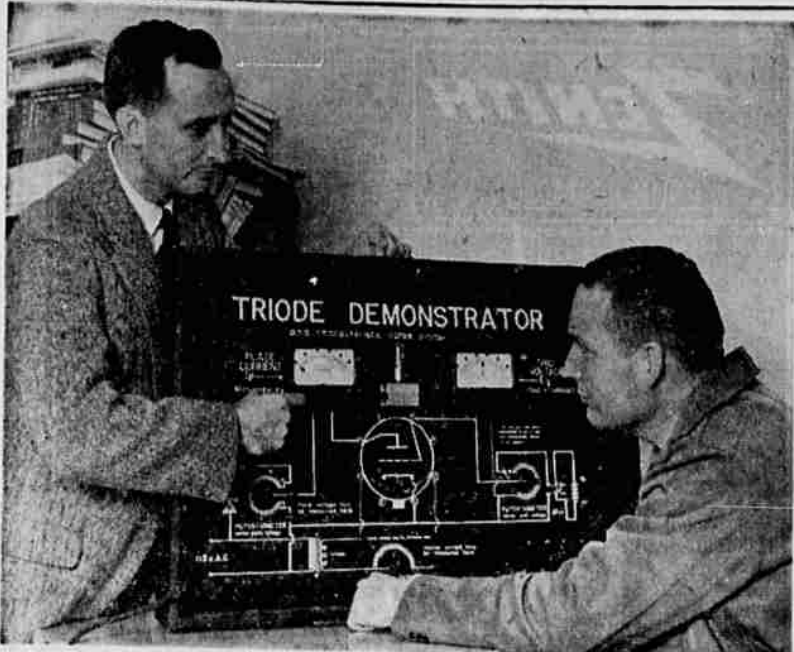

The mechanics course, a two-year program, consists of evening classes including all phases of auto mechanics designed to meet the needs of persons preparing for such employment. The two-year electronics course will prepare persons for employment as highly skilled technicians in electronics industries. It also will provide opportunities for those already in technical occupations to obtain further training, according to Boshers. 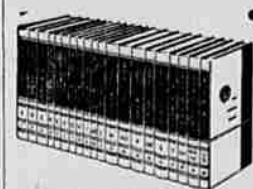
Conference Planned For Health Officers
