# Algerian Students Rioting

Algiers, Algeria — (UPI) — Thousands of French students stormed through the streets of Oran and Algiers today in wild battles with police in protest against the arrival of Gen. Charles de Gaulle to plead for Algeria's semi-independence.

There were shouts of "De Gaulle to the gallows" and "keep Algeria French" by French colonials who have threatened to rebel against the president. Their militant French Algeria Front issued a defiant communique: "The moment has come. Tomorrow it will be too late."

The colonials called a general strike throughout Algeria while 10,000 students battled for hours in Algiers and 4,000 battled in Oran with police who used tear gas and clubs against them and brought up tanks to guard key intersections.

Algiers has always been the focal point for the "keep Algeria French" extremists and the rioting was the worst in many months. Youths from the universities surged through the streets, overturned and burned buses and cars and hurled rocks at the hard-pressed gendarmes.

Students fought a three-hour pitched battle with police in the heart of Algiers. After a brief lull they reformed their ranks and 2,000 of them attacked police along the Rue Michelet, the main thoroughfare which leads up from the harbor area through the main business district.

De Gaulle landed at Zenata Airfield near Tiemcen in extreme western Algeria, away from the storm centers of violence, but quickly ran into a demonstration at Ain Temouchent by both French and Moslems.

Later, in a speech he told the demonstrators their cries and clamor "signify nothing." He told them "This Algeria, your Algeria, is undergoing a transformation" of its souls and its personality and that an Algerian Algeria "appears a little more clearly every day."

Then in disdain for the demonstrators who shouted both for and against him, de Gaulle, dressed in the uniform of a general, walked through the milling crowd while special security guards and local gendarmes nervously fingered their weapons.

The speech at Ain Temouchent was his first major one of his six-day visit.

## Cuba Says Rocket Fragment Shower Part of U.S. Plot

Havana — (UPI) — Premier Fidel Castro's government charged Thursday night the accidental shower of rocket fragments that fell on eastern Cuba last week was part of a "tremendous U.S.-supported plot" against Cuba.

A protest note handed to U.S. Charge D'Affaires Daniel Braddock just before midnight took no notice of the U.S. request that the rocket fragments be returned for study. It had been reported earlier that the Castro regime might hand them over to Soviet space experts.

An unsuccessfully launched Thor-Able-Star rocket was destroyed in flight high over the Atlantic. An assortment of fragments fell in a farm area outside the city of Holguin.

Although no human casualties were caused and damage was minor, the Castro regime charged one of the fragments killed a cow.

The note was largely a rehash of Castroite charges blaming the United States for virtually every act of opposition to the Castro regime — which has been formally recognized as "Communist-controlled" by U.S. authorities.

Earlier reports from Central Cuba told of new fighting in the Corralillo area, 110 miles east of Havana, where a daylong battle between Castro troops and anti-government guerrillas was reported Tuesday.

**Using Heavy Mortars**  
The Castroites were reported using heavy mortars against their foes at Corralillo. There was no report of casualties, nor was there any indication of the size of the forces involved.

Corralillo lies in open country, less than 7 miles from the north coast, and there was speculation Thursday that the anti-government forces were "invaders." Reports from the scene, however, described them as inmates of a collective farm who had risen against the government.

The farmers were said to be angered by Castro's failure to improve their lot and by demands that they take military training during their free time.

The government, following the traditional Cuban custom of announcing only victories, made no official mention of the Corralillo battle.

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## Thornton Looks Into Dental Plan Decision

Salem — (UPI) — Attorney General Robert Y. Thornton said Thursday he is "reviewing" an opinion this week that the dental service plan offered by Dental Services, Inc., constitutes the "unauthorized practice of dentistry by a corporation."

Thornton said a hearing was held in Salem Thursday and attorneys for the corporation contended that Thornton's opinion "failed to take into account certain additional facts which the corporation's counsel considered to be of critical significance."

**Normal Practice**  
"This is our normal practice whenever a complaint is made by any citizen adversely affected by a ruling or opinion of this office," Thornton said. "We always hear the complainant's objections and review the opinion for possible error of facts or law."

In Portland, Robert J. Yeoman, president of Dental Services, Inc., said "We are naturally pleased with this latest action by the attorney general, and we are certain that when all the facts are brought before his office, the legality of Dental Services, Inc., will be established beyond doubt."

Yeoman said that many months had been spent in developing what he called the "family dental health plan" before a single membership was offered to the public.

## Charges Dismissed Against Kelsey

Charges against Theodore Ervin Kelsey, 40, a guest at the Cactus Motel, 934 South Riverside ave., were dismissed by the district court Wednesday after the district attorney had requested he be released from custody.

Kelsey was arrested by local authorities Saturday on charges of being a fugitive from justice. A warrant in Fresno, Calif., charged him with safe burglary.

During his arraignment in district court Monday, Kelsey requested a hearing on the fugitive charge. The hearing was set for Wednesday in district court. Tuesday, Kelsey's attorney, Robert H. Grant, filed a writ of habeas corpus, which was denied by Circuit Judge James M. Main.

Deputy District Attorney Brian Mullen reported that by the time of the hearing Wednesday they had received information that California authorities would not press charges against Kelsey due to insufficient evidence. It was then that Mullen asked the court to release Kelsey.

## Broiler Growers Hold Meeting Here

Charles Fisher, Oregon State college agriculturist, Corvallis, was among speakers at a meeting of the Rogue Valley Broiler Growers association recently in Medford.

Other speakers included Steve Brophy, manager of the Oregon State Fryer commission, Salem, and Burt Searl, Molalla, and David St. John, Gervais, commissioners.

The speakers pointed out that the fryer industry in Oregon exceeds 12 million birds per year. They compared the state industry with the industry in the east, where they had travelled recently.

They said that growers in Oregon must work to impress the public to purchase Oregon grown fryers.

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
