Hollywood—(UPI)—What happens to a television star when her entire family is wiped out over night? Jane Wyatt had that happen to her when "Father Knows Best" was yanked from the air. Comparing it with the loss of a real family isn't entirely superficial. Jane in the role of Margaret Anderson lived and worked with her TV family five days a week, 12 hours a day for six years. The highly rated show was a way of life for the cast. They became closer than most real life families. Felt Double Life. "I truly had a feeling of living a double life with two families. I treated the children on the show as if they were my own. Lauren Chapin was only 8 when we began. Billy Gray was 15 and Elinor Donahue 16. Jane, whose soft, gentle manners remind one of the role she played for so long, said she had hoped the series would continue until she and Young became TV grandparents. "Then the kids could have carried on the show by themselves with only occasional visits from Bob and me." The program is in prime-time reruns now, but no more "Father Knows Best" shows will be made again. Nevertheless, Jane keeps in close contact with the "family." Validation of Wechsler Study Sought in Action

Salem—(UPI)—The State Board of Education is scheduled to take action next Wednesday on a request from Portland school district No. 1 for a \$139,878 research grant to study validation of the Wechsler intelligence scale for children.

Application for the grant will be made to the U.S. Office of Education is approved by the board.

Mrs. Roberta Caldwell of Oregon city, chairman of the board's standing committee, has recommended approval.

The project would be carried out by the Portland school district and would seek to test "a number of assumptions upon which Wechsler intelligence scale results are made."

Two Day Meeting

The board will meet both Tuesday and Wednesday and its agenda includes action to authorize textbooks adopted by the State Textbook Commission for the years 1961-67 in the fields of art, home-making, music and social studies.

The board will hear a report on a hearing conducted by the textbook commission Tuesday at which a literature textbook was criticized as "trash."

The board will act on partial school district reorganization plans in Douglas, Deschutes, Marion, Polk and Wasco counties.

The board also will consider proposed legislation for the 1961 legislature and hear reports on progress of Oregon elementary schools in 1959-60 and Oregon's teacher education project.

Dr. McNeal Honored at SOC Society Ceremony

Ashland—Dr. Roy W. McNeal, Southern Oregon college professor of geography, was presented a plaque by the members of Theta Delta Phi, men's scholastic honorary society, which honored him as "Faculty Man of the Year" at a luncheon Wednesday in the Britt ballroom.

Larry Barleen, Klamath Falls student and president of TDP, who presided at the luncheon, announced that the award was the first to be given and that its presentation at the traditional "Hallelujah Festival and Free Barbecue," a luncheon provided each year for all male faculty members by the organization, would become an annual affair.

Dr. McNeal's selection, according to Barleen, was made upon the basis of high scholastic standards, service to the institution, and outstanding ability displayed as a scholar and a teacher. He joined the faculty in 1947 and was the first coach for the college.

SOC president, Dr. Elmo N. Stevenson, addressed the group on the subject of SOC expansion, its contemplated building program for the coming decade, and the need for every TDP member to work

hard to draw promising high school graduates to the college.

Others appearing on the program included Dr. Wayne W. Wells, SOC professor of science, emeritus; Ted Schopf,

basketball coach and one of the club advisers; and Dr. Arthur S. Taylor, chairman of the social science division, who spoke briefly and in humorous style, on the origins of the organization.

44 Rescued From Norwegian Vessel

Oslo, Norway—(UPI)—All 44 persons aboard the Norwegian tanker Havilde were rescued by other ships Wednesday night after a fire broke out. The vessel was reported still burning early today.

"A few women" were among those rescued, the Havilde's owners said. The tanker was carrying diesel fuel from Aden to Dakar.
