Bolvin's supporters would boycott the meetings of Democratic Senators so they could remain uncommitted and throw their votes toward Bolvin when the chips are down in January. Youth Shot, Killed At Dance in Newport Newport, Ore.—(UPI)—An 18-year-old South Beach, Ore., youth was shot and fatally wounded at a dance hall here Friday night, according to police. A Lebanon man was held on a charge of first degree murder. Killed was Lawrence Ludahl. Police said Jerry Layne Gibson, 21, was charged with first degree murder in connection with the shooting which resulted from a domestic argument. Lincoln County Sheriff Jack Waterman said the shooting occurred about 10 p.m. at the Newport Natorium, a dance hall and recreation center. Oregon Grange Wins Top Service Award Winston-Salem, N.C.—(UPI)—Local Granges in Oregon, Tennessee and Nebraska received the top annual annual Community Service Contest awards Saturday during the National Grange's 1960 convention. First prize of \$10,000 went to the Vale, Ore., Grange and was accepted by Grange Master Blaine Girvin of Vale. The Grange was cited for raising funds and presenting the county with an ambulance, improving a migratory labor camp and putting on an education program for migrant workers. U.S. Official Shot, Wounded in Havana

Havana—(UPI)—Wayne E. Henderson, communications officer for the United States embassy here, was shot in the stomach last night in a brawl which broke out in a Havana nightclub and spilled onto the sidewalk outside. Henderson, of Pasadena, Calif., was rushed to the police hospital where he underwent surgery. His condition was described as serious. George Gray, an official of the embassy, said Henderson was given blood transfusions. Gray said the bullet passed through his body but hit no vital organs. Havana police, in notifying the embassy of the shooting, described it as an "accident." Police said the assailant who wounded Henderson had been identified. It was not learned immediately if he had been arrested. Marine Cpl. William E. Tompkins of Warren, Ohio, who accompanied Henderson to the Club 21, said they ordered drinks and offered the bartender a \$5 bill. Tompkins said the bartender refused to accept it and a fight broke out when someone grabbed for the bill. Casino Officers Involved Tompkins said two men, believed to be officers in Fidel Castro's revolutionary army, dragged him and Henderson outside to the sidewalk where the struggle continued. Henderson said one of the two men pulled a pistol and placed it against Henderson's stomach and fired. Henderson fell to the pavement unconscious. The Marine corporal, a member of the guard at the U.S. embassy, said he thought one of the two men who attacked the Americans outside the club was a Cuban army captain and the other a lieutenant.

16 Rooms Needed By County Schools

Jackson county schools will need 16 additional classrooms by the Fall of 1961, according to a report released recently by Alf B. Mekvold, Jackson county school superintendent. Senior high schools will need nine additional rooms, with elementary schools needing seven, the report indicated. School enrollments in county schools have increased three per cent this year. Eighteen new classrooms are being completed this year to handle the increased enrollments. Junior high schools are receiving nine new rooms, followed with senior highs with six and elementary schools with three. Now Have 715 Rooms Currently, county schools have a total of 715 instructional rooms. Elementary schools lead this list with 423, followed by senior highs with 169 and junior highs with 123. A total of 802 teachers are employed by county schools, the report revealed. Of these, 485 are elementary, 213 secondary and 35 serving both levels. Administrative and supervisory personnel total 69. Two county teachers have doctors degrees, 170 masters, 554 bachelors, and 78 less than bachelors. Enrollments this year total 16,704. Last year's figure was 16,201.

Jail Inmate Claims Rights Denied Here

Salem—(UPI)—Marion County Circuit Judge George Jones has issued a writ of habeas corpus allowing a 19-year-old inmate of the state correctional institution to appear in court here and plead his case for release. The inmate is Roger Bennett, sentenced from Jackson county for alleged parole violation. He was arrested in Medford Sept. 22, 1959, and claims he was denied due process. The hearing was set for next Wednesday. His filing is the first to be made by an inmate of the institution, which opened nearly two years ago.
