Small Worlds Around Us

Those Bugs Attracted To Lights Are on Night Shift

"Where are all the bugs in the daytime that hang around the lighted electric globes at night? If they are so stupid as to always fly toward a light why don't they fly toward the sun—I wish they would."

The lady who wrote that was disgusted, and a little perplexed; said the more she thought about it the more she wondered.

Probably nearly everyone wishes the same thing, that the bugs would fly right into the sun and burn themselves up. But however hard you wish it, it won't happen. The bugs you see around the electric globes are nightflying bugs. They belong to the night shift. They wouldn't be caught dead out in the bright light of day.

They hate light, any kind. All their activities are confined to the darkness. During the day they are carefully hidden under leaves, in crevices in the bark of a tree, under discarded boards, or logs, in cracks in walls, some even down on the bottom of some fresh water pond.

When the sun goes down and darkness comes they emerge from their hiding places and busy themselves at whatever it is that nightflying bugs always seem to be busy at.

But in their nocturnal flight, sometimes, they see a bright light. They fly toward it, may even circle aimlessly around it until they fall to the ground in sheer exhaustion.

Any bug flying around a light is a long way out of his or her element. They are faced, for the first time in their lives, with a condition they cannot master. They have no instinct to govern them at such a time. We do not see the bees or the wasps wasting their energies around a light. They went to bed at sundown. By the time they

begin their busy lives in the morning the confusion of artificial lights will be gone—maybe there is a moral here.

There are as many kinds of insects that fly by night as there are those that fly by day. We just don't see the nightflying kinds, but the warm darkness is peopled with them. Some of the day flyers are so dependent on sunlight that they may come to rest if the sun goes behind a cloud. Many of the butterflies react this way. If a sudden storm comes up they hunt a hiding place and remain there, while the shadow or the half-darkness persists.

React Strangely
Some of the habitual nightflying kinds will try to hide when they find themselves in a bright light. Most insects react to light in strange ways, depending on the angle of light that strikes them. The

bees are suspected to be able to travel long distances, guiding themselves by the light-angle.

Those insects that plunge themselves stupidly into an unyielding electric light globe tonight or tomorrow night have been hiding in a dark crevice all day. Maybe some of the more stupid ones do fly toward the full moon, but they must all get safely back, for tonight the numbers around the glowing light bulbs will once again be a many-headed multitude.

Vatican City—(UPI)—Vatican sources said Thursday it was "unlikely" Pope John XXIII would bestow an immediate special blessing of the new son of U.S. President-elect Kennedy unless requested.

The sources said protocol did not call for an automatic telegram of congratulations to a president-elect on the birth of a child.

The usual form is for a chief of state, particularly a monarch, to inform the pontiff by cable of the birth of an heir or a child. Then the Pope replies.
