OF SMITH & MEN

It warms the heart, the way complete strangers sometimes rally forth to help the faltering wayfarer. Recently I've been overwhelmed by responses to some of the trifling and selfish complaints I've expressed here. For example, one fellow who I have trouble relaxing at the end of a complex day phoned to say he was sending me some Cutty Sark. He hung up before I could tell him I couldn't accept it. As it turned out, fortunately, he wasn't actually sending me SOME Cutty Sark, which is a kind of imported spirit. He was in fact sending me a Cutty Sark. This turned out to be a sailing vessel. It came in a big carton. It had 1,000 microscopic plastic parts which, when fitted together, according to the illustrated directions, would result in a full-rigged clipper ship big enough to carry a litter of cats. I'm grateful to this fellow for thinking of me. But he really doesn't understand my problem. The day the Cutty Sark came I couldn't have put five spades together to make a flush.

Still, it was a well-knit little yarn. There's this squirrel, see, who doesn't like nuts. Here we have the basis of a psychological thriller. Harold, the squirrel, tries to cadge food from the other animals. They reject him. The cow, for example, says, moo; the hen says cluck, no; the pig says oink, no, and so on. The squirrel becomes inner-directed and can't relate to other squirrels. How Harold resolves this dilemma and re-orient himself in the world full of squirrels and nuts is, of course, the heart of the matter. It would be a disservice to the reader or listener, to disclose it. To make the book talk, one must turn a little red plastic crank, which apparently turns a record inside the box. You turn the crank at 45 r.p.m. and the book tells the story you see. The crank must be turned at precisely the proper speed. If it is turned too slowly, the resulting sound is like the death rattle of the bull elephant; if too fast, it is like Mme. Flagstad singing "Die Walkure." On the basis of this single volume, of course, it may be too early to judge the future of the talking book. I should first like to hear something perhaps more ambitious, such as "The Decline and Fall of the Roman Empire" or Freud's "Interpretation of Dreams."
