## Smoot Receives 23 Write-Ins For President in Election

Dan Smoot, television news analyst who spoke in Rogue River last summer, led the Jackson county write-in votes for President with 23 in the Nov. 8 general election, according to the official canvass by the Jackson county election department.

Second in popularity for the Presidential write-ins with 12 votes was Adlai Stevenson, a front-runner in the Los Angeles Democratic national convention.

Other write-ins for the presidency were Wayne Morse, 4; Nelson Rockefeller, 4; Barry Goldwater, 3; Henry C. Lodge, Herbert Humphrey and Herbert Holdridge, 2 each. With one vote each were Linus Pauling, Lyndon B. Johnson, Eric Hass, James L. Reed, Alfred Michael Beck, Orville Faubus, Gerald L. K. Smith, Henry Kraylusk, Chester Good, Caesar J. Ferris, Harry Pope, Red Skelton and Stuart Symington.

Write-in candidates for vice president were Hubert Humphrey, 1; George Cozzine, 1; Bracken Lee, 2; Dan Smoot, 1; Estes Keaver, 1; and Barry Goldwater, 1.

Southern Oregon College President Dr. Elmo Stevenson led the write-in race for congressman from the fourth district with 4 votes. Bob Duncan had 2 votes.

Write-in candidates for the senate, long term, were Bob Duncan, 1; E. E. Carpenter, 9; and Wayne Morse, 1.

For the short senate term, E. E. Carpenter received 8 votes and Wayne Morse 1 vote.

O. H. Benson was the lone write-in for attorney general, with 1 vote. Norman Barnes received 1 vote for secretary of state.

Write-in candidates for state representative were Joe Smith, Mrs. Joe Smith and Phillip Lowry, with 1 vote each.

Floyd McCabe led the county commissioner write-in race with 12 votes. Ralph James followed with 9 votes. R. A. Schmidt, George Hartley, and Leonard Wilson each received 1 vote.

John Beresford Tipton, fictitious multi-millionaire philanthropist on television, led the list of write-in candidates for county treasurer with 1 vote. James Lick, Nelson G. Slater, and William Edmond Davis followed with 1 vote each.

County surveyor write-in candidates were Dick Miller, Roy Rogers and Albert Uhl, each with 1 vote.

G. W. Kellington, prominent Medford lawyer, received 1 write-in vote for district attorney. Otto Frohnmayor also had 1 write-in vote. Walter Nunley had 4; Janet Wilkinson, 1; and B. K. Blackhurst, 1.

Stuart Pennington and Buss Brunney each received 1 vote for county assessor.

Jessie Lombard led the Ashland justice of peace race with 121 write-in votes. James St. Clair had 1; George Jones 1; Nellie Burns, 4; William A. Brown, 1; Mikey Morgan 2; Vern Smith, 2; Ed Singmaster, Eunice Neill and Jessie Kidwell, William L. White, Richard Cottle and Stanley Sherwood, 1 each; and Art M. Boner 6.

Also running in the Ashland justice of peace write-in race were Fred Barbeau, R. E. Scott, Marshall Woodrill, Richard Nixon, Winnerfred Colby and Ralph Leach, each with 1 vote.

Betty Ladd received 2 votes and I. Walker 7 votes for Gold Hill justice of peace.

## Work Planned on Abel-Blizzard Gap Section of Road

Lakeview—The state highway department will open bids Dec. 9 on the west unit of the Abel-Blizzard gap section of the proposed Adel-Winnemucca highway near here.

Lake County Judge C. H. Langset said recently the highway commission has mailed notices to contractors, and awarding of the contract will be Dec. 12.

The project extends from Adel some nine miles across Warner valley to the foot of Greaser canyon. Hutchins and Company, Roseburg, has already completed the remaining distance from the canyon to the top of Blizzard gap.

Lane county has built about 17 miles of the new road, from the Nevada state line into Guano valley including the Dougherty slide section. South of the border, Nevada has the road completed and oiled.

Federal, state and county funds financed the Blizzard-Greaser portion of the highway, but state and federal money will build the section from Adel east.

The job designates 9.03 miles of grading and structures, and should require some 368,100 cubic yards of concrete, 93,115 pounds of metal reinforcement, 770 cubic yards of riprap, 1,925 treated timber pilings, and 14,500 board feet of treated lumber.
