Apples and Onions Make Unusual Dish

Apples and onions baked together make an unusual dish. Use 6 medium onions, 6 apples, 5 tablespoons flour, 3 tablespoons sugar, 2 teaspoons salt, 1/2 cup bread crumbs and 1 tablespoon Parmesan cheese.

Peel onions, wash and core apples. Thinly slice apples and onions. Toss apples in a mixture of flour, sugar and salt. Arrange in layers with onions in greased 2 quart casserole. Sprinkle top with a mixture of bread crumbs and Parmesan cheese. Cover, bake in 350 degrees F. oven until almost tender. Uncover and bake an additional 20 minutes to brown topping. Serves 8.

Trend Said Upward In Food Price

(The following guide to the nation's plentiful food buys for the week ending Dec. 3 was prepared for United Press International by the U.S. Department of Agriculture and Interior.)

Washington — UPI — Early December food shoppers can still count on finding budget-priced foods in good supply at their favorite markets this week end.

In the meat department, beef and pork are plentiful with good buys available in chuck beef and pork loin roasts. Many markets will be featuring legs of lamb as well, and broiler-fryers also continue plentiful.

At the vegetable bin, a wide selection of seasonal favorites is still available. These include cauliflower, cabbage, onions, lettuce, potatoes, sweet potatoes, beans, carrots, celery, corn, and squash.

In the fruit line, shoppers will find excellent supplies of cranberries, plus apples, grapes, grapefruit, and oranges.

In fish, plentiful items include both fresh and frozen shrimp and scallops, also fish sticks and portions.

Now for a more detailed report on plentiful foods in this area:

WEST — Arizona, California, Idaho, Montana, Nevada, Oregon, Utah, Washington, Wyoming: Consumers will have to shop carefully to find the most attractive food buys this week.

Red meats are in moderate to good supply, and ready-to-cook fryer chickens are fairly plentiful in most markets.

Egg supplies are lighter, and there is a limited list of plentiful fresh fruits and vegetables. Price changes are mostly on the upward side.

A number of red meat items are up 1 to 2 cents a pound in most markets, butler has advanced 1 cent a pound in the Los Angeles area, and eggs are up 1 to 2 cents a dozen in the San Francisco area.

Fresh fruit and vegetable plentiful include apples, pears, cranberries, bunched vegetables, cabbage, cauliflower, celery, lettuce, dry onions, squash, and tomatoes.

In good supply are avocados, grapes, grapefruit, lemons, oranges, corn, peppers, potatoes and sweet potatoes.

Top fish buys are salmon, halibut, rockfish, cod, and Dungeness crabs.
