

Tornado Trounces North Bend 57-35

What had been anticipated as the toughest of two opening week end basketball skirmishes for the Medford High school aggregation turned out to be the easier one Saturday night and the Black Tornado tamed the Bulldogs of North Bend 57 to 35.

Medford nabbed the lead in the contest when it was 24 minutes old and stayed in control the rest of the night. The Tornado, playing aggressive ball, was stout on defense, particularly in the area close to the hoop, and held the Bulldogs to 12 field goals. Five of the buckets were put in after Medford reserves had taken over in the fourth panel.

The home club turned in some fine teamwork in taking its second triumph of the

young season. With some of its own shots hurried and missed, it did not have the firing success of the previous night against Marshfield.

Quinn's Leads
Bob Quinn with 17 points and 11 rebounds headed the Tornado in those departments for the second night in a row. Dick Ragdale collected 13 markers and ballhawking Jim Barry was second high for Medford in retrieves from the boards with five. Chuck Johns, the North Bend big man at 6-6, scored 12 points and cleared the boards on eight occasions.

Medford limited the Bulldogs to but one field bucket in the first quarter and had command at the end of the period 12 to 3. Second quarter

was a bit more evenly battled but the Tornado stretched its lead to 12 points at halftime 25 to 13.

In the third stanza Medford turned on the offensive steam for 20 points while holding NB to five (two field goals). That made it 45 to 18 at the end of the chukker. Tornado hoopmen then extended to 30 point margins at 53 to 23 and 55 to 25.

Medford put in 21 of 54 tries from the field for 388 and North Bend's 12 were on 46 efforts for 2.61. The Tornado was 15 for 25 from the free line as Ragdale, Scott Eaton and Bruce Bray had perfect nights at the stripe. The Bulldogs put in 11 of 25. Rebound was almost even with Medford having 29 to 27 edge.

Big Third
In the big third Quinn got three of his field goals, on a swinging hook shot, on a fast break with Ragdale feeding and on jump with Stan Dowson feeding. Quinn had launched the break with a steal. Ragdale tallied off a rebound and on a fast break. Barry groined on a Quinn feed. Brown cashed in when Barry cleared a board and again when Barry started a break for the bucket.

Three other goals by Quinn came in the second panel, once when he dribbled the length of the floor.

North Bend gained the first point of the fray on Johns' gift. Ragdale countered with a free heave. Terry Leininger put in a long push for the coast club. Ragdale tied it with a jump from the side and Quinn made it 5 to 3 with a pusher.

The Whites turned the tables for a Friday loss and beat the Blacks 42 to 31 Saturday in a prelim among Medford jayvees. Gibb Mitchell scored 19 and Dan Miles 11.

Jim O'Neill won the Class A senior and Class A super events Sunday in the Medford Go-Kart club trophy competition at its fairgrounds track. He is from the South Umpqua club.

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Bat Title Confirmed For Runnels

Chicago - (UP) - The Boston Red Sox' Pete Runnels won his first American league batting championship in 1960 but the pennant-winning New York Yankees monopolized the league's individual and team power departments.

Runnels, 31-year-old native of Lufkin, Tex., who lost the 1958 title to teammate Ted Williams on the final day of the season and finished third in the 1959 race, took the 1960 championship with a .320 mark, official averages released today confirmed. That was five points better than runnerup Al Smith of the Chicago White Sox and nine better than third-place Minnie Minoso, also of the White Sox.

Bill Skowron was the only Yankee to top .300 (.309) but Mickey Vernon and Roger Maris paced the AL champions to the best all-around offensive showing in the circuit. Mantle won the fourth home run title of his career with 40 while Maris finished second to Mickey with 39 homers and led in runs batted in with 112.

The Yankees also hit a club record total of 193 home runs and topped the circuit with 748 runs scored.

The White Sox' .270 team batting average was the highest in the league and they also had individual leaders in Minoso with 184 hits, Nelson Fox with 10 triples and Luis Aparicio with 51 stolen bases. Aparicio thus equaled the major league record of leading in steals five straight seasons.

Tito Francona of the Cleveland Indians led in doubles with 36.

Closest to Maris in the important RBI column were Minoso with 105 and the Washington Senators' Jim Lemon with 100.

Brookings Splits With Phoenix
Phoenix - Brookings edged Phoenix high, cagers 40 to 36 on Saturday night at Brookings to split a week end series with the Pirates.

Phoenix was winner at home 47 to 39 on Friday. The Bruins build up a 37 to 28 gap in the fourth quarter and held off the Pirates bid to overtake them.

Brookings was on top most of the way and had quarterly gaps of 9 to 7, 19 to 17 and 28 to 26. Phoenix, however, put in the first bucket and also headed 3 to 2, 21 to 19 and 40 to 36.

Gordon Bullock's layin with 3 1/2 minutes to go put the Bruins ahead 25 to 24. They never relinquished the lead again.

Tom Johnson and Mike Construk each got two baskets for Phoenix while Jan Nelson put in a free heave as the nine-point fourth quarter span shrunk to 38 to 36. Norm Dean put in two free shots for the Bruins and Construk a basket for the Pirates in the final seconds.

Phoenix was weaker on the backboards and took 18 less field shots than on Friday. Dean had 15 points for Brookings and Tom Johnson 12 for Phoenix. The Pirates shot 382 for the tussle on the strength of a .500 second half.

Phoenix won the JV tiff 30 to 13 with Terry Hanson and George Gleim getting eight points each.

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Spoiler-Minded Los Angeles Rams Jolt Baltimore Colts

The Green Bay Packers can qualify for their first National Football league championship playoff since 1944 by beating the Rams next Saturday at Los Angeles—but don't count on it.

Not from the way things have been going lately in pro football's "Wild West."

For those Rams are the same team which jolted the Baltimore Colts' hopes for a third consecutive NFL championship Sunday with a 10-3 upset victory before 75,461 fans at Los Angeles.

The Rams have no title hopes for themselves, they're loose and they can delight in the big home crowd by playing the role of "spillers" against the Packers.

A victory for the Packers will put them in the playoff against the Eagles at Philadelphia, Dec. 26.

A defeat would put the Packers in a two or three-team tie for first place with the winner of next Sunday's Colts-San Francisco Forty-Niners game and possibly the Detroit Lions. A three-team deadlock would delay the championship playoff until Jan. 8.

Packers Beat 49'ers
Green Bay (7-4) moved into first place in the Western division by beating San Francisco, 13-0, Saturday. The Colts had a chance to keep pace but lost to Los Angeles for their third straight defeat.

Detroit moved into a second place tie with the Colts and Forty-Niners (all at 6-5) by defeating the Dallas Cowboys, 23-14.

The Eagles, who clinched

the Eastern division crown last Sunday, were beaten by the Pittsburgh Steelers, 27-21; the Cleveland Browns knocked the Chicago Bears out of contention with a 42-0 shellacking; and the New York Giants beat the Washington Redskins, 17-3.

In the American Football league, the Houston Oilers clinched the Eastern division title and won the right to meet the Los Angeles Chargers in the championship playoff, Jan. 1, by defeating the Buffalo Bills, 31-23; the New York Titans edged the Oakland Raiders, 31-28; and the Dallas Texans walloped the Boston Patriots, 34-0. The Chargers beat Denver Saturday, 41-33.

Defense Beats Colts
Quarterback Billy Wade ran 66 yards from scrimmage for a touchdown and Danny Villanueva kicked a 32-yard field goal during the Rams' second-half comeback which beat Baltimore, 10-7.

Wade got the game only because starting quarterback Frank Ryan suffered a shoulder separation in the second period.

A superb defense was a key to the Los Angeles victory. When the Colts penetrated to the Rams' two-yard line in the first period, they were thrown back and had to settle for a 9-yard field goal by Steve Myhra.

The Colts' most serious

scoring threat in the second half came in the dying minutes when Johnny Unitas moved them to the Rams' 20. With 45 seconds left to play, however, halfback Alex Hawkins fumbled and George Strugar recovered for Los Angeles on the 19.

St. Mary's Wins From Pacific HS
St. Mary's of Medford, itself ragged, had little trouble with the visiting Pacific high basketball team on Saturday evening. It whipped the Pirates 50 to 29.

The cold Pacific club managed just 10 field buckets in the fray and only one fielder and one gift shot in the third quarter.

St. Mary's had 16 to 5, 26 to 18 and 43 to 21 stanza advantages. Mike Austin of the Crusaders, who hit six from the free line, was high scorer with 18 tallies. He was the only player in double figures.

The Med
