

### Tot's Money Appetite Puts Family in Chips

London—UPI—Paul Cox is only 18 months old but he has an insatiable appetite for money.  
 "He hides it, eats it, destroys it, like a terrier," his mother, Mrs. Jacqueline Cox, 23, said.  
 His worst act of destruction was finding the family's savings of \$59 and tossing it into the fireplace to watch it burn.  
 That hurt. His father, Norman, 26, said he was due to be laid off from his factory job and the money was a small fortune at the time.  
 Now little Paul has made good. He won \$121,192—tax free—on Britain's week end soccer pools by making correct guesses.  
 Mrs. Cox said she simply handed Paul a crayon along with the pool coupon and said "mark." He made eight check marks. His guesses were perfect.  
 "Good heavens," Mrs. Cox shrieked when told of the win. "The baby did it."  
 "Now he's made it and the next thing we have to keep out of his way is the check."

### Article Discusses Problem of Married Student at College

Eugene—Married students have been "infiltrating" the college campuses for 20 years. They now reportedly make up one-fourth of the student body at most universities.  
 An article in the December-January issue of Old Oregon, the magazine of the University of Oregon Alumni, tells about the problems of financial support, cultural pressures, adjustments to married life, and the lack of university planning for the married student.

The article was written by a former University Student Kris Stokes, who attended Oregon 1940-42.  
 One idea was suggested by

Dr. Margaret Mead, eminent anthropologist, who appealed to college students to quit getting married so that they can save the world. Dr. Mead believes that marriage reduces the college education to merely a training ground for jobs rather than an intellectual enlightenment.

C. F. Warnath, University Counseling Center, says, "College life seems deliberately designed to pull these couples apart."

Mrs. Stokes discussed the lack of interest shown by universities and colleges toward the married student. "The University of Oregon, in fact, seems scarcely aware that there is a married student on campus, much less 1,700 of them." Various attempts have been made to include the married student in school activities, however the program constantly meets with problems. For instance, Mrs. Stokes points out that 454 married graduate students were offered 40 to 60 football tickets for their wives.

Mrs. Stokes may be considered an authority on the subject of married college students because she was one of the first to come immediately following World War II. Her husband Clark Stokes, '49, was a football player for the university during the 1947-48 season. He is now athletic director and wrestling coach at Willamette High school in Eugene.

### Liability Limit Increase Approved

Salem—UPI—The Oregon Highway Commission has approved an increase in liability insurance limits for highway department employees from \$50,000 to \$500,000.

This applies to personal injury. Coverage for employees on property damage liability was hiked from \$25,000 to \$50,000.

The commission acted on request of Chief Counsel Leonard Lindas, who said the additional premium cost is \$720 but the extra protection is needed by the state.

The added insurance runs through Sept. 11, 1961.

Columbus, Wis.—UPI—Funeral services were being arranged today for the Rev. Terence L. Schmidt, 38, professor of dogmatic theology at Divine Savior Seminary, Lenham, Md. He died Monday.

### Group Opposed to Shoreline Drilling

Portland—UPI—A group of Oregon citizens has expressed opposition to negotiations between the Shell Oil company and the State Land Board for eventual drilling for oil along the state's coastal shoreline.

The group, comprised of many owners of coast property, addressed a special delivery letter to Gov. Mark Hatfield asking the State Land Board and the governor to halt negotiations.

Don N. Swetland, Portland, said "Funds realized from oil operations, whether under the auspices of Shell Oil or the state itself, will never compensate for the ultimate destruction of our coast tourist industry."
