Notice Published Concerning Rights On Mining Claims

The bureau of land management has published notice for the forest service regarding the determination of surface rights on mining claims in two areas in southern Oregon and northern California.

One area is the Union B area in Douglas and Jackson counties, comprising an area almost as large as one township, and the other area is the Elliott C area in Siskiyou county, California.

Copies of the notices have been, or will be, delivered to persons whose names and addresses are determined as provided in the new law, the BLM said. The owner of a mining claim located prior to July 23, 1955, will have 150 days after the first publication to assert surface rights if he chooses to do so.

May Ignore Notices
The forest service said a claimant may ignore the notices thereby waiving rights to the surface until the claim goes to patent, yet maintaining his original mining rights. The claimant may file a verified statement asserting his rights to the surface, in which case his claim will be examined by mineral examiners.

If his rights are considered valid, the forest service will probably recognize such rights and not attempt to establish the public's rights to control the surface resources under the new law.

Claims of questionable validity will be considered before a hearing officer of the BLM, of the department of interior, which will make the final decision.

Whatever the decision, the claimant will retain his mineral rights, the forest service

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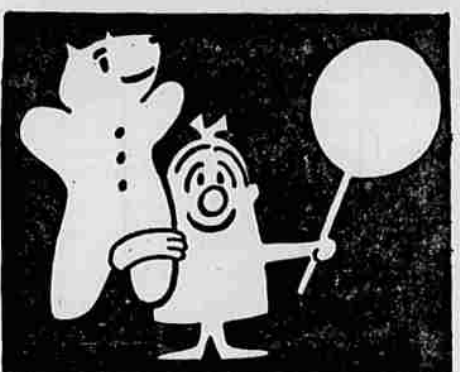
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
