Building Reports Given For St. Mary's Parents

A second report on the progress of the school and church building expansion program of Sacred Heart parish was given Monday night at a meeting of the St. Mary's Grade School Parents' club.

John Lynch and Louis Rentz, members of the parish finance committee, displayed property layouts and sketches of the proposed new parochial high school to illustrate the various points while answering the group's questions.

It was explained that the architects, Edson and Pappas, are now working on the specifications for the high school and that if all schedules are met, the school will be ready to use next September. It probably will have 12 rooms in the first stage, divided into two wings with walking areas and covered locker space between, according to Mr. Lynch. An administration building added at one end will complete the U-shape of this plan.

In addition to the three structures already mentioned, this first phase of the expansion program will include a combination utility - music building. It is expected that these facilities will accommodate 250 or more students, and a third wing will be added when the capacity number is exceeded.

On Barnett Road The high school, and all other structures being considered in the long-range expansion program of Sacred Heart parish, will be located on a 23 acre tract off Barnett road on Black Oak drive. Parents' club members were invited to inspect the site.

Joe Zarosinski, president of the organization, announced that results of the school uniform vote showed a 5 to 1 preference for retaining uniform dress for the girls in the elementary grades. It was also determined that a majority of these mothers voting favor the girls wearing the present jumper style uniform for seven months of the school year and using conventional dress during September and May.

Mrs. Dean Pruett, chairman of room mothers, was in charge of the balloting. Nearly 85 per cent of the vote cards were returned for the tabulation, she said.

A date, Friday and Saturday of the first week of March, has been set for the club's annual rummage sale. This is the only fund-raising event sponsored by the group, and President Zarosinski stressed the importance of saving as much good rummage as possible for this sale. Pickup arrangements will be announced later, he said.

Project Reported Mrs. James Pullman reported that the parents' advent wreath project is nearly completed. Twenty-five dozen candles were obtained for the wreath kits this year, and only a few are still available.

Reports on the grade school basketball program were given by Duane Daley, coach, and John Rossi, athletic committee chairman. The seventh and eighth grade team has a 15 game schedule, Mr. Daley said. Athletic letters will be presented, according to the coach, in the spring after the completion of the competitive sports program for this school year.

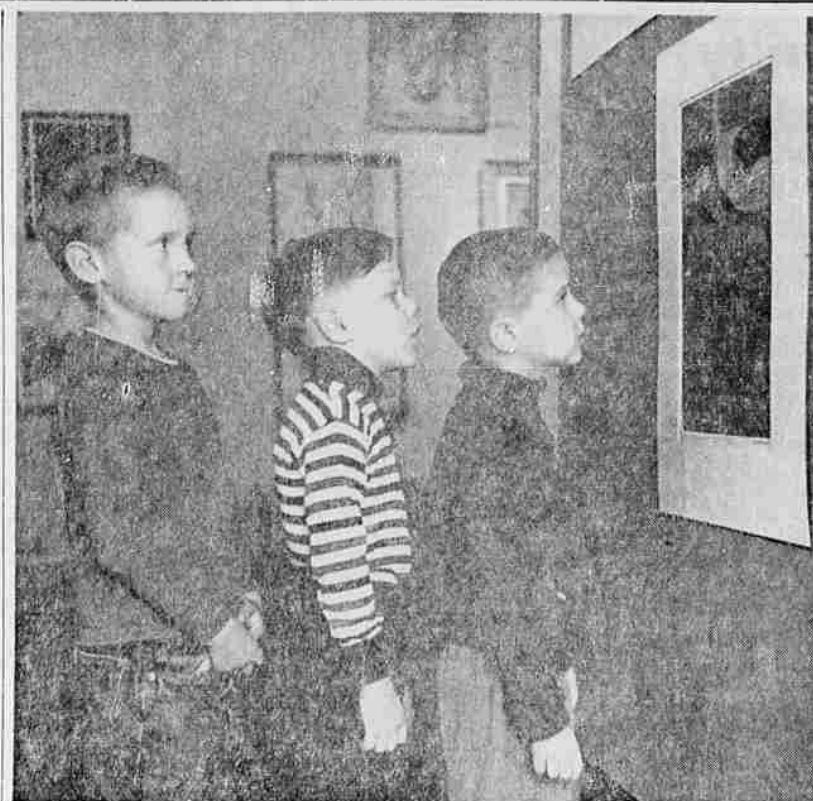
