Producer Defends Standard of Films

Hollywood -UPI- Producer Jerry Wald Friday parried charges by the Roman Catholic Legion of Decency which announced earlier this week that Hollywood films are becoming increasingly objectionable to decent people and moral standards.

The Legion which evaluates films for guidance of Roman Catholics, said, "there has been an alarming departure from previously accepted and respected standards."

It said objectionable movies had risen from 14.59 per cent of Hollywood total production in 1959 "to the astounding figure of 24.33 per cent this year."

Wald, whose "Peyton Place" caused a lot of lifted eyebrows, was not condemned.

He blames foreign imports "for the current hue and cry."

Hatfield's Budget Lists Pay Raises

Salem -UPI- Gov. Mark Hatfield is including \$5.6 million in his 1961-63 budget for a 15.6 per cent salary increase for higher education faculty members, his office said Friday.

The increase is designed to "restore Oregon's salaries to the comparable level existing in 1959," the office said.

The statement added that increases in other state salaries are expected to be recommended in line with a wage and salary survey conducted by the State Civil Service Commission to meet competition with private industry and the federal government.

The idea is to eliminate costly turnover.

Six Men Appear In Circuit Court

Lawrence Orson Allen, 2840 Juniper ave., Medford, was placed on four years probation for larceny by embezzlement when he appeared in Jackson county circuit court Wednesday.

Allen had pleaded guilty July 7 to charges of taking \$2,300 from Franklin Transfer and Storage company, 340 North First st., Medford, while an employee there. A pre-sentence investigation had been requested.

Michael Paul Dennis, 19, Seattle, Wash., pleaded guilty to district attorney's information charging assault and robbery while armed with a dangerous weapon and was sentenced to five years in the Oregon correctional institution.

He was charged with using a gun to take \$36 from Janet Ruth Leach at a motel near Rogue river July 28.

Imposition Suspended

Imposition of sentence was suspended for three years on James Brandel Backes, 19, of 32 South Columbus st., Medford, after he pleaded guilty to district attorney's information charging larceny.

He had waived right to a grand jury hearing. Conditions of his probation are that he must be under supervision of the Oregon state board of prisons and parole for three years and can only use his car driving to and from work.

Backes was charged with taking a number of auto parts Oct. 28 from a garage in Phoenix.

Frances Earl Matheny, transient, pleaded guilty to district attorney's information charging larceny and was sentenced to the county jail for one year for grand larceny. He was ordered transferred to Rocky Butte jail in Portland. He is charged with taking an adding machine from a Medford store Oct. 19.

Pleads Guilty

Joe W. Rawhauser, transient, pleaded guilty to district attorney's information charging him with uttering and publishing a false check. Imposition of sentence was suspended for three years.

He was placed on probation on condition that he make restitution. He is charged with issuing a false check to a local market July 10.

Marvin Lee Hamilton's probation was revoked for parole violations, and he was sentenced to two years in the Oregon correctional institution.

Hamilton, of Central Point, was charged with violating his parole by failing to attend high school as directed and operating a car without authority from his probation officer.

He had originally pleaded guilty to burglary not in a dwelling. On Oct. 6 he received a suspended sentence for five years.

Gen. David Shoup, the Marine Corps commandant, is determined to see that at least one American combat weapon - the U.S. Marine - does not grow obsolete.

First, he abolished the swaggy stick, a move that had the effect of restoring to active duty the right arm of almost every Marine officer above the rank of lieutenant colonel.

Now the hero of Tarawa has laid down a set of physical-fitness tests that ought to keep the Leathernecks as drum-taut and agile as a troupe of Hungarian tumblers.

These tests may sound a little rigorous to some of our white-collar workers. Life has been too good. We have softened into cocktail lounge commandos and spectator sportsmen.

I myself have tried to keep fit. Just for the fun of it I took a crack at Gen. Shoup's exercises last Sunday. I came out rather well.

For example, Test No. 1, "Simulating an uphill climb, step onto an 18-in. high 1 lb. box, one foot at a time, and step off one foot at a time." You are supposed to do this 60 times in three minutes.

Well, I couldn't find an 18-in. ledge or box around the place.

"Why don't you just climb a hill?" my wife suggested. They were all out watching me.

"Because," I explained, "when the Commandant says a ledge or a box he doesn't mean a hill." Women don't understand orders.

I moved on to No. 2. I can

climb a box later.

"Using a knotted 1 1/2-in. rope, suspended from a 20-ft. high beam, climb up and down in 20 seconds."

What would I be doing with a 1 1/2-in. rope? Or a 20-ft. high beam. We may live in the suburbs, but not in a barn.

"Simulating reaching a wounded man under fire," directs Test No. 3, "run in a zig-zag fashion to a comrade lying 50 yards off. Lift and carry him back to the starting line in 42 seconds."

I used to do that when I was in the Marines, but my comrade always carried me. I gave him my beer ration.

"Who'll I get for the comrade?" I asked.

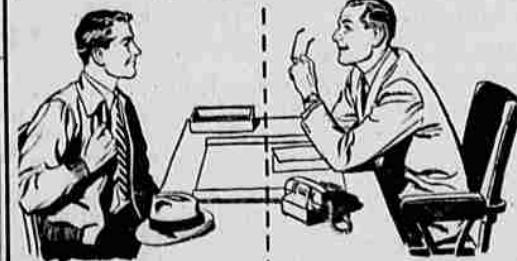
Bandit Gets Money At Portland Bank

Largest Harvest of Resources Reported by BLM During 1960

In fiscal year 1960 the nation's unreserved public domain administered by the bureau of land management produced the largest harvest of natural resources in history, the department of the interior has announced.

During the year, BLM land, totaling some 477 million acres in 28 states, produced 1.1 billion board feet of timber, 147 million barrels of petroleum, 462 billion cubic feet of natural gas, 13 million tons of potash, plus millions of tons of other valuable minerals and materials.

In addition, the public domain rangelands under BLM management produced forage and browse for more than 10.8 million livestock and nearly 1.3 million big game. All of these resources make an important contribution to the national economy and to local communities, the department said.

Add New Lands

BLM programs also added new lands to the nation's economy for homes, recreation sites, industries, parks, towns, and a wide variety of other public and private uses, Director Edward R. Woolzley said.

In 1960 the bureau of land management issued 13,663 land patents (deeds) that transferred a net total of some 352,860 acres out of federal ownership. These patents included about 28,000 acres of mineral lands, some 84,000 acres of agricultural lands, and over 38,600 acres in small tracts for residence and recreational use. About 3,100 acres were sold to state and local governments and non-profit organizations for public recreation and other public purposes, Woolzley said.

Woolzley said that in addition to the resources harvested, BLM lands produced revenues to the United States treasury of more than \$371 million in 1960 - an all time record for any one year. This boosted total BLM receipts to more than \$2.2 billion.

Operating Expenses

Last year BLM's operating expenses were about \$28 million, plus about \$5 million for construction and \$760,000 for range improvements. Out of all funds used for construction, some \$5 million was voluntarily contributed last year by the 18 western Oregon forest land counties from funds which they would have otherwise received as part of their share of timber sale receipts. In addition, the counties made available funds for reforestation and access road maintenance.

Funds for range improvements are made available by Congress from a percentage of fees charged public land range users. This money is returned to the grazing districts to help pay for fences, watering facilities, cattle guards, and other needed improvements, Woolzley explained.

The largest increases in natural resource production were in petroleum. There was a productive increase of more than 10 million barrels of petroleum from the plains states and Rocky Mountain areas during 1960. Petroleum production in Alaska - the first commercial production reported - amounted to some 209,000 barrels. On the outer Continental Shelf petroleum production increased by over 5 million barrels. Gas production on the outer Continental Shelf increased by more than 29 billion cubic feet.

Forestry Activities

Another highlight in BLM resource management activities is forestry. The bureau has responsibility for more than 160 million acres of public forest and woodland.

Some 2.1 million acres in western Oregon, known as the O and C lands, contain some of the finest, high quality, old growth timber in the nation. Woolzley said that the O and C operation is one of the most successful forestry enterprises of the federal government. Despite the cutting of more than 10 billion board feet of O and C timber since 1937, the volume of timber on these lands today is greater than when the management program was initiated.

The director explained that the annual harvesting of timber on O and C lands is limited to their sustained yield capacity. In 1960 over a billion board feet of O and C timber was sold. The sale price of \$34 million more than equaled the entire BLM appropriation for 1960, Woolzley said.

But there is more to public land management than just harvesting natural resources, Woolzley said. In 1960 thousands of acres of public rangelands were treated to remove brush and poisonous weeds and seeded to provide a perpetual crop of grass. Earthfill detention dams, diversion dams, dikes, and waterspreading systems were built to halt serious gully erosion where other land treatment measures could not do the job.

Public land management involves the protection of millions of acres of forests and grasslands from the destructive forces of fire, insects, and disease. It also involves

public recreation, land classification, land surveys, forest management, range inventories, and semitechnical jobs, Woolzley said.
