**In the Day's News**

**Foreign affairs:**  
In Leopoldville, in the embattled Congo, the forces of Colonel Joseph Mobutu, the Congo STRONG MAN, attack the diplomatic premises of the Republic of Ghana - which were guarded by U.N. troops. A rather bloody battle ensues. Mobutu's men were gunning for Ghana's charge d'affaires (a charge d'affaires is a diplomatic official somewhat below the rank of ambassador) who, Mobutu charges, was conspiring against Mobutu and for Lumumba, who in the Congo ruckus appears to have been a playmate of the communists.

The point is that Mobutu won the battle and the U.N. command had to agree to expel the Ghanaian official.

**QUESTIONS:**  
Who is right? Who is wrong? Who's on our side? Who's against us?  
It's all rather obscure. But CUBA'S ambassador (representing the Castro government in the Congo) is against Mobutu and his protegee Kasavubu, whom he blasts as "anti-African colonial leaders and tools of the imperialists."

That gives us a fairly dependable hint as to who is on our side and who is on the communist side. Anyway, it's a mess.

**LET'S get closer home.**  
In Oregon (as, of course, almost everywhere) a lot of money was spent in the general election campaign that closed at midnight on Nov. 7. Oddly enough, the biggest expenditure was by the organizations opposing the initiative measure that proposed to ban billboards on freeways.

The Oregon Council of Outdoor Advertising and the Council on Highway Regulation jointly report contributions of \$107,967 and expenditures of \$106,129. These organizations led the campaign to defeat the anti-billboard measure.

The campaign committees for Senator Maurine Neuberger, the Democratic candidate for U. S. senator from Oregon, reported the second highest totals - contributions

of \$96,208 and expenditures of \$96,208. Which, it might be added, amounts to a rigidly balanced budget.

Republican Candidate Elmo Smith's campaign committees report contributions of \$89,944 and expenditures of \$84,612. That could be cited as a budget surplus. But . . . Maurine won and Elmo lost!

**THE next largest campaign** expenditure was for Secretary of State Howell Appling Jr., who defeated Monroe Sweetland (Appling is a Republican and Sweetland is a Democrat. Appling won.) Sweetland's committee reports that it received \$20,817 and spent \$22,361. The Appling committee reports that it received \$47,368 and spent \$48,383.

Both committees went into the red.

**A LOT of money?**  
It certainly is - in Oregon, at least.  
It is bad?  
I think not.

**IN OREGON,** candidates have to report how much they got, and where it came from. As long as the people know how much is being spent to get elected and WHERE THE MONEY COMES FROM, they ought to be able to draw their own conclusions. The law provides that information.

But - Campaign contributions don't have to be reported until AFTER the election. By that time, the water has all gone over the dam. Which means that AT THE TIME OF CASTING THEIR VOTES the people don't know how much money was contributed, AND BY WHOM, and how much was spent.

It would be a lot better if campaign contributions AND WHERE THEY CAME FROM had to be reported publicly BEFORE election day.

**Drummond Reports**

Roscoe Drummond reports on the Washington scene in the absence of Walter Lippmann.

**THE STATE OF THE CONGO**  
Washington - Because other news has been to the fore - the campaign, the election, the close vote, the desegregation contest in Louisiana, rebellion in South Vietnam and Guatemala - it has almost looked as though the Congo was quieting down.

It isn't. It is almost impossible to overstate the uncertainties which now prevail and which stretch as far ahead as anyone can see.

The best the United Nations has been able to do is arrest somewhat the drift to chaos.

The talk at the U.N. and in Washington is all about the need of a "fresh start." But there is almost total disagreement on how to start, where to start, and with whom to start.

In its effort to shield the newly independent and fragile African nations from the tentacles of the cold war in the course of which Premier Khrushchev tried to blast Dag Hammarskjold right out of his chair as Secretary General - the United Nations has in its lap the hardest kind of problem.

**WE MUST** hope that the U. N. will succeed. At stake is the safety of the other new nations. At stake is the functioning of the U. N. itself. But it will be along hard struggle. The U. N. is faced with this immensely difficult task.

1. There is no clearly legal government in the Congo to work with the U. N. It is often literally impossible to locate it. This government does not have control of the country, does not have the loyalty of the army, and often can't find its own ministries.

2. The U. N. can't be sure of the loyalty of its own forces in the Congo. Secretary General Hammarskjold and his chief representative in the Congo, Rajeshwar Dayal, have not been able to count on the Ghana and Guinea troops to follow U. N. directions. Consequently Mr. Hammarskjold has had to pursue a tentative, wavering course in order to avoid something very near to "civil war" within the U. N. This has seriously weakened his mission.

3. Political divisions prevent the U. N. from carrying out its assigned role freely and firmly. The Soviet Union wants to halt the U. N. from doing anything in the Congo so that Moscow can take over. It is hard for Mr. Hammarskjold to steer a clear course while Mr. K. is doing his best to steer him off the course. The new African nations would like to be assigned by the U. N. the full task of protecting the Congo, but they do not have the resources to do the job and they are themselves divided over whom to recognize as the legitimate Congolese government.

In a word, what we now have in the Congo is an uncertain U. N. mission with uncertain instructions trying to work with a nearly nonexistent government presiding over a disunited country with no real control.

**THERE** is wide agreement on the need for a fresh start. There is wide disagreement whether that fresh start should be made with Presi-

dent Kasavubu or with the deposed premier, Patrice Lumumba, or with a reconvened Congolese parliament. Lumumba appears to still want the Soviets back. Kasavubu

wants to keep them out, and parliament is an unknown quantity, in part, because many of its members fear for their lives. What the United States

most hopes for is a workable reconciliation of the conflicting Congolese personalities, accepting the United Nations as the sole instrument of outside aid.

In my judgment, this will not be achieved at all if Mr. Hammarskjold is tempted to accept the advice of some of his associates to make a deal with Mr. Khrushchev that if

the U. N. would bring back Lumumba, the Soviets, in return, would halt their campaign to purge the secretary general. Some think that this would

be a way to save the United Nations. It would more likely be a way to lose the United Nations. (c) 1960 New York Herald Tribune Inc.
