Shopping Centers Given 'Lift' From Entertainment Field

New York—UPI—One of our newest business phenomena, the suburban shopping center, is getting valuable assistance from one of the oldest, the entertainment industry.

Shopping center landlords and their merchant tenants are finding new profits by adding motion picture theaters and bowling centers to the shopping facilities.

The general manager of a huge Massachusetts shopping center said that during the early weeks of operation of a new center recreational enterprises can be a powerful influence in attracting people, and in exposing them to the shopping facilities available.

In time, he added, this develops into a pattern of one-stop shopping and recreation to the mutual benefit of the merchants and the recreational proprietor.

Reports of successful entertainment enterprises that are adding to the weekly grosses of regional shopping centers have come in from Seattle, Syracuse, Richmond, and Pompano Beach, Fla., as well as Massachusetts.

Not Only Measure

Philip Smith, president of General Driv-In corporation, operator of theaters and bowling establishments in shopping centers, said traffic flow is not the only measure of the entertainment industry's contribution to a shopping center. The recreational facilities can offer an "excellent" return on investment to the shopping center's landlord, he said.

The most successful entertainment enterprises in shopping areas are those located in regional shopping centers which cater to a market of more than 500,000 people, according to Smith. But the community and neighborhood centers also are being given increased attention by astute recreation field entrepreneurs.

While bowling centers are helping add profits to shopping centers, the ten-pin establishments themselves are finding an ideal companion piece in catering.

Americana Properties, Incorporated has introduced the concept of adding separate catering halls to bowling establishments on Long Island. It says both operations complement and enhance each other.

Contributes To Security

The high income inherent in the catering operation can be realized quicker as a result of using existing buildings designed for bowling, and taking advantage of the traffic flow generated through bowling leagues and individual bowlers, according to an Americana official.

Flight Pioneer

Dies in Palo Alto

Palo Alto, Calif.—UPI—Funeral arrangements were pending today for Frank T. Coffyn, last survivor of the Wright brothers flying team.

Coffyn, 82, who died Saturday, was taught to fly by Orville Wright in 1910 and became one of a five-man squad that demonstrated Wright flying machines. Later, as a barnstormer, he claimed to be the first man to fly under the Brooklyn bridge and the first to take aerial motion pictures.

Search for Coed Enters Third Week

Portland—UPI—The search for a Washington State university coed authorities said was abducted by the lovers lane slayer of her boyfriend entered its third week today.

Beverly Ann Allan, 19, Port Townsend, Wash., has been missing since Nov. 27 when Larry Ralph Peyton, also 19, Portland, was found stabbed 23 times in his car in the wooded Forest park area of northwest Portland. Authorities fear she also was slain.

Authorities checked into several leads during the past two weeks but all efforts proved fruitless.

Multnomah county officers last week received more than 300 reports in their search for a red or maroon 1949 or 1951 car reported seen in the wooded area where Peyton was slain and Miss Allan disappeared.

U.S. Expected To Take Another Shot At Moon This Year

Cape Canaveral—UPI—The United States is expected to take one more shot at its most elusive space target, earth's natural moon, before closing its rocket activity for 1960.

A 10-story Atlas-Able rocket is in the final stages of preparation at this missile testing center for an attempt to hurl a "space laboratory" into orbit around the moon as the first lunar satellite.

A six-day stretch starting Dec. 13 is the so-called "optimum" launching time for a moonshot this month. This is the period when the moon's position gives scientists a somewhat better chance for success.

America has fired seven moonshots during the three years of the "space age," and has failed in six. The seventh was called a "partial success" when Pioneer IV, launched nearly two years ago, came within 37,300 miles of the moon en route to an orbit around the sun.

Only Atlas Shots Failed

Two of the failures have come in the only previous launching of the unwieldy-looking Atlas-Able. A three-stage rocket shaped like a soft-drink bottle with a straw at the top.

The first "Double-A" was disintegrated shortly after blast-off on Thanksgiving Day, 1959, and the other plunged back into the atmosphere last Sept. 25, raining wreckage on South Africa.

It was reported the National Aeronautics and Space Administration, the agency in charge of the nation's civilian space program, has made a few comparatively minor changes to attempt to insure a success with lunar probe No. 8.

Otherwise, the test this month is expected to be virtually a repeat of the Sept. 25 effort. The satellite is a sphere about 39 inches in diameter and weighing nearly 400 pounds. It will be carried in the protective nose of the Atlas-Able.

Scientists have equipped the rocket with a unique "mid-course" guidance system to allow up to six changes in speed—four forward and two in reverse—during the 62-hour flight to the vicinity of the moon.

Goal of the \$10 million program is to put the satellite into an orbit swinging from about 1,400 miles to about 2,500 miles above the moon's poles once every 10 hours.

No Atmosphere

Scientists indicate the satellite, if successful, should circle the moon for years. The moon has no atmosphere to drag the probe down—a constant problem with earth satellites.
