### Psychiatrist Admits He Does Not Know All the Answers

Dr. Leo Kanner, Dean of American child psychiatrists, was just given the First Annual Award of the National Association for Mentally Ill Children. For years, his book, "Child Psychology," has been the leading American text on the subject. He is the director of a large clinic to which thousands of mothers keep coming with their sick children.

These mothers are full of questions, fears, hopes and pleas for help. As he said, he has learned "that it is as futile as it is unbecoming to want to play God and remake people." He doesn't feel like some of the psychiatrists do—that he knows it all, and perhaps knows the cause of a child's mental illness without asking the mother anything, or listening to what she has to say. A very wise man, he says, "We still do not know all the answers."

### Blind Children in Family, Community

Marietta B. Spencer has just written a helpful book on "Blind Children in Family and Community" with many photographs (University of Minnesota Press). Many a mother of a blind child would love this book with all its advice as to the guidance and the

helping of a child who cannot see. There is much on the activities in the home and in the neighborhood and in the community. It can be helpful to everyone who has to do with a sightless child.

**What Are Water Blisters?**  
Water blisters—usually on the hands—tend to raise a thin superficial layer of the skin and separate it from the next layer, just below. Later, the little top layer peels off in little round areas. I have had this happen to me hundreds of times—I think usually after I have had a slight cold. Perhaps perspiration formed in the tiny sweat glands so rapidly as to lift the outer layer of skin. Fortunately, this does no harm.

**When Tears Dim Our Sight**  
As I said here a while ago, often when a woman reads into my column some awful thing that wasn't there, I have the impression that she was crying silently as she read, and the tears dimmed her eyesight and interfered with her understanding. Why was she crying? Because I had written a column on epilepsy, or mental retardation, or psychosis, or psychopathic delinquency, and the woman, for years, had gone through hell taking care of a child with one of these diseases.

The bare fact that I had written frankly about her problem had hurt her terribly. I am sorry I hurt her; I didn't want to; but I must keep talking about these painful subjects, because hundreds of mothers write asking for information, and they are so grateful when they get help.
