10 Indicted for Wagering in State

Portland — (UPI) — A federal grand jury yesterday returned indictments against 10 persons arrested last Friday in connection with alleged wagering on athletic contests.

The indictments charge the defendants "engaged in the business of accepting wagers on athletic contests . . . and failure to pay a special occupational tax on wagers and failed to register as a person engaged in the business of accepting wagers."

Jack Savage, chief of the intelligence division of the internal revenue service here, was in charge of the raids.

Mrs. Effie Kurtz gave a talk on music, explaining from a teacher's point of view the values to be gained by a child from studying music. She reviewed briefly the history, materials, and methods used in the making of ceramics.

Mrs. Charles Taylor presented for her husband models of his wood carving, and explained the various steps from the block of wood to the finished article. The display of birds were exact replicas in design and color.

Mrs. Gebhard gave discourse on water and oil painting, displaying painting and explaining the processes and methods used in each, "A Dedication to All Mothers," poem by Mrs. Hamilton was given by Mrs. Hamilton.

During the business session, Mr. and Mrs. Claude Allsup were given the first and second degree obligation by Dee Hendrickson. A committee report was made by Arnold Bohnert, agriculture, who reviewed an article from the extension service on subsidies, showing that many other industries besides farming are subsidized by the government.

Charles Morehouse pointed out that the poultrymen receive no subsidy. It cost between 25 and 30 cents to produce a dozen eggs. The difference between this and retail price is absorbed in handling, packaging and profit.

Legislative committee chairman, Edwin Gebhard, gave information on the migrant farm labor in the state. He mentioned the educational program in progress for the children of these workers.

Nixons To Spend Holiday in Capital

Washington — (UPI) — Vice President Richard M. Nixon back from a vacation in the Bahamas, planned to spend a quiet Thanksgiving today with his wife and two daughters.

The unsuccessful Republican presidential candidate told newsmen on his arrival here Wednesday night that he had not "decided anything" about his future plans and probably would not for several weeks. There have been reports he might enter private law practice.

Nixon said he expected to spend the day at home with his family. They planned to have the traditional turkey dinner.

Asked about efforts by GOP aides to seek recounts in states where the vote was close, Nixon said he has made it plain he has "no participation" in such efforts.

Aide in Highway Department Dies

Salem — (UPI) — The assistant personnel director of the Oregon Highway Department, Arthur W. Marquiss, was found dead of carbon monoxide poisoning in his car in the family garage here Tuesday night.

Marion County Coroner Charles Edwards said it was an apparent case of suicide.

Marquiss, 51, was discovered by his wife. A hose had been run from the car's exhaust into the auto. The garage door was closed, Edwards said.

Marquiss went to work for the highway department 25 years ago and was named assistant director of personnel in December, 1945.
