Kasavubu Wins Seat on UNESCO

Paris - (UPI) - UNESCO Saturday voted to seat a Congolese delegation representing the government of President Kasavubu after a chaotic session of table thumping reminiscent of Soviet Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev's scene at the United Nations General Assembly.

The vote was approved 39 to 19 with 7 abstentions. Thirty-three delegations were absent.

The table thumping started and went on for ten minutes when the United States tried to speak against a motion by Communist oriented Guinea to suspend the debate.

Soviet Chief Delegate S. G. Lapine led the opposition to the seating of Kasavubu's delegation.

"The only legitimate government of former Belgian Congo is Mr. Lumumba's," Lapine declared.

Delegations supporting him were Cuba, Guinea, Ghana, Morocco, India, Lebanon, The United Arab Republic, Upper Volta, Somalia, Afghanistan and Yugoslavia.

Police Arrest 14 Negroes in Memphis

Memphis, Tenn. - (UPI) - Police arrested 14 Negro sit-in demonstrators Saturday at six eating places in Memphis and Jackson, Tenn.

There were no incidents reported. Four of the sit-ins took place in downtown Memphis restaurants and the other two in Jackson, located east of here.

Most of the restaurants simply closed when the Negroes entered and the demonstrators were arrested when they persisted in efforts to obtain service. Twelve were arrested by Memphis police.

Officers said they would be charged with state violations of interfering with trade and commerce and city violations of disorderly conduct and loitering.

Navy Seeks Relief From Ike's Order

Washington - (UPI) - The Navy Saturday was reported planning to appeal to the defense department for exemptions from the President's order to reduce the number of military dependents abroad.

On the basis of second thoughts, the Navy Times said, the naval command has decided that the entire reduction should be made by the Army and Air Force because a larger percentage of Navy men already are required to go abroad without their families.

A publication prepared for the Army, meanwhile, reiterated charges of discrimination in the President's order and called upon Congress to enact legislation that would equalize restrictions on travel by including civilian tourists.

Foreign Aid Money JFK's Big Problem

Boston - (UPI) - A key adviser to President-elect John F. Kennedy said Saturday that financing the United States' foreign aid commitments would be the No. 1 problem facing the incoming administration.

Dr. John Kenneth Galbraith, Harvard economics professor, said that the money necessary to finance the "sort of foreign policy we need" would have to come through development of a more favorable balance of trade.

Galbraith told the New England Society of Newspaper Editors that there would be "many other headaches" such as farm legislation but that evening the balance of trade — promoting exports over imports — probably would be the biggest problem.

Goldwater Issues Call for GOP Unity

Washington - (UPI) - Sen. Barry Goldwater, (R-Ariz.), Saturday said this is no time for Republicans to quibble over who is party leader, but a time for unity to build party strength.

The statement by Goldwater, leader of the GOP conservative wing, followed reports of rivalry between Richard M. Nixon and New York Gov. Nelson Rockefeller and a subsequent unity meeting here Thursday between these two leaders.

"Who is to be titular head of the Republican party doesn't make much difference," Goldwater said in a statement released by his office. "What actually is important is who will be the working head during the next two years."

Smith Urges GOP To Unseat Morse

Salem, Ore. - (UPI) - Former Oregon Governor Elmo Smith today urged the Republican party to concentrate on a positive campaign in an attempt to unseat Oregon Democratic Sen. Wayne Morse in 1962.

Smith, unsuccessful GOP candidate against Democrat Maurice Neuberger for Oregon's other senate seat in the Nov. 8 election, made the statement at a Republican state central committee meeting.

Smith urged the Republicans to nominate their best possible candidate and then to spend the entire election campaign telling Oregon's voters the candidate's caliber by drawing contrasts with Morse.

Morse will be seeking his third term in the Oregon senate in 1962. In 1956, he defeated the late Douglas McKay, former governor of the state.

Smith said Morse, who lost in the state's presidential primary to Sen. John F. Kennedy last May, was still popular with the people of Oregon and it would be a tough political battle.

MISSILE HITS TARGET
Elgin Air Force Base, Fla. - (UPI) - The Air Force announced Friday a B-57 bomber intercepted and destroyed a high-flying pilotless jet bomber 172 miles from its launching site. The target plane was flying at more than 500 miles an hour at about 35,000 feet altitude.
