'Teahouse' Said To Be Impressive Production at HS

Continuing the policy of attempting dramatic productions of merit, Medford High school students are presenting "The Teahouse" of the August Moon. "Teahouse," which opened last night and continues tonight and Saturday, is sponsored by the Theatopian troupe of the school, with Mrs. Lenore Zappell as director. "Teahouse" is a delightful comedy and satire which exposes the U.S. Army's habit of using time-encrusted ideas and methods, regardless of whether they fit the present. A few weaknesses of the United States are also held up to the light. For example the natives attempt, without success, to sell to the occupation forces, hand-crafted articles of merit, but soon discover that sweet potato brandy is snapped up, at any price.

Obviously, a high school cast and crew have their limitations, but still and all, can turn out an impressive production. The setting is fitting and imaginative, and in the teahouse scenes, even beautiful and impressive. Costuming and makeup are creditable, lighting and recorded music add to the illusion of help to create the illusion of an Okinawan village and its people. The problem of so many scene changes is solved with smoothness with a few exceptions. Whenever reality is possible, it has been used to good effect. A real Jeep is on stage.
