

Crater High Preps Zone For Stayton

Central Point-Crater high's basketball aggression is turning its offense to move against zone defense as it preps for a two game series and the first play on its home court this season.

The Comets will play Stayton from the Salem area on Friday and Saturday evenings.

Crater Coach Lloyd Hoffine said that Stayton is expected to employ a zone defense against his team. The Comets are, nevertheless giving some attention to attack against man-to-man guarding.

Dennis Edwards, rugged 6-3 center for the Comets, missed both Monday and Tuesday workouts because of a bad cold, Hoffine reports.

Stayton took part in a jam-boree last week end and opened its regular play last night, dropping a 27 to 25 nod to Mt. Angel. Crater beat Eagle Point last Friday 65 to 47.

There will be three games for Crater teams both on Friday and Saturday. Comet freshmen will play the Rogue River Junior varsity at 4:30 p.m. Friday. The jayvees will meet the RR varsity at 6:30 p.m. The Crater-Stayton varsity game will follow at 8 p.m. Butte Falls teams will provide the opposition for Crater fresh and junior varsity in the same schedule of play on Saturday.

Teams Get 'First Look'

St. Petersburg, Fla. - (UPI) - Lenoir Rhyne and Humboldt State college, which meet in the annual Holiday Bowl Saturday night, got their first look at each other today.

They will decide the official National Association of Intercollegiate Athletics (NAIA) title here after winning berths in playoff games last Saturday.

Lenoir Rhyne, from Hickory, N. C. and Humboldt, from Eureka, Calif., are located some 3,000 miles apart and neither had laid eyes on the other until today.

The Bears from Lenoir Rhyne arrived Monday night. The Lumberjacks got here today.

Lenoir Rhyne, which lost 20-7 to Texas A&M in last year's Holiday Bowl, finally got to see some movies of the Lumberjacks in action Tuesday afternoon. The Bears later went through some light drills.

Coach Clarence (Stas) Stasovich of Lenoir Rhyne said he knew nothing about the Lumberjacks, except they were undefeated this season. Coach Phil Sarboe of Humboldt said all he knew about Lenoir Rhyne was that it used a single wing attack - and he hadn't come up against that formation in the 10 years he had been coaching at the California school.

Hoy Hughes, Cal Poly athletic director, said he requested the cancellations because his teams of the next two or three years would be composed principally of freshmen and sophomores.



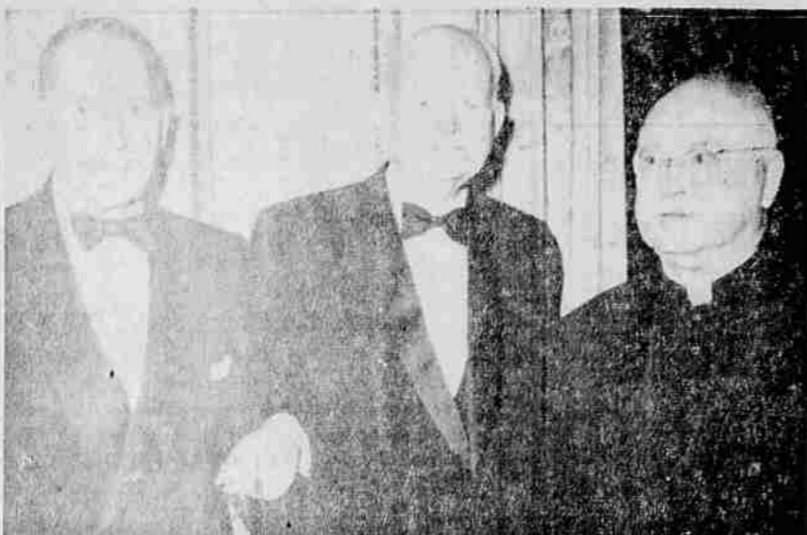

Grid Hall Place Given To Hoover

New York - (UPI) - Former President Herbert Hoover, who once forgot to supply the Stamford team he managed with a football, was honored along with nine of the game's immortals Tuesday night at the third annual awards dinner of the National Football Foundation and Hall of Fame.

Hoover, 86, told the audience he has unsuccessfully "wrecked my memory for some justification of your generosity" but received a gold medal award anyway. There he told some humorous stories dating back 60 and more years to his days as a student football manager at Stanford University.

Accepts MacArthur Bowl - Nine former stars were formally inducted into the Hall of Fame during the ceremonies and Murray Warmath, coach at the University of Minnesota, accepted the MacArthur Bowl awarded annually to the nation's top college football team.

Those inducted into the Hall of Fame were Fred (Buz) Burries of Navy, Charles (K) Aldrich of Texas Christian, Charles Gelbert of Pennsylvania, Gordon Locke of Iowa, Johnny Lujack of Notre Dame, Sid Luckman of Columbia, Neil Snow of Michigan, Clyde (Butch) Turner of Harvard-Simmons and Lou Little of Columbia.

Eight current stars also received \$500 fellowships for graduate study from the foundation. They were Al Rozycki of Dartmouth, Paul Beckner of Rutgers, Ed Dyas of Auburn, John Easterbrook of Missouri, Jerry Mays of Southern Methodist, Bruce Henry of Colorado School of Mines and Borcy Bullard of Washington.

Federal Commission May Be Needed For Boxing Regulation

Washington - (UPI) - Sen. Estes Kefauver, D-Tenn., said today a federal athletic commission might be needed to fight gangster elements in boxing.

Kefauver, chairman of the Senate boxing investigation, deplored the idea of setting up another new government bureau. But he said Congress might have to take the step to get more "honesty and uniform regulations" into the sport.

Kefauver's antitrust and monopoly subcommittee continued hearings today on underworld influence in boxing. Scheduled to testify were New York Manager Herman (Hymie the Mink) Wallman, former middleweight and welterweight champion Carmen Basilio, and Jack Kearns, who once managed heavyweight champion Jack Dempsey.

Keep Out Racketeers

The proposed federal commission would license managers, promoters and matchmakers, and regulate boxing generally to see that everything was kept clean, including televised fights.

Racketeers would not be able to obtain licenses and could be sent to prison if they were convicted of operating behind "front-men."

"The idea has much to speak for it and will receive serious consideration," Kefauver told United Press International.

Wallman said Tuesday that he was told racketeer Frankie Carbo had controlled virtually all matches in Madison Square Garden since 1952.

Although protesting, Wallman agreed with chief staff investigator John G. Bonomi that Carbo controlled his

fighters' matches through Bill Brown, who became a matchmaker in 1952, succeeding Al Weill. Later Bonomi read testimony that all bouts in Madison Square Garden were arranged by Carbo through Brown.

Underworld Boxing Czar

Carbo, now in a New York state prison on a conviction as an undercover manager and matchmaker, has been described in previous congressional testimony as the underworld czar of boxing. Bonomi, a former New York County assistant district attorney, conducted the investigation which led to his indictment.

Another witness, ex-New York fight promoter William Rosensohn, bitterly acknowledged he evidently was used as a "front-man" by the underworld when he staged the first Floyd Patterson-Ingemar Johansson heavy-weight title fight last year.

Rosensohn called the fight game "a fierce juggle" in which he was forced by circumstances to accept as a partner, Anthony (Fat Tony) Salerno, described by Senate investigators as "a powerful policy racketeer." Rosensohn

Slip Madigan Suffers Attack

Oakland, Calif. - (UPI) - Edward P. (Slip) Madigan, former coach of the famed Galloping Gaels of St. Mary's, was reported in critical condition today after a heart attack.

The attack occurred Tuesday while he was undergoing a physical check-up in his doctor's office.

Madigan, 65, coached St. Mary's from 1921 through 1939 and brought the Gaels to national prominence as a collegiate grid power.

After leaving St. Mary's, he became affiliated with Golden Gate Fields race track and later managed the Los Angeles Dons of the All-America Conference. For the last 10 years, he and his son have managed a home building firm.

By DICK JOYCE United Press International There's powerful evidence today that Frank McGuire is building himself a notch in "Yankee powerhouse" at North Carolina like the one that stormed unbeaten to the NCAA basketball title in 1957.

The fifth-ranked Tar Heels, led by a pair of New Yorkers - Doug Moe and York LaRose - scored their second straight victory Tuesday night in outclassing Virginia, 81-47.

Moe, a senior from Brooklyn, tossed in 20 points and LaRose, also a senior and a native of New York City, clicked for 15 points as North Carolina built up a 45-21 halftime advantage and then won going away.

McGuire, who persuaded some of the East's top high school prospects to heed his words of "go south, young man," during his eight-year reign, is hoping for some of the success which took place during the 1955-57 campaign. Then his Yankees took a quiet hit the jackpot with 23 consecutive victories.

Bonnies, Wildcats Win St. Bonaventure and Cincinnati, other teams ranked among the top 10, strengthened positions with triumphs Tuesday night.

The Bonnies, tied for sixth in the rankings, chalked up their 94th straight home-court victory in downing Villa Madonna, 93-73. All-America Tom Stith, heir-apparent to Oscar Robertson's national scoring title, poured in 32 points as the Bonnies won their third consecutive game of the season.

Cincinnati made it three-for-three by defeating Miami (Ohio) 70-62. Tom Thacker's three-point play and Bob Wiesenbahn's five straight free throw clinched the victory for the Bearcats, ranked No. 8.
