

### Scripps New Head Of Press Society

New York - (UPI) - E. W. Scripps, II, was elected president and chairman of the board of Sigma Delta Chi Saturday on the final day of the journalistic society's 51st national convention.

Scripps is a vice president of Scripps Howard Newspapers and trustee of the Edward W. Scripps Trust. He formerly was Sigma Delta Chi vice president in charge of professional chapter affairs and has been working for more than a year in the Washington bureau of United Press International.

Elected honorary president of the society was James Copley of San Diego, Calif., chairman of the Copley Press, Inc.

Buren McCormack of New York, vice president and editorial director of the Wall Street Journal, was chosen to serve as first vice president. Floyd Arpan of Bloomington, Ind., professor of Journalism at Indiana University, was named vice president in charge of undergraduate affairs.

Other officers elected were secretary, Walter Bourroughs, Costa Mesa, Calif., publisher and editorial director of the Costa Mesa Globe-Herald and the Newport Harbor Pilot; and treasurer, Theodore F. Koop of Washington, D. C., director of Washington news and public affairs, Columbia Broadcasting System.

## Nixon Seeks To Mold Winning Ticket; Prevent Squabbles

Washington - (UPI) - Vice President Richard M. Nixon feels his role in the Republican party for the next two years is to prevent squabbles and mold a winning organization for the 1962 congressional contests.

This assessment of the Vice President's conception of his post-presidential role was given by Nixon's press secretary, Herbert G. Klein, in a telephone interview with United Press International.

As for the position of party leadership, Klein said half of more than 50,000 letters received by his office have urged Nixon to remain active in politics.

Nixon could accomplish this, Klein explained, through speeches he will make from time to time, and through some contact with GOP legislative leaders.

Klein characterized Nixon's meeting here Thursday with New York Gov. Nelson Rockefeller, considered a possible 1964 GOP presidential nominee, as a unity session that helped "clear the air" of reports of rivalry between the two men.

Klein said the Vice President feels the GOP "cannot afford excessive intraparty struggle" and must build the party toward greater strength in the coming years.

He said Nixon is confident after the close presidential race that Republicans can wrest control of Congress from the Democrats in 1962 at least in the House where all 425 seats will be at stake. They have no chance of capturing the Senate until 1964 at the earliest.

Nixon was pictured as feeling the party organization wasn't quite strong enough this year as evidenced by Democratic registration estimated at close to 80 per cent of the eligible voters, compared to about 40 to 41 per cent for the Republicans.

Klein said Nixon ran ahead of the Republican congressional ticket nationally. He captured 228 congressional districts, while President-elect John F. Kennedy carried 208. However, Kennedy's were in big-vote areas that carried with it the necessary presidential electoral votes.

Klein reiterated the views that Nixon concedes his task in the immediate future as one of providing leadership for a "constructive opposition" to liberal Democratic proposals. He said that despite rumors, the Vice President "hasn't decided yet" on the job he will take when he goes out of office Jan. 20.

He confirmed, however, Nixon was "looking at" offers from three Los Angeles law firms, but said no decision had been reached.

Asked if Nixon would fulfill for the remaining weeks his constitutional duty of presiding over the Senate when Congress reconvenes Jan. 3, Klein said: "Yes, I expect him to be in the chair."

Last week, Nixon worked at his Capitol Hill office for the first time since the election, tackling a backlog of correspondence and again assuming an active part in politics.

He has had numerous appointments with persons who helped in his campaign, and has visited with GOP congressional leaders including Reps. Leslie Arends of Illinois, Bob Wilson of California, Sen. Hugh Scott of Pennsylvania, and Sen. Thurston B. Morton of Kentucky, who also is GOP national chairman. These and other visitors were in addition to his meetings with Rockefeller, Henry Cabot Lodge, and the White House dinner with President Eisenhower.

## Green Prods GOP To Show Evidence Of Vote Frauds

Washington - (UPI) - Sen. Theodore Francis Green (D-R. I.) Saturday prodded the Republicans to turn over to his Senate investigating subcommittee immediately any evidence of voting irregularities.

Green, 93-year-old chairman of the Senate subcommittee on privileges and elections, made the request in a telegram to GOP National Chairman Thurston B. Morton.

It said: "It is imperative that you turn over to this subcommittee immediately for the use of the Senate any information or evidence you may have which would affect the results of the presidential election."

Such data, if submitted, presumably could provide the basis for a major congressional investigation into GOP charges of presidential election ballot fraud in several states.

Morton, who made an on-the-scene inspection of GOP vote recount efforts in Cook county, Ill., has said there is a "remote possibility" that Vice President Richard M. Nixon would wind up as the victor over President-elect John F. Kennedy. However, other Republican leaders tended to discount the possibility of an election reversal.

Green said in a prepared statement that the same request for information has been made to the Democratic national chairman, Sen. Henry M. Jackson of Washington.

He pointed out to Morton that his subcommittee is charged with the duty of investigating alleged violations in matters "relating to the election of the president, vice president or members of Congress."

Green added that he issued a request Nov. 12, in a wire to Morton asking for any evidence of election law violations. But to date, he told Morton, the subcommittee "has received to reply or acknowledgment at all from you or any other official of the Republican national committee."

Despite this, Green noted he has read almost daily press reports concerning charges attributed to Morton and to other GOP officials alleging widespread vote fraud in a number of states.

# West Expects Communists To Issue Peace Manifesto

London - (UPI) - A Communist manifesto by the 81-member Red summit meeting probably will be published next week and will contain an appeal for world disarmament, the end of colonialism and for peace, diplomatic reports said Saturday.

The manifesto was said to signify a "qualified victory" for Soviet Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev's policy of peaceful co-existence over the war-

is-inevitable theme of Red China. Sources in Moscow said it would be published in Red capitals next Friday.

But authoritative reports leaking out of the three-week long deliberations which ended this week suggested that the Red leaders left basic ideological differences unresolved.

A facade of Communist unity was understood to be the underlying feature of the lengthy manifesto. Adopted an Appeal

A brief communique issued Thursday in Moscow at the conclusion of the parley said Red leaders, including those from Latin America, adopted "an appeal to the peoples of the world."

This appeal was believed to have been expanded in the

manifesto calling for an end to armament, peace, freedom for all nations and an end to all colonialism in the world.

Unanimity on this appeal apparently was reached by careful phrasing of the major international communist goals.

Even Red China has spoken of "peace," while avowedly fanning revolution in newly-emerging nations.

That section of the manifesto dealing with ideology was said to be a masterpiece of Marxist double-talk which would take western experts some time to interpret.

The manifesto, according to reports, encourages revolutionary movements—but does so in a guarded manner as an apparent compromise between Moscow and Peking.

Communist leaders who attended the Moscow talks were instructed to explain to their parties at the home of the outcome of the conclave.

Khrushchev himself was expected to report to the central committee of the Soviet Communist party which meets

in Moscow Dec. 13. The meeting was called some time ago, primarily to discuss Soviet agricultural progress and problems.

A full Soviet party congress will be held in February.

An Indian leftwing magazine, "Link," offered a summary of what it said were two major Russian and Chinese documents circulated among summit participants.

According to the publication, the Russian document accused Peking of flouting the

major principles of international communism and of trying to subvert Russian technicians in China. The Chinese document was said to have accused the Soviets of going back on decisions and taking too lenient an attitude toward "revisionism" in independent Yugoslavia.

## Gomulka Claims Reds In Accord On Peace Policy

Warsaw - (UPI) - Polish Communist leader Wladislaw Gomulka indicated Saturday Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev's "peaceful coexistence" policy with the West prevailed over Red Chinese objections at the recent Red "summit" meeting in Moscow.

Gomulka, just back from the three-week secret conference of 81 world Communist leaders, told a rally of miners at Katowice the Moscow gathering had agreed that the East-West struggle "can and should be solved, not by the path of a new world war, but by the way of peaceful competition between two social systems."

Gomulka said the Moscow gathering took this decision "unanimously" and "in a most decisive manner."

Surface Compromise

Gomulka, like East German leader Walter Ulbricht Friday, thus gave notice the Communist bloc apparently reached at least a surface compromise between the opposing views of Soviet Russia and Communist China.

Gomulka indicated Khrushchev's view that Communism could defeat capitalism without war remained the accepted policy of the Red world following the conference.

Western reports have said the Chinese Communists, supported by the Albanians and by Far Eastern Communist parties, strongly pushed the Mao Tse-Tung thesis that war must precede Communism's victory over capitalism.

Gomulka said, however, he said, the red summit meeting "confirmed the belief that in our era world war has ceased to be inevitable."

## Proposal to Merge Faiths Rumored

San Francisco - (UPI) - A merger of four major Protestant denominations will be proposed here Sunday at the Triennial General Assembly of the National Council of Churches, according to newspaper reports.

The San Francisco News-Call Bulletin quoted "published reports originating in the East" to the effect that the proposed merger would involve the Methodist Church, Protestant Episcopal Church, United Church of Christ, and United Presbyterian Church.

The proposal would be made by the Rev. Dr. Eugene Carson Blake, stated clerk of the United Presbyterian Church in the United States, the newspaper said.

Episcopal Bishop James A. Pike of California was to make a brief address following Dr. Blake's appearance at the Grace Cathedral Lecture.

The San Francisco Chronicle said earlier that Dr. Blake was expected to announce Sunday agreement with the Episcopal Church on the common liturgical observance of Holy Communion and on exchange of ministers.

## Election Returns Still Coming In

Washington - (UPI) - Sen. John F. Kennedy led Vice President Richard M. Nixon by a slim 140,878 votes Saturday in almost complete official returns from the 50 states.

With returns from 32 states certified official by their secretaries of state, and only a fragment of the votes still uncounted in the remaining 18, the unofficial United Press International count was:

Nixon 34,064,649  
Others 474,043  
Total 68,744,219  
Kennedy had 50.103 per cent of the 68,270,176 two-party vote, and Nixon had 49.897 per cent—a difference of 0.206 per cent.
