Legislators Show Varied Opinions On Revenues

Salem — (UPI) — Legislators attending a pre-session conference on fiscal matters showed differences of opinion Tuesday on Oregon revenue estimates of \$320.6 million for the 1961-62 biennium.

Senate President Walter Pearson (D-Portland) said "despite the rosy talk of our economic future, I wonder if revenue estimates are really in line — especially on income taxes."

Richard Eymann, research analyst for the Interim Committee on Taxation, said he felt present estimates "may be a little low. I am not basing this on anything but history." He predicted Oregon would end the current fiscal year with more than the \$39.5 surplus figured in the governor's budget.

Based on Figures
Pearson said he based his doubt on current unemployment figures and talking with "a lot of business people."

Rep. Clarence Barton (D-Coquille), chairman of the Interim Tax Committee, said estimates of surplus provided his committee had been going up consistently.

Leon Margosian, of the Department of Finance and Administration, voiced confidence in estimated revenue figures and said "despite unemployment figures, employment is still very high."

Margosian also said he expected the lumber industry to "pick up in the next few months."

Kennedy's Defense Secretary Disdains Partisan Politics

Detroit — (UPI) — Robert S. McNamara, Ford Motor Co. president, chosen by President-elect Kennedy for Secretary of Defense, has the type of audacious disdain for narrow partisanship that Kennedy admires.

Kennedy devoted a chapter of his book "Profiles of Courage" to extolling the courage John Quincy Adams showed when he first proposed that the minority party be given proportional representation in the Massachusetts legislature. McNamara has repeatedly shown the same type of bipartisanship. He has bobbed up on different sides of the political fence on several occasions.

Backer of Sen. Hart

In 1958, he was one of the largest financial backers of Sen. Philip A. Hart (D-Mich.), who had been lieutenant governor of Michigan, when Hart opposed Sen. Charles Potter (R-Mich.).

Potter at that time was considered one of the strongest champions of the automobile industry which McNamara represented as a vice president of Ford Motor Co.

A little over a year later, McNamara was leader of a group trying to convince American Motors Corp. president George Romney to seek

the Republican nomination to oppose Sen. Patrick V. McNamara (D-Mich.), no kin, and who is a strong favorite of labor.

Earlier this year, he was back on the Democratic side of the fence, supporting the candidacy of Kennedy.

McNamara, 44, is the type of young, brilliant intellectual who characterizes most of Kennedy's choices for administrative posts.

Born in California

He was born in San Francisco, Calif., July 9, 1916, and attended public schools at Piedmont, Calif. He quickly identified himself as an "egghead" when he was elected to Phi Beta Kappa in his sophomore year at the University of California.

At the age of 20, he was graduated from California and two years later he was awarded a master's degree in business administration by the Harvard graduate school of business administration.

After graduation from Harvard, McNamara joined the accounting firm of Price, Waterhouse and Co. in California. But a year later he was back at Harvard as an assistant professor of business administration.

Entered Air Force
Through work for the war

department while at Harvard, he entered the Air Force as a captain during World War II. He emerged from the Air Force in 1945 as a lieutenant colonel and joined a group of nine other Air Force officers in a management specialists group known as the "whiz kids" after they were hired in a body by Ford Motor Co.

The mild-looking McNamara started as manager of Ford's planning and financial analysis office. His boundless energy moved him up quickly until he climaxed his rise last month by being named president of the company.

While at Ford, McNamara maintained much of his academic aloofness. He never mingled with auto industry officials on his own time and established his home on the University of Michigan campus at Ann Arbor to maintain his academic contacts, even though this meant he had to drive 38 miles to work at Dearborn every day.

Hair Brushed Back

He wears his hair brushed back in a slightly old-fashioned way and wears gold rimmed glasses. Although he works as much as 11 hours a day, six or seven days a week, he is a heavy reader of books on sociology, history and philosophy and takes four weeks vacation every year, often flying to Switzerland for mountain climbing and skiing.

Although he is often stern and demanding, he commands respect and loyalty and is determined to protect rights of his employees.

Both he and his wife were afflicted with polio when they were young but both recovered. They have two daughters, Margaret Elizabeth and Kathleen, and a son, Robert Craig.

254 Forest Fires Blamed on Hunters

Portland — (UPI) — Oregon deer hunters may be burning themselves out of the forests.

This warning was issued by Arthur W. Prialux, president of the Keep Oregon Green association.

He said that hunters started 254 forest fires in the deer season just ended in Oregon. The fires burned over 1,200 acres of prime timber land. He added that this was nearly three times as many fires as hunters set last year.

Public and private landowners, Prialux said, may soon reach the point where they decide that the risk of allowing "reckless, willful, destructive vandals" loose in woods is too much of a risk.

He said that hunters left 414 warm-up fires on federal lands, and 100 on state and private lands. Forest wardens and rangers put out the fires.

New York — (UPI) — It does not seem possible that the market could advance sharply at this time and sustain its gain with the economy showing little

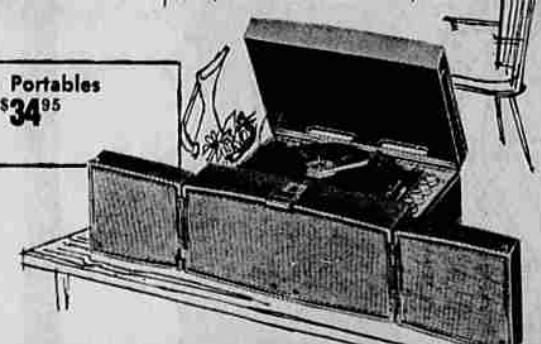
