Joint Investigation Aids Rogue River Fish Runs

Portland - Oregon anglers can tip their hats to road building agencies throughout the state for their cooperation and efforts in helping to solve the fish problems associated with road building programs.

Reino Koski, chief of fish liberations for the game commission, who has been working closely with federal, state, and county road building agencies, said that excellent cooperation has been obtained from these agencies for the inclusion of fishery benefits in the initial planning of road construction.

Koski mentioned that the game commission's stream clearance program is a well known example of stream improvement resulting in making more spawning area available. A lesser known aspect of the up and downstream movement of fish which could be just as damaging to the resource concerns the many culverts which must be placed in the ever-increasing network

of roads throughout the state. In the past few years, these road building agencies have included suitable culverts in the construction plans at early stages.

Unfortunately, Koski said, some culverts on roads constructed some years ago have proven inadequate for fish passage, and the agencies involved have been asked to apply corrective measures.

The Oregon state highway department recently completed the installation of baffles in two large culverts on streams in the central coast area. Waite creek on the Siuslaw system and Berry creek, crossing under Highway 101, had culverts at their mouths which prevented salmon and steelhead from entering. A joint investigation of the problem by the game commission and highway engineers resulted in an agreement that the highway department would install the baffle system in the two culverts.

The installation was done promptly prior to the arrival of the fall run of silver salmon. Evaluation of the stream use above the culverts will be done by fishery biologists this winter.

Koski said that another joint investigation by the highway department and the game commission resulted in decisions benefiting fish runs in the Rogue river system. Cofferdams remaining in the river after bridge construction near Homestead on the Rogue were left undisturbed until salmon spawning activities were complete. Removal of the cofferdams at the low water period might have resulted in much damage through excessive silt deposit.

During the same investigative trip, the highway department agreed to plan corrective measures for a long culvert on Galis creek, a partial block to upstream migrants, and a long impassable culvert on Jones creek, both important Rogue tributaries.

Dry Pellet Fish Food Successful

Portland - The use of dry pellet food in rearing trout and other game fish at game commission hatcheries continues to result in increased production with lower costs, Phil Schneider, state game director, said today.

After several years of experimentation the dry pellet food has almost completely replaced the old meat diet in producing fish in the commission's hatchery system.

An example of this increased production is exemplified by the Wallowa hatchery in northeastern Oregon where fish are presently on a 100 per cent pellet diet, Schneider continued. At this station, production has increased from 16,000 pounds of fish in 1957 to 28,000 pounds in 1960. The costs of food fed during the month of September have decreased for four successive years from just over 10,000 pounds in 1957 to just under 6,000 pounds in 1960.

Schneider mentioned that from the above figures and assuming September is a representative month, it is computed that while production has increased 75 per cent, the total amount of food consumed by the fish has decreased about 44 per cent. Additional savings in feeding pellets rather than meat diets occur because there is no loss through shrinkage of the stored pellets.

The majority of rainbow trout, cutthroat, and silver salmon at all stations is now being fed the dry pellets. Brood fish, chinook salmon and a few other special lots of fish will continue on a meat diet while additional experimental feeding is conducted.

Schneider said that the increased production does not mean that the Wallowa hatchery is producing more fish, except for a small increase in numbers. Every hatchery has a production capacity, he commented, beyond which it cannot go without possibility of disaster to the fish being produced. What it means is that the fish produced are of greater size and weight.

In other words, hatchery personnel in the past were hard pressed to rear quantities of fish to legal size in a single year using the old soft meat diet. Most of these fish when stocked averaged about 6 to 8 inches in length.

Almost without exception, Schneider continued, hatcheries report growth far more rapid with the pellet food now in use and during the same growing period as previously produce fish running from 8 to 10 inches in length, with many reaching the 12-inch mark. Legal sized trout stocked in past years averaged about five to the pound, while the legal trout produced on the dry pellets run about three to the pound.

Chinook Hatch Increases 42% Counts Show

Madras - The first return of Chinook salmon hatched above Pelton dam on the Deschutes river shows a 42 per cent increase over the average of the three previous years, according to official counts released here this week.

The 1960 run, now complete, totaled 740 fish. The first count ever made of Chinook migrating past the Pelton site was in 1957, prior to the dam's completion; the figure reached 615. In 1958, 469 Chinook were counted and in 1959 the number increased to 512.

George Elcher, PGE's chief aquatic biologist, says that the counting patterns plus research evidence indicate that upstream migrants are being passed over Pelton dam successfully. Success in the passage of downstream migrants is also highly encouraging, Elcher said. In 1959, 54,278 fingerling Chinook were counted using the dam's artificial outlet, and the 1960 figure for baby Chinook so far has reached 40,382.

Eicher pointed out that the 1960 Steelhead count, now at 460 and still in progress, is presently running behind previous years' counts. Less Than 100

A vestigial run of Blueback salmon seems to be holding close to average. Eicher said that numbers of this species counted since 1957, however, have totaled less than 100 fish annually and are considered too small to reveal any positive trend up or down.

The Pelton fish ladder stretches nearly three miles.

Washington - Mrs. John F. Kennedy will have to curtail her social activities as first lady for six months, her obstetrician said today.

Dr. John W. Walsh told United Press International in an interview that the attractive wife of the President-elect is making a "good recovery" from the Caesarean delivery of her second child. But he said he wanted her to have "a rest... a real rest."

Walsh said the demands of the White House would be great on Mrs. Kennedy, who is fragile. "She isn't like any other woman recovering from an operation," he said.

He made it clear that Jacqueline would have to build up her strength to be able to keep up with the rigorous social schedule of teas, luncheons and receptions ahead for her as first lady.
