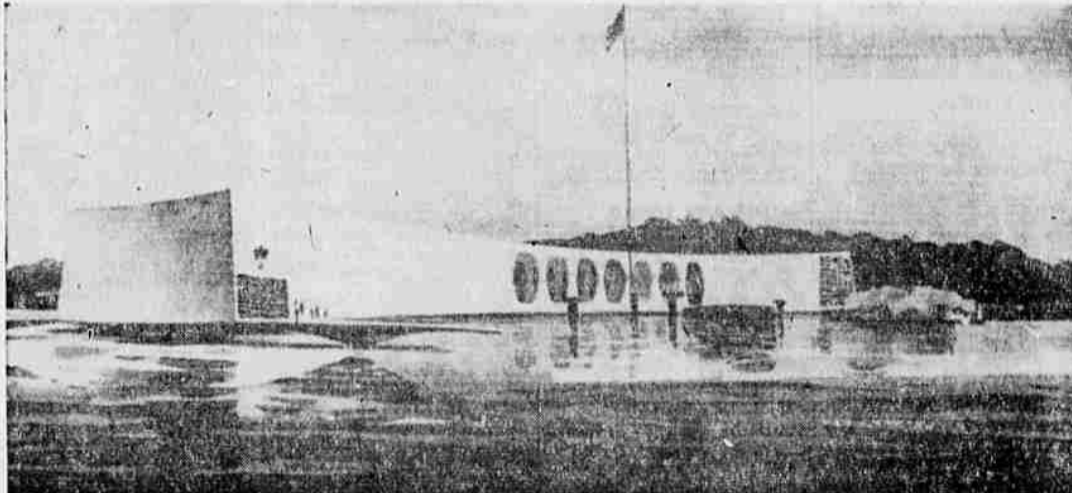

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Battleship Arizona Still Lies in Pearl Harbor; Memorial Funds Lacking

Pearl Harbor — "Good morning, ladies and gentlemen, and welcome to Pearl Harbor." With those words a young sailor greets more than 50,000 visitors yearly on boat tours that annually become more popular despite the fact it has been 19 years since "Remember Pearl Harbor" became a world-wide battle cry. The high point of a visit to Pearl Harbor is the battleship Arizona, which lies much as the Japanese bombs left her. She was sunk at her berth along once famed "Battleship Row" with more than 1,100 officers and men entombed in the twisted wreckage. Construction finally has begun on a \$500,000 memorial for the site. But after several public appeals and fund-raising campaigns the Pacific War Memorial commission still lacks \$200,000 needed to complete the building.

Chaplin told his fellow editors, "I am writing to you on behalf of more than 1,100 heroes. They went down with the battleship USS Arizona in Pearl Harbor on that fateful December 7th just 19 years ago. Their remains are still entombed in the sunken hull of the ship, barely protruding above the water. In contrast to the magnificent monuments at other revered battle-grounds, their final resting place is a rusted mess of junk, a disgrace to the nation. I am writing because as one who has stood on the rusted hull of the USS Arizona, like thousands of others, visitors and local residents, I feel that no memorial to our war dead could be more fitting than to complete the enshrinement of the USS Arizona."

Today, more than 1,100 still remain entombed in her rusting hulk... there is every rank and rate aboard from a rear admiral to an apprentice seaman. The rear admiral is Isaac C. Kidd, Commander on Board. "The story goes that he was killed when trying to repel the enemy with a machine gun. The Arizona's commanding officer, Capt. Franklin Van Valkenburgh, is also on board. "The flag pole used to rest on her main deck house before it was cut away for the memorial. At the base of the flag staff there was a small plaque dedicated to the men aboard the ship. It is being preserved and will be placed in the memorial. "It's a simple tribute from one sailor to another. The inscription reads 'dedicated to the eternal memory of our

in action. From today on the USS Arizona will again fly our country's flag just as proudly as she did on 7 December 1941. I am sure the Arizona's crew will know and appreciate what we are doing. May God make His face to shine upon them, and grant them peace."

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Governor Denies Straub's Charges

Salem — Gov. Mark Hatfield Saturday vigorously denied charges by Oregon Democratic Chairman Robert Straub that Hatfield had failed to live up to his 1958 campaign promises. Straub, commenting on Hatfield's 1961-63 budget, said Hatfield's request for an additional \$46 million was one of the sharpest increases of any recent biennium. To this Hatfield replied that the overall increase of 14.6 per cent in the general fund that he is asking is the exact same increase requested in 1959-61. In response to Straub's charge that Hatfield failed to cut the budget, the governor declared that he did cut the budget from that requested by the previous administration. "I am carrying forth my campaign promises in toto," Hatfield declared. "We are holding the tax line and seeking to reduce taxes with this new budget." Hatfield termed Straub's remarks as the beginning of a "smokescreen."

Child-Raising Experts Leaning To Spank 'em School of Thought

New York — Contemporary child-raising philosophy swings between two extremes: the spank 'em thinkers and the powder-puffers. In the latter category are the free or permissive thinkers — the experts who claim "let 'em alone and they'll grow up without complexes." It's the "oddie 'em" school of thought. After a lot of permissive experimentation, American child-raising experts currently lean, more or less, to the spank 'em school — the school holding that the rod and discipline shouldn't be spared. Even the American Academy of Pediatrics recently said it's okay to whack children now and then. But just at this crucial period when it seems we're settling down to one firm school of thought, there comes from across the Atlantic a whole new wave of permissive-type propaganda to unsettle parents. Radical Approach. It's another child-raising book — if you have room on your bookshelf for one more! It's called "Summerhill — A Radical Approach To Child Rearing."

The philosophy behind the Summerhill approach is that discipline, dogmatically imposed, and punishment creates fear — and fear creates hostility. Neill claims that extensive disciplining of children is harmful and thwarts sound psychic development. Parents Mess Job. Headmaster Neill states further that he believes most parents make a mess of the job of raising children. He contends that the teaching of discipline, respect and morals results in damaging children. "We are bringing up a race of neurotics who are beating a path to the couches of psychiatrists," he says. "It is only in an atmosphere of love and approval — without adult pressure — that children grow in self-discipline into well-adjusted, mature adults."

Harold H. Hart, publisher of the English educator's "radical" book, said Neill's way of handling children is quite different from what most people sneeringly brush aside as permissive. SEEKS JOHNSON'S SEAT

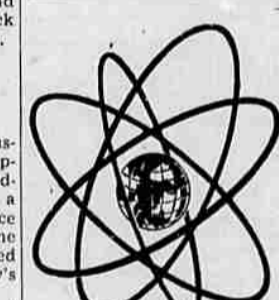
