### Eder Jofre Captures Ring Toga

Los Angeles—UPI—Eder Jofre of Brazil, newly-crowned bantamweight champion of the world after his knockout of Eloy Sanchez of Mexico, today was anxious to meet Europe's title claimant, Alphonse Halimi, for the undisputed crown.

The handsome, 24-year-old 118-pounder who has never been beaten as a professional, won the championship in 1 minute, 30 seconds of the sixth round Friday night over the game Mexican. He dropped Sanchez for the full count with a short, solid right to the jaw.

The end came after Jofre paved the way with a fifth round knockdown, for a count of eight, in a flurry of punches that he thought should have stopped his swarming opponent for keeps.

But Sanchez arose from that knockdown and unleashed a body attack in the final minutes of the fifth and early in the sixth which had Jofre backing away and bleeding from the nose. But the Brazilian never lost his composure as he let his Mexican opponent spend his energy.

The fatal straight right in the sixth traveled little more than a foot. It landed flush on the side of the face.

### Rice Hands Texas Christian Defeat

Houston—UPI—Rice university turned a pair of pass interceptions and a fumble recovery into scoring drives Saturday to defeat Texas Christian 23-0, the worst defeat ever suffered by a TCU team ever.

Quarterbacks Alvin Hartman and Randall Kerbow both scored for Rice following pass interceptions by the Owls, and fullback Max Webb kicked a 48-yard field goal, the longest in the Southwest conference this year, following a fumble recovery in the second period.

The win ran the Owl's conference record to 5-1 and left them the only team in the loop with a chance to share title with Arkansas.

San Francisco—UPI—Horace Stoneham, president of the San Francisco Giants, has reported he would like to bring two Japanese players to spring training next year. He said he could not recall their names. Stoneham, whose Giants just returned from a 18-game trip in Japan, said he was impressed by a right-handed relief pitcher and an infielder who opposed the Giants during their recent jaunts.

### 4 Regulars Return for SOC Quint

Ashland - Four starters are back from last year's Oregon Collegiate conference co-champion basketball team at Southern Oregon college as the Red Raiders prepare for the NAIA tip-off tourney in Portland and Salem on Dec. 1-3.

SOC will meet Linfield Dec. 1 at 7:30 p.m. in the first round of play while Oregon College of Education will take on Willamette university in the second game in the Salem division of the tournament.

District NAIA star Gordy Carrigan heads the list of returnees which includes Brad Flanary, John Payne, Dave Gardner and Don Vannice. All were starters at one time or another last year. All but Vannice closed the season on the first unit.

Raider coach Ted Schopf feels that he has a good nucleus around which to form a new squad but there are many untried ball players who will have to come along speedily to fill the gaps.

**High on Hughes**  
 Dave Graham and Fred Louk are up from the jayvees where their height will be of tremendous help. Graham is 6-5 and Louk is the tallest of the 26 prospects at 6-6. Earl Tichenor at 6-5 is expected to be another factor.

Guard Bob Jensen is up from the junior club along with Dave Hughes who sat out last season. Schopf is particularly high on Hughes because of his jumping ability and work in close although he is only 6-1.

A trio of freshmen have been standing out throughout the first two weeks of practices but Schopf feels that more will become prominent as the newness of college basketball and jitters wear off. Jerry Shults, Lorraine Eickworth and Dave Sharp are all battling for a varsity berth and the trip to the tip-off tourney. Shults is from Medford's state championship squad while Eickworth is from Marshfield and Sharp from Crater high of Central Point.

### Bears Rip Stanford Line To Register 21-10 Win

Berkeley, Calif. —UPI— Fullback George Pierovich and halfback Jerry Scattini slashed through gaping holes in a Stanford line Saturday to carry California to a 21-10 victory over the Indians in the 83rd renewal of the West's "big game."

Playing a ball-control ground game, the Golden Bears romped up and down the field all day, throwing only one pass—a four-yarder in the first quarter by quarterback Randy Gold that was good for a touchdown. After that the Bears found the going so easy that they never went to the air again.

In fact, while rolling to two touchdowns and a 14-0 lead in the first half, Cal had only four third-down plays out of a total of 171 yards traveled.

The Bears, although outplayed in the second half as they played it close to the vest, rolled up 267 yards on the ground, plus the four-yard pass. Trailing 0-14 going into the third quarter, Stanford did make a pair of big drives. They rolled 75 yards in 17 plays—all yardage on the ground—for one score with Skip Face going over from the one.

They went on another long drive in the final stanza, but when Cal held on the 19, Face booted a 29-yard field goal to cut the advantage to 14-10.

Come Back

But the Bears came back after that to score again and salt the game away. This time it was a 61-yard drive. Stanford apparently had the drive stopped on the Cal 29, third down with 10 to go. But Gold faked a pass and ran to the one to set up the score. He then scored on a keeper.

The first Cal-touchdown march went 74 yards on the ground before Gold threw his scoring pass from the four. The next time the Bears got the ball they were rolling again when a fumble stopped the drive on the 50. But in the second quarter a relentless 7-yard march paid off with Scattini slicing off tackle from the one.

During this latter drive, Pierovich carried the ball nine times for 51 yards—never failing to make at least three yards.

The defeat was Stanford's 10th in a row this season—the second time in history the Indians have gone through a campaign without victory.

It was California's 28th win in the traditional series with 76,200 fans watching. Stanford has won 25 and 10 have ended in ties.

It was California's first victory at home since 1938 and gave young coach Marv Levy a record of 2-1 in his first year here.

### Showdown In Eastern Loop Today

 The New York Giants' defense, rated best in the National Football league, will have to be at its peak against Norm Van Brocklin and the Philadelphia Eagles Sunday in a showdown game for the Eastern division lead.

With "old bones" Charlie Conerly once again hobbled by injuries, it will be up to the defense to keep the Giants in the ball game, just as it has in a few earlier games this year and numerous times during the four previous seasons when New York won three division titles.

Despite Conerly's doubtful status, the Giants will be playing in their home park before approximately 65,000 fans and that made them 3½-point favorites over the division-leading Eagles.

In the Western division, the Green Bay Packers were picked by 13 points to beat the Los Angeles Rams at Milwaukee and move into a first place tie with the idle Baltimore Colts (6-2).

The Cleveland Browns, a close third in the Eastern division behind the Eagles and Giants, were favored by 5 over the Steelers at Pittsburgh; the Chicago Bears were picked by 6½ at home against the Detroit Lions; the San Francisco Forty-Niners were 1½ over the winless Cowboys at Dallas; and the St. Louis Cardinals were 5½ over the visiting Washington Redskins.

In the American Football league, the Eastern division-leading Houston Oilers were picked by 13 at home against the Denver Broncos, and the Los Angeles Chargers, first in the Western division, were the choice by 12 over the visiting Buffalo Bills.

Philadelphia undoubtedly will miss fullback Clarence Peaks, who broke his leg last Sunday against the Redskins. His place will be taken by Ted Dean, a rookie who has played impressively.

There should be nothing wrong with the Eagles' passing attack, however, Van Brocklin is making his 12th NFL season one of his best. With three standout pass receivers in Tommy McDonald, Bobby Wainston and Pete Retzlaff, "the Dutchman" has thrown for 18 touchdowns. McDonald has caught eight of these.

UCLA finally came to life-offensively—early in the fourth period, going 75 yards for their only score, with Kilmer pushing over for the touchdown from the two. They all but lost any chance of catching the Trojans when they went for the two-point conversion and failed.

Southern California locked up the game with a little more than two minutes to go with Don Zacheck's 29-yard field goal.

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### lone Wins 8-Man Grid Championship

Ione, Ore. —UPI—Jack Crum scored four touchdowns to pace the Ione Cardinals to a 33-13 victory over Triangle Lake today for the Oregon High School Class B Eight-Man Football championship.

Crum scored on runs of 48, 18 and 13 yards and on a 70-yard pass-lateral-run play.

Ione tallied 19 points in the first quarter and clinched the victory with two touchdowns in the final period.

The Cardinals ran up 344 total yards and Triangle Lake had 167.

### Baylor Helps Bowl Chances

Dallas —UPI—Baylor's three Ronnies, with some capable help from Bobby Ply, gouged out a hard-earned 20-7 victory over stubborn Southern Methodist Saturday to remain an attractive holiday plum for a bowl sponsor.

Ronnie Stanley guided the Bears to the third quarter touchdown that broke open a 7-7 halftime tie; Ronnie Bull scored that one and another one later with some timely assists from Ronnie Goodwin, while Ply engineered two of the scores, counting one from a yard out and flipping to Bull for the other.

Bull pounded a couple of yards for Baylor's go ahead touchdown in the third period, then shouldered his way 21 yards with a screen pass for another that put the game out of SMU's reach in the final minutes.

Portland—UPI—The state game commission has decided to use part of the money from sale of \$1 salmon and steelhead punch cards to help a study on salmon diseases. The commission will enter into the study with the state fish commission and provide it with about \$10,000 a year.

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### Frick and O'Malley Key Figures in Postponement

New York —UPI—Baseball Commissioner Ford Frick and Los Angeles Dodgers owner Walter O'Malley appeared to be the key men Saturday in the American league's decision to postpone final expansion plans for 1961 until still another meeting next Tuesday.

Faced with the problem of naming an owner for the new Los Angeles franchise, completion of a draft for stocking both the Los Angeles and Washington clubs and the drawing up of a 10-team 162-game schedule before Nov. 28, the AL clubowners heard just one bid for the proposed West Coast team Friday and then decided to adjourn until Nov. 22.

It was officially announced—by league President Joe Cronin—following a second all-day session that the postponement was necessary "to give ourselves more time to study the Los Angeles situation. We have received a number of applications for the franchise and we want to study them between now and next Tuesday," explained Cronin.

No Other Choice  
 However, it was learned that because of Frick's stand regarding some sort of indemnification to O'Malley for invasion of the Los Angeles territory, the AL had no other choice but to adjourn until a ruling both favorable to Frick and O'Malley can be achieved.

This was based on the fact that Del Webb, co-owner of the Yankees and chairman of the American League Expansion committee, left for Los Angeles late Friday, apparently to confer with O'Malley, although no league official cared to put it that way.

Up until now O'Malley has not made any demands or requests for reimbursement, but he appears to hold the key to American league plans because of Frick's determination to make AL expansion to the West Coast orderly and under baseball's rules.
