Coaches' All-American

Chicago—(UPI)—The American Football Coaches association today announced its 1960 all-America team, chosen as the finest 11 collegiate football players in the land:
Ends: Mike Ditka, Pittsburgh, and Dan Larose, Missouri.
Tackles: Ken Rice, Auburn, and Bob Lilly, Texas Christian.
Guards: Joe Romig, Colorado, and Tom Brown, Minnesota.
Center: E. J. Holub, Texas Tech.
Quarterback: Jake Gibbs, Mississippi.
Halfbacks: Joe Bellino, Navy, and Ernie Davis, Syracuse.
Fullback: Bob Ferguson, Ohio State.

They were selected on the basis of balloting by more than 1,500 members of the coaches' association. The project is sponsored by the Eastman Kodak company and the coaches' team is distributed exclusively by United Press International.
East Dominates
For the first time in years, the East dominated the coaches' dream team with three players—Ditka, Bellino and Davis. The Midwest, South and Southwest have two players each while one each was chosen from the Rockies and Midwest regions.

Brown and Ferguson are the Midwest representatives, Rice and Gibbs the South's and Holub and Lilly the Southwest's. Roming is the Rockies' player, and Larose the Midlands'.
Bellino was the overwhelming fullback choice, collecting more votes from the men who do the coaching than any other player. Brown and Ditka received the most votes in the lineman balloting, with Holub a close third.
The second fullback position was closely contested with Davis just edging out Bill Kilmer of UCLA and Ronnie Bull of Baylor.
Bob Schloridt, Washington quarterback and Pat Richter, Wisconsin end, received heavy support in the early polling, but both then were injured.

The coaches 1960 All-America team is the 71st in the tradition established by the late Walter Camp. Its line averages 224 pounds, the backfield 198. At 250 pounds, Rice is the heaviest lineman; Romig at 200 the lightest.
At 217 pounds, Ferguson is the heaviest back; at 185 each, Bellino and Gibbs are the lightest.

Chicago—(UPI)—Coach Jim Howell of the New York Giants warned the Philadelphia Eagles today of possible retaliation against star quarterback Norm Van Brocklin if they rough up plackicker Pat Summerall in next Sunday's game.

Howell's remark was the latest in a series of verbal exchanges following last Sunday's 17-10 Eagle victory during which fullback Frank Gifford and end Jim Katcavage of the Giants were sidelined for the season.

"If they want to waste three blockers to get our placekicker it's perfectly legal although not too smart," said Howell, who claimed the Eagles sent two and three men downfield to block Summerall last Sunday.

"But," Howell added pointedly, "they must remember that Van Brocklin kicks too." Howell again cleared Eagle linebacker Chuck Bednarik of any illegal "head hunting" on the tackle which stretched out Gifford, but he called on his own players to "be tougher."

"We don't want any vendetta but we're not going to be had," he said. "It just does not make sense to let the Eagles eat up our ball players."

Only two backs—halves Tommy Mason of Tulane and Bob Gaiters of New Mexico State—managed to break in on the first round selections.

Ken Rice, a rugged 250-pound tackle from Auburn was the No. 1 choice in the draft. The 6-3 Bainbridge, Ga., husky-rated both a fine blocker and a vicious tackler for the Plainsmen—was picked up by the Buffalo Bills, who had first call.

Not a single quarterback was chosen in the first four rounds by the teams, which picked in the reverse order of their standings as of Nov. 13 games. One fullback and eight halfbacks were taken on the first four rounds. Due to ties,

Boston and Denver alternated picks, as did Houston and Los Angeles.
