

Christmas Bureau Has Names for Holiday Baskets

Individuals or organizations desiring names of families to whom Christmas baskets may be sent may obtain names from the Christmas bureau at the Red Cross office, 86 Hawthorne ave., Medford, the bureau has announced.

The bureau is made up of a committee from the Red Cross, Salvation Army and public welfare agencies, and is a project of the Jackson County Inter-Agency Council. It will serve as a clearing house for distributing Christmas baskets.

All organizations, service groups, clubs, churches and individuals have been asked to clear the names of families for whom they plan baskets with the Christmas bureau of office at SPRING 2-4405.

Avoids Duplication. "This will be necessary," the bureau said, "in order to avoid duplication of giving. In the past many families have received several baskets, while other worthy ones have been left out."

Before food baskets are delivered, all families will be visited by a member of the bureau to establish need. Any one knowing of a needy family is asked to submit the name and address to the bureau as early as possible.

Any one wishing to donate clothes, hats, poultry, canned goods or other food items for Christmas baskets may contact the bureau. Pick up items is available. Cans of food may be sent to schools by parents. The food will be collected by Red Cross representatives from schools and packed into Christmas baskets.

Deadline for sending canned goods to school is Dec. 16 in order to assure ample time in which to pack and distribute the baskets.

Foreign Liquor To Be Available At Service Clubs
Washington—The Defense Department, exuding some holiday season cheer, announced today that foreign-made liquor and beer by the drink will not be stopped at U.S. overseas military clubs.
Drinks and food to be consumed on the premises were among three exceptions granted to the Dec. 1 ban on purchase of foreign goods at military stores and clubs.
The other exceptions will permit purchases of foreign goods on which American customs have been paid, and of spare parts for foreign-built equipment such as air conditioners, plumbing, and cast registers.

CRITICISM OF LITERATURE BOOK USED IN OREGON SCHOOLS HEARD
Salem—A fight in Tigard over a literature textbook was brought before the Oregon Textbook Commission Tuesday and pros and cons of the volume were presented at a three-hour public hearing here.
Bulk of the session was devoted to criticism of "Adventures to Today," a ninth-grade text approved by the commission and now in use in many Oregon junior and senior high schools.
Mrs. James Willock of Tigard was the chief critic of the book, using the term "trash in the classroom." She also said "... some of the authors in this book have been listed on numerous American activities groups."
Dr. John Watkins of Tigard, chief psychologist at the veterans hospital in Portland, defended the book and criticized what he termed "book burners" and "witch hunters."
Cites Lincoln, Bible.
Watkins said if you "look for evil" you can find it out of context even in the writings of Abraham Lincoln, Omar Khayyam, William Shakespeare, Benjamin Franklin and The Bible.
He was backed up by Mrs. David Paul, Tigard, who said the "good of the book far outweighs the objectionable portions."
Mrs. James Aitken, Tigard, presented letters to the editor that had appeared in various newspapers criticizing the book.
Lloyd Millhollen of Eugene, chairman of the local territorial districts choose the material for their own schools and the commission cannot dictate what texts are used.
The master list is flexible so local districts can decide which books are best for the area, he said.
Book Once Dropped
The controversy over Adventures to Today centers in Tigard. The local school board dropped the book, then reinstated it recently.
Millhollen agreed that some parts "don't add anything" to the book but he said he would not favor eliminating textbooks just because a few parts are objected to. Other commissioners agreed.
Millhollen also said he would not favor elimination of authors from textbooks merely because their names appeared on an un-American activities list.
The state has a contract with the publisher of Adventures to Today through 1963, Millhollen said.
"It is very difficult to get books that I please everybody," he said.
