Family wash-and-wear can drip there quietly and harmlessly, to the delight of the homemakers who request this novel feature.

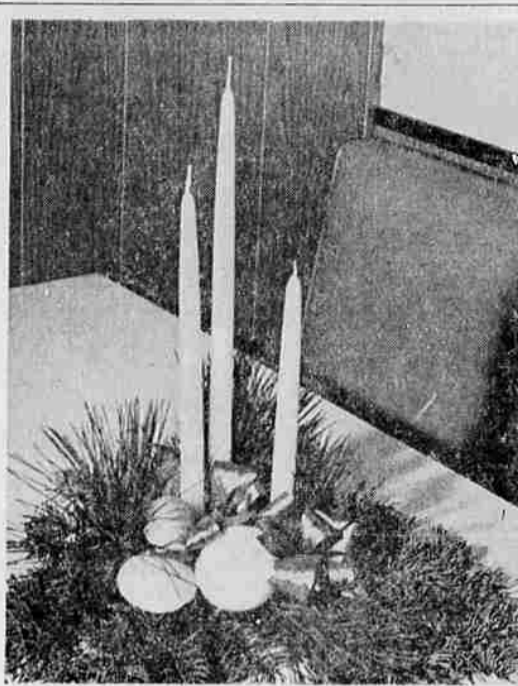

Artists who were "too late, too lazy or too lousy" to qualify for the first annual area competition show of Rogue Valley Art association are being invited to enter works in the "First Annual Poor Losers' Show." Dreamed up in high spirit by two Medford men - with tongues in cheeks - this novel event will serve the two-fold purpose of calling attention to the serious show at Rogue gallery, which opened Sunday and will continue for three weeks, and will swell the treasury of the association.

The two men, Robertson E. Collins and James M. Ragland, both devoted members of the Art association, have announced that the Poor Losers' show will be held at the Galeria de Rejection in the Medford hotel Sunday, December 11.

Artists, for an entry fee of \$2, may bring any or all pictures they may care to have their friends and public see. Everything - the sponsors stress - will be shown. Entries are to be taken to the Galeria de Rejection between 1 and 2:30 p.m. and "any sales must be handled by you."

The sponsors have even arranged for "impartial judges" - three six-year-old children. In addition, the gallery favorite will be chosen by popular vote, at 25 per cent per vote.

- Q.** Who can get Social Security Survivors payments?
- A.** Survivors payments can go to:
1. Unmarried children under 18 years of age.
  2. Children, 18 or over, if they were disabled before reaching 18, and have remained so since.
  3. A widow, of any age, if she is caring for a child entitled to payments.
  4. A widow at age 62, whether or not there is a child entitled to payments.
  5. A dependent widower at age 65.
  6. Dependent parents (Father 65, Mother 62).
  7. A divorced wife, if, before the deceased's death she is dependent upon him for her support pursuant to a court order or agreement, and if she has in her care his child who is also entitled to payments.
- \*\* For an aged widow or widower to get benefits, the marriage must have been in effect for at least one (1) year.
- Q.** Can a person receive combined benefits if they become entitled to monthly benefits based on the social security accounts of more than one insured worker?
- A.** Not! The amount they will receive each month will be no more than the largest of the benefits. For example, a child who becomes entitled to child's benefits based on the earnings of both his father and mother, could receive the larger benefit, but not both. ## Artificial Wreaths May Be Refurbished
