Venezuela Army Called To Quell Demonstrations

President Acts After Fourth Day Of Uprisings

Some Constitutional Rights Suspended

Caracas, Venezuela — (UPI) — President Romulo Betancourt called out the army today to crush an anti-government uprising and to prevent Venezuela from falling into the Communist camp.

Betancourt acted after leftist students and agitators rampaged through downtown Caracas in the fourth and worst day of anti-government demonstrations.

"We will fight to prevent Venezuela from falling under Communist dictatorship," he said as he called out the army to join police and the national guard against the demonstrators.

Betancourt also suspended some constitutional guarantees throughout Venezuela to enable the army to move freely against demonstrators the government said were led by pro-Castro leftists.

Police used tear gas and rifle fire to try to quell the demonstrations but they grew in scope during the day and the toll of injured was expected to rise steadily.

Twenty five demonstrators already had been reported hurt, one by gunshot, and seven policemen by shots fired from Caracas rooftops, bringing the four-day riot toll to three dead and more than 100 wounded.

The government rolled out tanks to protect the presidential palace as the situation worsened and Betancourt warned "the government cannot tolerate civil war."

Convicted Slayer To Be Resentenced

Portland — (UPI) — The Multnomas county district attorney's office said today that convicted slayer Harry William Braley will be resentenced some time this week.

The Portland frycook originally was convicted of first degree murder and sentenced to death but last Sept. 14 the State Supreme Court reduced the judgment to second degree, sparing him from the gas chamber.

Braley has been in the county jail here since Nov. 10, awaiting his new sentence. Second degree murder carries a mandatory penalty of life imprisonment.

Braley, 38, was convicted in 1958 for the knife slaying of Judith Violet Knudsen in Portland.

"We're Almost Ready To Take Off Again"

Lumumba Evades Guards To Return To Stanleyville

Leopoldville, The Congo — (UPI) — Ousted Premier Patrice Lumumba has slipped away from his heavily guarded home here to return to his political stronghold at Stanleyville in the eastern Congo, it was reported today.

The bearded leftist evaded guards posted around his residence by strongman Col. Joseph Mobutu and rode away in a chauffeured car, informed sources said.

Both appeared greatly surprised and Mobutu rushed back to Leopoldville. Neither would comment.

In a statement distributed to the press after his departure, Lumumba said he was going to Stanleyville, but "not as a refugee."

The elder Jackson's wife, Marjorie, was also at the scene of the assault, but was apparently not involved. Mrs. Jackson told police the gang of men grabbed her husband and began beating him up.

After he was knocked to the ground, she said, they began jumping on him.

Robbin C. Jackson was taken to Sacred Heart hospital by Medford Ambulance service. Hospital officials reported that he was to be released today.

None of the family could give police any reason why they were attacked. The assault was not reported to police until several hours after it occurred.

Police are investigating the incident.

Court of Appeals Upsets Conviction Of Apalachin Gang

New York — (UPI) — The U.S. Court of Appeals today reversed the conviction and sentences of 20 delegates to the Apalachin, N.Y., underworld convention of Nov. 14, 1957.

The men had been charged with conspiracy to obstruct justice.

In the opinion of the three-judge panel, "There is nothing in the record of the trial to show that any violation of federal or state law took place or was planned at the gathering."

The 20 delegates to the so-called "hoodlums convention" were sentenced last spring to prison terms running from three to five years and 13 of them were fined \$10,000 each.

The men were freed in bail pending their appeal. The decision today upset two years of efforts by federal law enforcement agencies which had sought to discover the reason for the conclave at Apalachin.

Although many theories had been advanced, including that the meeting had been called to punish members of the Mafia underworld organization, the government was not able to prove it.

The ruling was a major reversal to the Justice department's new strategy against alleged crime syndicates. This strategy had been to prosecute for criminal conspiracy in cases where suspected syndicate leaders jointly refused to answer questions on grounds of self-incrimination.

The Apalachin case was the first application of this legal concept and today's ruling was the first appellate test.

Salem — (UPI) — Coroner Charles Edwards said Saturday an autopsy showed that William Alton Toyce, 55, Salem, died of a cerebral hemorrhage.

Toyce died Friday night after he was found unconscious in a ditch near here Wednesday.

Edwards said the cause of death was natural. It was not known what brought it on, although the victim suffered from a hypertensive condition, he said.

County 4-H Club Member Wins \$400 Scholarship

Philip Krouse, 18, Applegate 4-H club member, Sunday was named one of six winners in the National 4-H agricultural program. He was presented a \$400 college scholarship from the International Harvester company at the 39th National 4-H Club Congress in Chicago.

Philip is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Francis A. Krouse, who operate a 276-acre Jackson county livestock farm. He won the award for outstanding work in 4-H agricultural projects.

He has completed beef, sheep, swine, tractor maintenance, electricity, forestry and junior leadership projects during his nine years of 4-H work.

The Applegate youth now has 82 head of registered sheep and 26 head of cattle. He was reported as doing his most outstanding work in leadership and community service.

He played a leading role in raising funds for the March of Dimes and contributions to send other 4-H youngsters to summer school and camp.

Purse Found in Car Spurs Hunt For Companion

Couple Met at Crater Lake Park

Portland — (UPI) — A 19-year-old college student was found stabbed to death in his car parked in a lover's lane Sunday night and sheriff's officers said they feared his coed companion was kidnaped or slain.

A search was under way in the Forest Park area just west of here for Beverly Ann Allen, 19, whose purse was found in the car beside the body of her boyfriend, Larry Ralph Peyton.

Had Dinner at Home
Miss Allen, a student at Washington State University from Port Townsend, Wash., had been visiting here during the week end. The couple had not been since 9 p.m. Saturday after they had dinner at the home of the slain youth's parents.

Young Peyton's body was found about 9:30 p.m. with 14 stab wounds on the right side of his chest and nine in the back. It was located in the front seat of his 1949 car on a knoll overlooking the city.

Bullet Hole Found
An unexplained bullet hole was found in the window near the dashboard.

Sheriff Francis Lambert ordered the car left in the position where it was found and fingerprint experts were going over it today.

The dead youth was a student at Portland State College. He lived with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Ralph O. Peyton. The boy's father is a partner in the Crater National Park Co., which operates Crater Lake lodge in southern Oregon. The father said his son met Miss Allen last summer when the girl was employed at the souvenir counter at the lodge.

The coroner's office said the victim also suffered a depressed skull fracture about the size of an egg on the top of his head.

Deputy Sheriff Allen Gadberrly said he was checking the area and came upon the car. He found the body when he flashed his spotlight into the car.

The deputy sheriff said there apparently was a "terrific struggle" with clothing scattered on the seat and floor. A jacket believed to belong to the girl was found.

Sheriff Lambert said a small pen knife was picked up near the car but that it was not known if this was the murder weapon.

Officers theorized that the slayer came upon the couple parked in the car and pulled a gun on them and that Peyton struggled with the slayer.

Pearson's Letter Requests Straub To Resign Demo Post

Portland — (UPI) — Oregon Senate President Walter J. Pearson, (D-Portland), said Sunday he has asked State Sen. Robert Straub (D-Eugene), to resign as chairman of the Oregon Democratic party.

Pearson said the election of the Senate president is "not the state committee's affair." He said he thinks that Straub should resign as head of the Democratic party.

Pearson said his decision to write the letter was reached after the executive committee of the state Democratic party passed a resolution endorsing State Sen. Alfred Corbett, (D-

Portland), for president of the 1961 Oregon Senate.

Pearson is a backer of State Sen. Harry Bolvin, (D-Klamath Falls), for the presidency.

Pearson said the election of the Senate president is "not the state committee's affair." He said he thinks that Straub should resign as head of the Democratic party.

Tells Disappointment
In Eugene, Straub said he would not resign and said he was disappointed that Pearson had called on him to do so.

Straub said Pearson and himself were two different kinds of Democrats. "Pearson stands for the cautious wing of the party," Straub said, "and I identify myself with the wing of the party that attempts to develop programs which are adequate for the needs of the people."

New Hospital Wing To Match Building

The addition to Rogue Valley hospital to be constructed next year, will be four stories high and its exterior will match the existing building, according to specifications listed by the hospital board's building committee.

The steel frame structure will include single rooms and two-bed and four-bed wards as well as a maternity department with nurseries and orthopedic section. An exterior terrace of concrete and tile will be provided for patients, it was reported. The wing will be completely air conditioned.

Bids for the more than \$1 1/2 million addition will be opened at 2 p.m. Tuesday, Dec. 20, by the board of directors. The hospital has received \$558,000 in Hill-Burton funds to aid in financing the project.

Deputies recovered about \$350 worth of tools at a home in Gold Hill. Medford police assisted in the investigation.

Court, Republicans Discuss Successor

The executive committee of the Jackson County Republican Central committee met today at noon to further discuss the matter of a successor to State Sen. Edwin R. Durno, who will resign his seat next month to go to Congress.

Earlier this morning the committee met at the Medford hotel, but a Mail Tribune reporter was not admitted to the meeting.

The Republican committee last week recommended the appointment of Mrs. Evelyn Nye to succeed Dr. Durno, but the court pointed out it has requested three names to choose from if it wished, not just one.

French Colony Gets Independence

Nouakchott, Mauritania — (UPI) — A green flag bearing a gold star and crescent rose to the top of this sand-dune capital's highest flagpole today, and a 101-gun salute proclaimed Mauritania's independence.

At midnight, with sheep-slaughtering and other celebrations already under way, Premier Moktar Ould Daddah officially informed his 600,000 countrymen that this former French colony had become a republic.

About 200 delegates from 28 nations, including the Aga Khan and two American ambassadors, attended the ceremonies which freed the last of France's African possessions.

Briton Calls Russia 'Greatest Oppressor'

United Nations, N.Y. — (UPI) — Britain, calling Russia "the greatest oppressor of our day," charged today that the Soviet Union had forcibly taken over 22 million people since 1939 while 500 million formerly under British rule had achieved independence.

The charge by British Minister of State David Ormsby-Gore brought an immediate indignant objection from Soviet Ambassador Valerian A. Zorin, who failed in an attempt to have Britain's charge ruled out of order as "interference in the internal affairs of the Soviet Union."

The Anglo-Soviet clash marked the start of the General Assembly debate on Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev's propaganda demand for immediate freedom for all the world's remaining "colonial" people.
