"The silence is higher in the highs, lower in the lows, with greater presence, finer and more pronounced brilliance and more exquisite tonal qualities."

This all sounds too wonderful to be anything but a spoof. But we live in the age of electronic wizardry. We have produced incredible miracles. Maybe pure silence is on the threshold of man's knowledge.
