Roll call, will be answered with each member telling her story of a remembered Christmas.

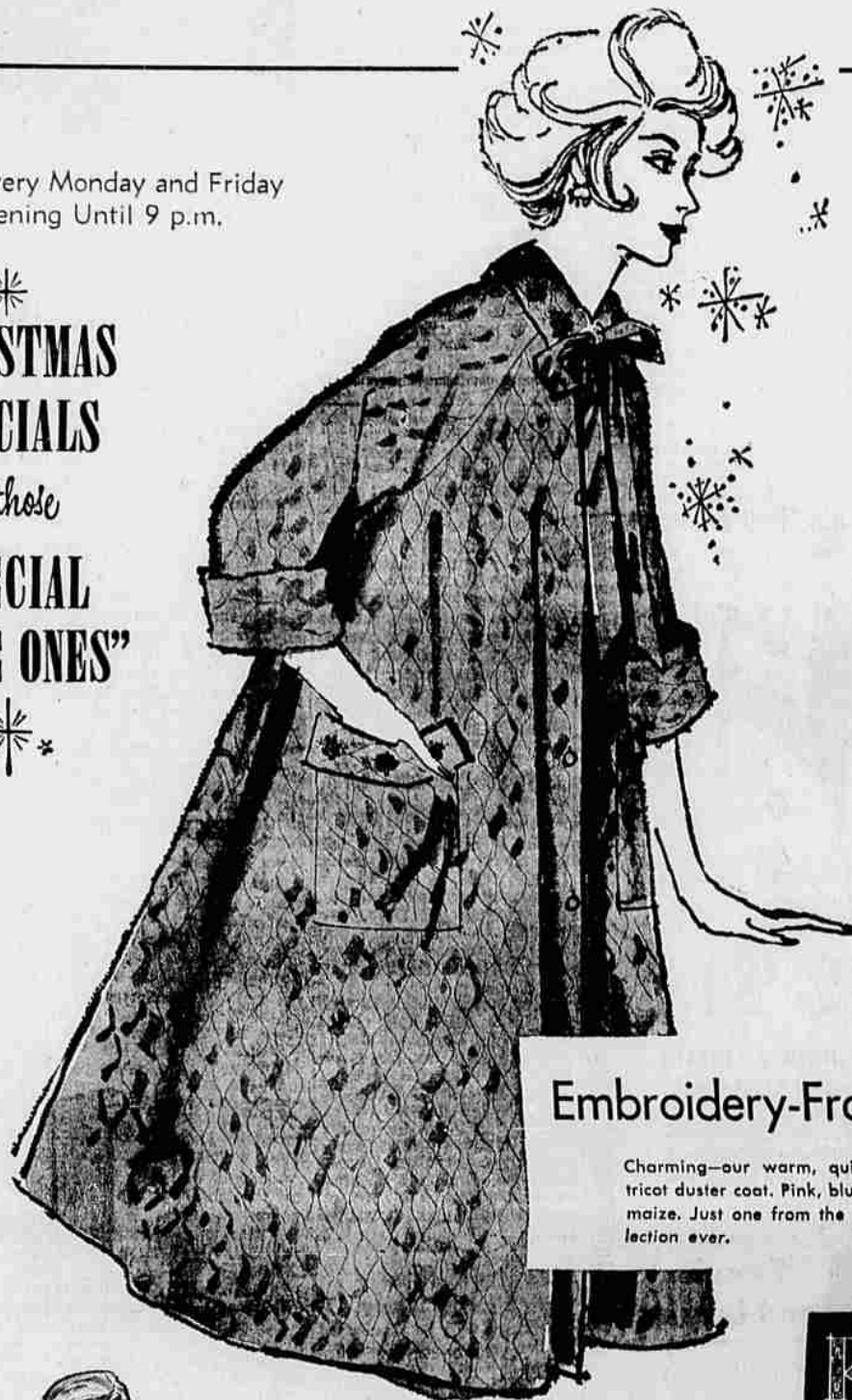

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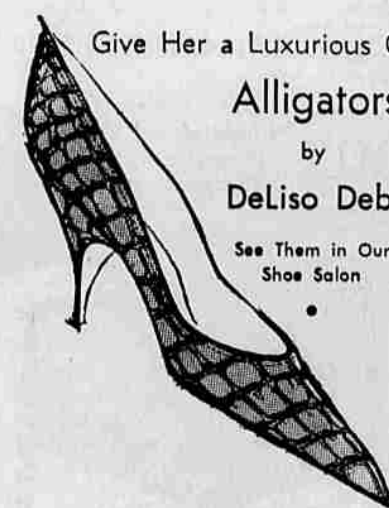
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## Annual Christmas Party Held by Sojourners Club
