Ashland—With a rebuilding job facing him in his first year as wrestling coach at Southern Oregon college, Robert Bennett prepares his squad for its season opener next Saturday against Humboldt college at Arcata, Calif.

Only two lettermen were on hand at the initial practice sessions. However 15 other prospects are battling for positions on the squad and more are expected when the new term begins in January, reports Bennett.

Returnees from last year are senior Barry Pitts, a 177-pounder from Klamath Falls, and sophomore Jerry Hull, a 147-pounder from Grants Pass.

Competing with Hull for the 147-pound berth, however, are Bill Hartley, a junior from Klamath Falls, Ken Williams, a freshman from GP, and Ken Acheson, a Medford soph. Pitts is thus far unchallenged in the 177-pound division.

A pair of Ashland grapplers, sophomore Buzz Parker, and frosh Tracy Bowman, are the candidates in the 123-pound category.

In the 137-pound division, Medford soph Dave Aas, and John Lanier, a soph from GP, are the lone candidates.

Seeking the 157-pound berth are Jim Hicks, a junior from Roseburg, Ron Napier, a soph from South Eugene, and frosh Bill Rice, from Coos Bay.

Candidates in the 167-pound position are Gene Grisel and George Moses, a pair of freshmen from Grants Pass and Ashland, respectively.

Three heavyweight hopefuls in Tom Merton, a freshman from Medford, Tom Morris, a Medford sophomore, and Jess Munyon, a junior from Glendale who was a letterman on the squad two years ago, are vying for a starting spot against Humboldt.

Last season the Raider grapplers' lone victory was over Humboldt, reportedly stronger this year by the return of almost the entire 1959-60 squad.
