Crater Hoop Quint Beats Eagles 65-47

Eagle Point — Crater's Comets broke away from a hustling Eagle Point crew after a nip and tuck first quarter and went on to a 65 to 47 basketball triumph Friday night in the opening game of the season for each of the schools.

The Comets headed 15 to 12 at the end of the first quarter, on which the lead switched hands six times. Crater pulled away from a 19 to 18 gap in the second stanza with the aid of three buckets by Dennis Edwards. Except for a brief EP bid in the third canto, the Central Point team was not seriously challenged the rest of the way.

Edwards with his rebounding and scoring and Loyal Higginbotham with his points and playmaking spearheaded the 'Comet effort. Higginbotham was the evening's high scorer with 20 markers and Edwards had 19. Jim Allen put in 12 for Crater and Ron Greb had 11 and Mike Palm 10 for the Eagles.

Leading Crater's 53 to 30 domination on the backboards, Edwards had 22 rebounds, Palm and Greb made eight retrieves each for Eagle Point.

Crater held a 34 to 23 spread at half time and was on top 53 to 34 at the third intermission.

A set shot over a screen by Louis Alvarez and a crippler and jump shot at the start of the fourth canto gave Crater a 17-point 40 to 23 margin.

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Eagles Can Clinch Title

By JOE SARGIS United Press International The Philadelphia Eagles are virtually "in" in the National Football League's Eastern division and the Baltimore Colts hope to be soon in the same position in the Western division.

However, before they begin popping the champagne bottles, the Eagles have to beat the pesky St. Louis Cardinals Sunday to nail down their first division title since 1949, while the Colts are faced with a three-pronged attack from pretenders to their NFL title.

The oddsmakers figure the Eagles, winners of eight in a row since a season-opening loss to the Cleveland Browns, five point favorites over the Cardinals at St. Louis, but have made the Colts whopping 13-point picks at home over the Detroit Lions. The Eagles need only one more victory to win a championship berth while the Colts, battered around this season in a way they are unaccustomed, wish the challengers would go away and leave them alone.

The New York Giants and Cleveland Browns are the Eagles' closest pursuers, but their only hope appears to be a spot in the NFL's "runner-up bowl" at Miami, Fla., Jan. 8. Both are 5-3-1 and both are six favorites — the Giants by 14 over the winless Dallas Cowboys and the Browns by 15 over the Washington Redskins.
