De Gaulle Ready To Renew Offer

Paris—(UPI)—President Charles de Gaulle was reported ready today to renew his offer of a one-sided cease fire in Algeria in a spectacular gesture for Moslem support to end the six-year-old rebellion there.

De Gaulle conferred today with Premier Michel Debre and French political sources said he was considering ordering French troops to stop fighting, unless attacked, in hopes this would save his North African policy.

The Algerian death toll now exceeds 122. De Gaulle was reported convinced that only a spectacular gesture could keep his plans from foundering in new bloodshed and rioting.

Damages Sought for Dirtying Orchard

Owners of a seven-acre peach orchard in the Phoenix area have filed a suit in the Jackson county circuit court against a local sawmill for allegedly dirtying trees, fruit and property with "huge quantities of smoke," sawdust and various other particles.

Bert and Kathryn Stancil are seeking a permanent injunction against Sierra-Cascade Pine Corporation to stop it from allowing smoke, sawdust and particulates and other solids to be deposited on their property. They are seeking \$2,500 in general damages, \$11,500 in special damages and \$5,000 in punitive damages.

The couple charges in the complaint that the peach crop had to be cleaned every year from 1955 through 1960 because of smoke, sawdust and other deposits floating down on the orchard from the sawmill burners.

Boivin Requested To Step Aside

Portland—(UPI)—State Sen. Alfred Corbett, (D-Portland), was recognized Tuesday night as the "sole rightful claimant" to the Democratic party's nomination for 1961 Oregon Senate President by the party's executive committee.

The executive committee asked State Sen. Harry Boivin, (D-Klamath Falls), Corbett's opponent for the presidency, to release his Democratic pledges so Corbett could receive a unanimous Democratic ballot when the Senate is organized.

Boivin says he has enough Democratic and Republican votes to defeat Corbett for the presidency. He has given no indication he will step aside.

Hailie Selassie Said Overthrown

Washington—(UPI)—The State Department said today it has received a report from the U.S. ambassador in Ethiopia that "the imperial household guard has engineered a coup against the government of Emperor Hailie Selassie, 68."

The department said the reports were "unconfirmed" but U.S. officials said privately that the household guard is holding Crown Prince Asfa Wossen prisoner and demanding the establishment of a republic.

The imperial household guard consists of about one battalion of specially trained elite troops who also dabble in palace politics at times.
