The season ended with five teams attaining 10 triumphs, nine winning nine games and two gaining eight wins.

Authorities were hopeful of finding the remainder of \$43,000 worth of jewelry Mrs. Jayne Liberace, 42, was believed carrying with her May 15 when the plane crashed on a flight from Las Vegas to Van Nuys, Calif.

# Health Insurance Supporters Battle At AMA Meeting

Washington—UP—Supporters of conflicting voluntary nationwide health insurance plans squared off today for a fight at the American Medical Association's annual clinical meeting.  
The health insurance conflict was one of several tough professional issues to be discussed during committee meetings of the AMA's policymaking house of delegates at the third session of the five-day conference.  
Other resolutions before the committee deal with a medical scholarship and loan program, accreditation of foreign medical schools and a possible increase in AMA annual dues from \$25 to \$50.  
The committees will send resolutions to the House of Delegates which will act on them later in the week.  
The hottest debate was expected on an AMA board of trustees' recommendation that all health insurance agencies consider merging into a single voluntary prepaid health insurance plan.  
The board suggested that negotiations be started by bringing together representatives of the AMA, the Blue Shield organization, the American Hospital Association, the

Blue Cross Association, and the commercial health insurance industry.  
The AHA, which is associated with Blue Cross, has indicated it will refuse to participate in any such meeting at which the commercial insurance industry is represented.  
The hospital association believes that such a single insurance plan would give commercial insurance companies the better risk policy holders.

**Molalla Consolidated School Opening Stated**  
Molalla—UP—School officials said today they expected to open the Molalla consolidated grade school Wednesday.  
The school has been shut down since last week's flooding because water supplies have not cleaned sufficiently for safe use since recent storms.  
Students at the high school also were sent home early on Monday.  
Residents last Friday were told to boil all water used for drinking purposes.
