License Plates Reflect Headlights

Chicago - (UPI) - License plates that bounce light are among the latest nighttime safety devices getting widespread use, according to the National Safety Council.

The plates reflect the headlights of other cars and can be seen for almost 2,000 feet at night.

Nine states use reflective license plates, according to the council. Many others are conducting test on their use. Researchers at the University of Illinois have found that the application of light-reflecting materials increases the nighttime visibility of license plates up to four times that of ordinary plates.

In many states the use of reflectorized plates has been sparked by an effort to reduce the danger of collision with parked or stalled cars," according to the council.
