

Philadelphia Beats Cards To Clinch Eastern Diadem

The Philadelphia Eagles, inspired by the "fidgety one," celebrated their first National Football League Eastern division title in 11 years today, but it's anybody's guess who they'll play in the championship game on Dec. 26, Jan. 1 or Jan. 8.

Eagle Point Quint Clips MC 46-36

Eagle Point—Applying a full court press to advantage and hitting a fair percentage of their shots, the Eagle Point high school boys' basketball team won the first round of the season Saturday night. They tripped Myrtle Creek 46 to 36 at Myrtle Creek.

It was the first Eagle win in some five years over the Vikings.

EP took the lead in the first quarter and held it the rest of the way. They had 11 to 6, 25 to 17 and 38 to 27 period advantages.

Mike Palm and Tom Perdue each got 10 points for the Eagles and Smith had 10 for the Vikings. The Eagles had 34 to 27 margin in rebounds with Dick Wilson and Gary Ayres each pulling down seven. Halverson had six for Myrtle Creek.

The Vikings out-averaged EP from the field 34.2 to 32.6 but a good Eagle defense limited to fewer shooting opportunities.

Myrtle Creek was 44 to 24 winner in the junior varsity scuffle.

With Norm Van Brocklin, the "fidgety one," taking advantage of every opportunity, and Coach Buck Shaw, the "quiet man," telling them they could do it, the Eagles defeated the pesky St. Louis Cardinals, 20-6, Sunday for their ninth straight victory that nulled down the Eastern division title.

Van Brocklin, who admits to nervousness in the minutes just before the start of a game (and he's a veteran of 12 pro seasons), threw touchdown passes of 22 and 25 yards to Pete Retzlaff and Tommy McDonald and Bobby Walston kicked a pair of field goals for all the Philadelphia points that assured the Eagles of a title berth for the first time since 1949—when they also won the NFL championship by beating the Los Angeles Rams.

Meanwhile, in the Western division, the Detroit Lions defeated the defending champion Baltimore Colts, 20-15, the Green Bay Packers won the Chicago Bears, 41-13, and the San Francisco Forty Niners beat the Los Angeles Rams, 23-7, to create a three-way first-place tie between the Packers, Colts and Forty Niners.

All three clubs have identical 6-4 win-loss records and each has two games left to play. And to add further to the logjam, the Bears, with a 5-4-1 mark, are only a half-game away from the Lions, at 5-5, are one game behind.

Dallas, beaten in 10 straight games in its first season in the NFL, turned the tables on the Giants Sunday by holding the defending Eastern division champs to a 31-31 tie, while the Browns took a half-game lead over New York in the battle for a berth in the "runner-up bowl" game at Miami Jan. 8 by beating the Washington Redskins, 27-16.

In the American Football league, the Dallas Texans delayed the clinching of the Eastern division title by Houston with a 24-0 shutout over the Oilers; the Los Angeles Chargers clinched at least a tie for the Western division title by whipping the Oakland

Ashland—Fortuna, Calif., high pulled away from a poor shooting Ashland team in the third quarter at Fortuna Saturday night and trimmed the Grizzlies 49-35 to 35.

It was the second setback of the week end for Ashland, which lost 59 to 38 Friday night at Eureka, Calif.

The Ashlanders on Friday jumped off to a 7 to 6 lead over Eureka. This was the standing midway in the first stanza. But the Grizzlies could not score again until 5 1/2 minutes had been played in the second panel. By this time the Loggers had built a 31 to 7 command.

Quarter leads for Eureka were 17 to 7, 32 to 14 and 51 to 24. John Murray had 15 points for Eureka and Larry Sample 12. John Mott tallied 12 and Jerry Hauck 10 for Ashland.

Ashland jayvees fared better, downing Eureka 36 to 02 and Fortuna 35 to 22 in preliminaries. Tod Hess had 11 points each night for the Ashlanders.

Phoenix—Phoenix High school's Pirates turned the tables on the Illinois Valley basketball team on Saturday night.

They beat the Cougars 45 to 38 at Cave Junction. IV won Friday at Phoenix 43 to 40.

In the Saturday fracas Phoenix took the lead permanently at 27 to 25 with Tom Johnson set shot midway through the third quarter and eight-point differences in the final quarter were the widest of the game.

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Red Raiders Subdue Vikings in Tourney

Willamette University, Salem—Gordy Carrigan sparked Southern Oregon college to third place in the NAIA basketball tipoff tourney as the Raiders beat Portland State college 55-53 in overtime here Saturday night.

Carrigan hit the game tying field goal in the final 35 seconds to push the contest into the extra session besides scoring four points more to lead the victory.

It was clearly Carrigan's night as he won high point honors with 18 and pushed his career total at Southern Oregon to 1,007 in just over two seasons.

Southern Oregon had to come from behind in the final five minutes to win the contest. It was never ahead before that time. SOC did knot the score twice midway in the second half when Brad Flannery hit a gift toss for 34-34. Moments later Carrigan hit the field goal that gave him 1,001 points to again tie the mark at 36. PSC took over again when Don Powell hit a jumper.

Shults Starts Rally
Medford frosh Jerry Shults started the comeback which saw SOC score nine points while the Vikings managed only two in the final drive. Shults hit a free toss followed by Tichenor's jumper bringing the Raiders within three points at 39-42 with 8:16 remaining.

Flannery added a two-point and twice more Tichenor hit to put the Raiders ahead 45-44 with 4:50 showing on the clock. Don Vannice tallied a pair of free throws but reserve Vik Gary Morton hit a jumper to close the gap to 47-46. Less than a minute later Morton hit another to give PSC an edge of 48-47.

Another Viking reserve, Tony Williams, added a gift toss for a two point edge to set the stage for Carrigan's field goal which forced the game into overtime.

Carrigan hit the go-ahead shot off a three-man weave before a minute of the overtime had elapsed as the Raiders went ahead to stay 51-49. With 2:40 left Vannice dropped in two free throws which ran the lead to four points. PSC's Morton cut the gap to 53-51 but Carrigan left no doubt with a pair of free throws when the clock showed 56 seconds left.

PSC Leads at Half
PSC's Powell hit a jumper in the waning seven seconds. Halftime showed Portland

State with a 30-22 lead and a 12-6 lead in field goals as SOC hit only 23 per cent in the first half. In the same time the Vikes hit 46 per cent.

Final statistics gave SOC an edge in field goal percentage 35.8 to PSC's 32.6 as each team hit 19. The Raiders held the deciding free throw margin 17-15.

Don Bridges and Powell shared high point honors for PSC with 11 each while Bridges had 12 rebounds for game honors.

Tichenor was runnerup to Carrigan with 11 besides pulling down seven rebounds. SOC was on the short end in the rebounds as Portland hauled down 48 to the 32 total for the Raiders.

Coach Ted Schopf issued praise for the poise his SOC ball players used in coming from behind. "We had to do this in the two games we won, and it is surprising to see this so early in the season with a young team," he said.

Next action for the Raiders will be a two game series in Ashland next Friday and Saturday night against Chico State college.
