Arrest, Extradition Of Girl Sought in California Slaying

Ukiah, Calif.—(UPI)—Mendocino county authorities today sought the arrest and extradition of a brunette girl for the slaying of former University of California basketball star Perry Ten Eyck.

The shapely suspect, Mary Catherine Hampton, 19, Sandy Hook, Ky., now is a state's witness in a murder case at Gooding, Idaho.

Sheriff Reno Bartolome said he had issued a murder warrant against the girl on the strength of a confession made at Raiford, Fla., by Emmett Spencer, 29, convicted killer now awaiting electrocution at the Florida State Prison for the slaying of John T. Keen, 56, Key West dock worker, April 14, 1960.

Miss Hampton testified Wednesday at Gooding against Roger Hall, 22, a Crescent City bartender, in the murder of Dr. John Hunt, Portland, a forest pathologist and a Yale graduate.

Bartolome said the combined confessions of Spencer and Hall and the testimony of Miss Hampton revealed a strange tangled picture of murder involving the three.

Picked Up Hitch-Hiker
It started Aug. 15, 1959, when Ten Eyck, 53, was driving to his home in Alameda, Calif., after a visit with friends in Whittier. Ten Eyck was captain of the University of California basketball team in 1929 and a member of a prominent East San Francisco Bay family. He was in semi-retirement and estranged from his wife.

Ten Eyck started home along the Pasadena Freeway and stopped to pick up the girl and Spencer, who were hitch-hiking. The three stopped that night at a motel in Sunnyvale, Calif.

It was there "We decided to kill him," Bartolome quoted Spencer as confessing. Spencer said Miss Hampton had suggested robbery at first.

The next morning, the girl and Spencer talked Ten Eyck into driving them to Oregon. Bartolome said that just north of Ukiah, the girl urged closer to Ten Eyck and moved him to pull to the side of the road.

Ten Eyck assertedly stopped the car and started to get out. Spencer said the girl pulled a pistol from her purse and hit the 210-pound former athlete over the head. Spencer took the weapon and pistol whipped Ten Eyck unconscious.

"I think that's the one that killed him," Spencer said. They drove the car to Crescent City, Calif., where the machine was abandoned. The two rented an apartment.

Made Trip to Idaho
Bartolome said the girl testified she first met Hall in Crescent City. All three drove into Idaho Aug. 24, where they decided to stage a hold-up. They stopped Dr. Hunt, who was driving along Highway 30 in his station wagon.
