SO Jayvees Go Against Siskiyou

Ashland—Southern Oregon college's junior varsity basketballers resume action tonight after splitting a pair of openers with Shasta Junior college last weekend.

The SOC juniors tangle with College of Siskiyou from Weed while on Saturday they host Medford National Guard in the opening contest of the Southern Oregon Independent league. Both games will be at 6:45 p.m. and both will be preliminaries to SOC-Chico State games.

Coach Al Atkins' squad, impressive in their season openers against Shasta, will have a limited squad ready for action this weekend. Injuries to starters Jack Hennon and John Cook may prompt Atkins to insert some front-line reserves into the starting lineup.

Hennon, a sophomore from Eugene, led the way for the Jayvee victory Friday, scoring 14 points, but in the process re-injured an already ailing knee and may be sidelined for the season. Cook injured a leg in the Saturday fray and has been placed on the doubtful list.

One other starter, Larry Eickworth, has been moved up to the Raider varsity and thus removes one of the bigger Jayvee scoring threats. The smooth frosh from Marshfield scored 23 points in the Shasta series to rank second behind Larry Hink, another freshman, who leads with 25. Ranked third is sophomore center Fred Louk who has 19 while Cook and Steve DeFore both have 15.

tomorrow when they entertain Chico State college at 8 o'clock in the Raider gymnasium. Jayvee action begins at 6:45 p.m.

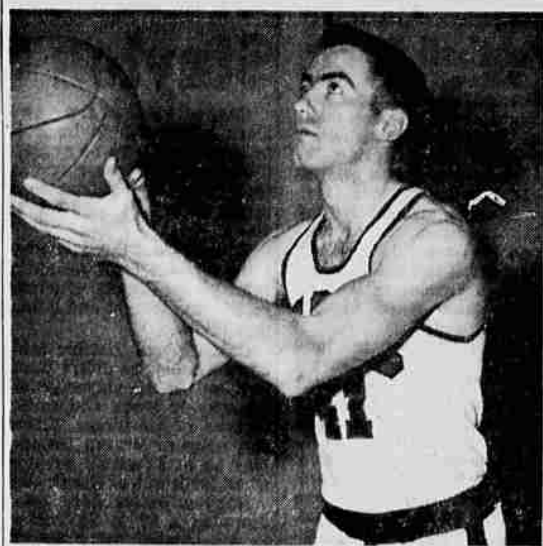
SOC's Red Raiders will be seeking to improve upon their 2-1 record which they earned in the NAIA tourney last week. Chico lost its first two games to Long Beach State and Santa Clara by scores of 63-53 and 49-37. Last night Chico played at Oregon Tech and dropped a 59-52 decision.

Chico's coach Gene Maxey will bring to SOC a first team composed of five juniors, led by 6-6 center Harold vonBargen and 6-2 forward Denny Varley. Guards Wilbur Smith at 5-9 and 6-2 Jerry Davis forward Jerry Miller at 6-3 round out the squad that averages 6-2.

Same Unit
Familiar to many local fans is Keith Calkins, star half-back on the Chico State football team when it played SOC here earlier this year. Calkins plays guard on the hoop squad and will be used alternately with Smith according to Maxey.

Raider coach Ted Schopf indicated he will go with the unit he finished with last week which saw Gordy Carriagan and Brad Flannery at the guards. Don Vannice and Dave Hughes will handle the front court and Earle Tichenor will be at center.

Freshman Larry Eickworth who was moved to the varsity earlier this week to replace the injured Dave Sharp has been earning Schopf's praise for his fine shooting and rebounding. Dave Graham will alternate at center with Tichenor while Dave Gardner, Jerry Shults, and Bob Jensen will provide added guard strength. Fred Louk, a 6-6 center, will also dress down with the varsity following Jayvee action.

Fayetteville, Ark., may be far back in the hills of the Ozarks—but word is out that the University of Arkansas basketball team could make a go of it in the Southwest conference this season.

The Razorbacks tuned up for the ensuing league play Thursday night by rolling over North Texas State, 94-80, for their second victory in three starts this season. Arkansas' loss came in overtime against Oklahoma State earlier this week.

The veteran Razorback squad, which didn't lose any of importance from last year's team, was led by 6-6 Allan Morrison, who collected 20 points on 10 field goals. Oscar Miller hit 11 of 18 field goal attempts and 28 points for North Texas State.

Barnum Gains One-Shot Lead

Coral Gables, Fla. — (UPI) — John Barnum, a 49-year-old home club pro who would "much rather be fishing," carried a one-shot lead into the second round of the \$20,000 Coral Gables Open golf championship today.

Barnum, a 6 foot 5 inch slugger from Grand Rapids, Mich., left all the "name" pros in the lurch with an explosive opening round of 32-33-65, six shots under par as the field tore the Biltmore Golf Club course to shreds in the opening round.

Thirty-six of the hopefuls smashed Biltmore's 35-36-71 par and one shot back of Barnum in the chase for \$2,000 first money came veteran teetotalist Marty Furgol and former PGA champion Jim Turnesa. Norris Admits Placing Mrs. Carbo on Payroll as Good Will Representative

Washington — (UPI) — Senate investigators vowed to "get down to cases" today in their questioning of millionaire sports promoter James D. Norris about his alleged control over pro boxing in league with the underworld.

The terse promise came from former New York Assistant District Attorney John G. Bonomi, who now is special counsel for Sen. Estes Kefauver's boxing inquiry.

Norris admitted during a closed-door session lasting more than two hours Thursday that he gave the wife of Frankie Carbo a \$45,000 job as a "good will representative."

She was put on the payroll, Norris said, after he sought but failed to receive advice from Carbo on how to "ease" problems troubling the International Boxing club (IBC). The problems were fighters and managers.

Underworld Boxing Czar

Bonomi, who sent Carbo to prison last year for being an undercover manager and matchmaker, said Carbo was known as the underworld czar of boxing and had great power among this group.

Norris said he had sought Carbo's help because Carbo "was on friendly terms with more fight managers than anyone in boxing."

Previous congressional testimony claimed that the relationship of the two men ripened into control of the fight game with Norris providing the money and Carbo the influence.

But Norris didn't see it that

way. He said he had to have certain contacts with underworld figures to get along in the boxing business.

Norris said he was "greatly embarrassed by certain newspapermen" who wrote stories about his "hoodlum associations."

"I am not a hero worshiper of hoodlums," he said. "I do not care any more for hoodlums than I am sure you do."

Kefauver allowed Norris to testify in private at the request of his doctors who feared that the tension of public hearing might bring on a fatal heart attack.

Norris used to be president of the IBC. The organization was dissolved by federal court order last year because it was a monopoly.

Seattle Chieftains Back On Maplecourt Warpath

The Seattle Chieftains, scalped by Los Angeles State last week, were back on the warpath again today.

Seattle murdered Pepperdine, 86-55, Thursday night at Seattle.

Few teams in the U.S. look better on paper than the men of Vince Cazzetta. Two centers are 6-foot-9 and 6-foot-11, and 6-foot-5 inch Ray Butler and playmaker Tommy Shaules are also around to help. Six-foot-6 inch Dave Mills, who scored 18 points per game last season, looks ready for another big year.

But the real key to Seattle hopes is Eddie Miles. The 6-foot-4 soph gained All-American high school raves at Little Rock, Ark., and plunked in 28 points per game for the frosh last year. He is already being compared to Johnny O'Brien and Elgin Baylor, Seattle All-Americans who led their team to national honors.

The press clippings did not mean much last week against Los Angeles State, however. Thursday night was a different story as the Chieftains piled up a 39-23 lead and hit 449 from the floor. Mills scored 20 and Miles 18.

Seattle is eligible for post-season play after a two-year ban and does not figure to lose to many more this year. Los Angeles State, in orbit after two impressive wins, was brought back to earth Thursday night by Arizona. The Wildcats found the free throw range to score a 82-90 win over the Diablos. Joe Skalsgir had 24 for the winners.
