

Kentuckians Win Over Tar Heels

You can stop feeling sorry for Baron Adolph Rupp and his Kentucky Wildcats.

All his unranked eagles did Tuesday night was knock off third-ranked North Carolina, 70-65, and show that they're ready to win their 20th Southeastern Basketball conference title this season after two "lean" years.

"Lean" by Kentucky standards was missing out on the conference crown, and last season the Wildcats compiled an 18-7 record — the second worst in Rupp's 30-year dynasty. To add salt to Rupp's wounds, the Wildcats dropped a decision to Florida State in their second game this season.

Beat Tar Heels
But it was all joy for the Blue Grass boys as they picked up their third victory in four starts in dropping the Tar Heels from the ranks of the undefeated.

Bill Lickert, who finished with 16 points, hit six straight points with less than seven minutes remaining to lead the Wildcats to victory. Ned Jennings added 10 points and Larry Pursiful 17 for Kentucky. Doug Moe with 25 points and York Larese with 22 topped the losers.

The Bearcats of Cincinnati gave evidence to Loyola, Calif., that they're not dead yet by trouncing the Lions, 74-53; Louisville defeated Western Kentucky, 86-71, to win the Blue Grass Invitational Tournament, and Utah State downed Georgia Tech, 67-62, to take the consolation round.

West Virginia downed winless Richmond, 75-72, and Tulsa upset Arkansas, 64-59, in other top games.

Patterson Top Fighter

New York — (UPI) — The Boxing Writers' association today named heavyweight champion Floyd Patterson "Fighter of the Year" for a record-equaling second time, and veteran sports writer Ned Brown recipient of the meritorious-service trophy.

Three special awards gold watches were voted to Dan Florio, trainer of Patterson and ex-champion Jersey Joe Walcott; veteran promoter Humbert Jack Fugazy of Feature Sports, Inc., and chairman Melvin L. Krulwich of the New York State Athletic commission.

All awards will be presented at the boxing writers' annual dinners in the Waldorf-Astoria Grand Ballroom, Jan. 17.

Patterson was voted the Edward J. Neil Memorial plaque for Fighter of the Year because of his unprecedented recapture of the heavyweight crown from Sweden's Ingemar Johansson last June 20 on a fifth-round knockout. No one else had ever regained that title.

Knicks Tip Celts From First Spot

The Boston Celtics ordinarily wear green uniforms, but every time the New York Knickerbockers play them, they see red.

Tuesday night was no exception as the Knicks out-hustled, out-shot and out-fought the National Basketball association champions in a 117-115 victory that knocked the Celtics out of first place in the Eastern division.

Fighting without letup under the boards throughout the game, the Knicks built up a 21-point fourth period lead and then sent in the reserves to protect it. The second-liners didn't as Boston tied the score at 115 with seven seconds left. But Dick Garmaker, one of the veterans who played a key role in the victory, outjumped two Boston players for a rebound after New York put the ball in play and sank the shot just as the final buzzer was sounding to pull out the decision.

Sears High Scorer
Kenny Sears, who scuffled with Boston bad-boy Jim Loscutoff in the foul-ridden game, emerged as high scorer with 34 points. Richie Guerin finished with 23 and Garmaker had 14. Bob Cousy, playing all out in the absence of Bill Sharman, had 30 points and Bill Russell finished with 22.

The Philadelphia Warriors, paced by Wilt Chamberlain, nipped the Detroit Pistons, 110-108, to take over first place in the Eastern division. Paul Arizin's jump shot in the last six seconds proved the margin of difference in the game.

Dolph Schayes, who keeps right on rolling along, scored 32 points to lead the Syracuse Nationals to a 107-105 victory over the Cincinnati Royals in the preliminary game to the Knicks-Celtics contest at New York's Madison Square Garden.

Education Board Approves 5-Year Teacher Training

Salem — (UPI) — The State Board of Education late Tuesday approved a proposed law requiring grade school teachers and community college instructors to have five years of college before they can get a teaching certificate.

Four years is the present requirement although high school teachers must have five years of training.

The proposed law will be submitted to the 1961 legislature. Teachers who now hold certificates would not be affected.

The board approved five plans for school district reorganization, two in Douglas county and one each in Deschutes, Marion and Polk counties.

Rejected was a Wasco county plan calling for consolidation of four districts—Chenoweth, Petersburg, Mosier and Rowena. The plan will go back to the county committee for further study.

These consolidations are provided in the approved plans:

Douglas County—Scotts Valley, Yoncalla, Curtin, Gunter, Yoncalla Union High and Drain Union High into one district, and all of Roseburg into another.

Deschutes — Bend, Lapine, Brothers, Harper, and parts of Tumalo and Redmond Union High.

Marion-St. Paul, St. Paul Union High and parts of Woodburn and Gervais.

Polk—All of Valseiz.

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Neuberger To Act On Klamath Plan

Portland — (UPI) — Sen. Maurine Neuberger, (D-Ore.), announced Tuesday she is ready to move ahead with plans to add the Klamath Indian reservation timberlands to the National Forest system.

She said she would consult with other members of the Oregon Congressional delegation on the "possibility of creating a new national forest with headquarters at Klamath Falls."

The Oregon senator said she was ready to act now, since the period when the timberlands could be purchased by private interests had expired.

Only one section of the \$90 million forest was sold before the sale deadline — a lodgepole pine area purchased by Crown-Zellerbach Corp.

Under the 1958 act, the federal government acquires the unsold portion of the forest

in April, 1961.

Mrs. Neuberger urged the federal government to avoid hasty action in deciding how to add the land to the national forest system.

She also called for a solution that would avoid delay in payments for the land to Klamath tribal members.
