Suggestions Given On How To Pray

Many sensitive people recoil at the suggestion that there are "techniques" in prayer.

They say that prayer should be spontaneous, "from the heart," as natural as breathing.

Spiritual directors agree that spontaneous prayer has great value, and that it is appropriate for any time, place or circumstance.

But from the time of Jesus until now, they have also insisted that there are rules to be learned and disciplines to be practiced in prayer.

Outlined below are seven specific suggestions that have been commended by many saints and scholars through the ages:

1. Pray each day at the same time. No matter how many spontaneous prayers you may offer during the course of the day, you should pray at a fixed, regular time for private prayer. Treat it as the most important appointment of your day, and don't let anything intrude upon it or crowd it out.

2. It is helpful to have an habitual place, as well as a regular time, for prayer. It may be any place you find convenient, so long as it affords complete privacy.

3. The posture you assume in prayer does not matter to God, but it may make a great difference to you. You can stand, sit, kneel or lie down to pray. Kneeling is a physical act of humility which helps many people to prepare psychologically for prayer. An uncomfortable position may be a distraction, but one which is too comfortable—for example, lying in bed—is likely to lead to drowsiness rather than concentration.

4. Prepare for prayer with a brief period of devotional reading. This helps you to make the transition from the hectic world of daily routine to the quiet mood of prayer. It enables you to focus your attention on God, which is both the precondition and the purpose of prayer.

5. Pray as long as you want to and no longer. Jesus warned that long-windedness is not a virtue in prayer, and the model prayer he gave to his disciples is only 87 words long. Until you are far advanced in the spiritual life, you may find it difficult to sustain a genuine mood of prayer for longer than 5 or 10 minutes at a stretch.

6. Pray whether you "feel like it" or not. It is your will, not your fleeting emotions, which you offer to God in prayer.

7. Do not be ashamed to offer "selfish" prayers, or to seek God's help in "little" things. Jesus included in his sample prayer a petition for bread, which is about as mundane a request as you can make. But you should not let selfish petitions dominate your prayers.

What other types? Spiritual directors have identified four—adoration, thanksgiving, confession and intercession.

Adoration is simply lifting up your heart to God and saying in whatever words you find most meaningful that you acknowledge Him to be worthy of your utmost love and obedience.

Thanksgiving is counting your blessings and confession is asking forgiveness for your sins. Intercession is asking God's help for others.

Methodists In Gold Hill Over Subscribe Fund

Gold Hill - The Rev. Mr. Lochlen L. Gregory, pastor of the Gold Hill Community Methodist church, reported that Opportunity Night held recently at the Gold Hill church, resulted in \$887.50 pledged to the Oregon Conference's Methodist Expansion Fund. This is 30 per cent more than the local church's fair share asking of \$670, he said.

Opportunity night included a potluck supper followed by the presentation of miscellaneous slides of various churches in Oregon, including the local church, that have received help from the conference funds.

Oregon is roughly 70 per cent unchurched, compared to a 40 per cent nationwide average, the minister stated.

A campaign has been going on throughout the Conference to raise \$350,000 by Nov. 20, he said. The fund will allow \$100,000 for church extension in Oregon; \$100,000 for Willamette university; \$78,500 for Wesley Foundations; \$25,000 for Negro colleges; \$25,000 for Alaska Methodist university, and \$21,500 for a contingency fund.
