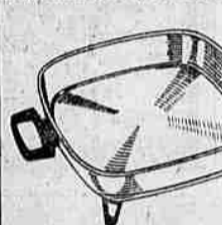

## Strikers' Wives Ask Governor's Views on Dispute

Salem—UPI—Thirty wives of striking employees of the Oregon Journal and the Oregonian called on Gov. Mark Hatfield Wednesday afternoon to ask his views of the 13-month dispute.

Hatfield told them his office "must remain neutral" but he would "go hat in hand" to help settle the strike.

Hatfield said he has made 12 attempts to bring both sides together but while labor was willing, management officials were not.

The governor said if he endorsed one side or the other it would not help matters and would even drive the two sides "farther apart."

**No Legal Power**

Hatfield said he has no legal power to force a settlement of the strike and he does not favor compulsory arbitration.

Asked how he would react to a "general strike" in Oregon to force settlement of the Portland dispute, Hatfield said such a move would be "unwarranted" and he would "not tolerate it."

The women asked Hatfield how he stood on anti-picketing and "importation of strike-breakers." He noted that when he was in the legislature in 1953, he voted against the anti-picketing law and when he was governor in 1959, he signed its repeal.

As to the use of "strike-breakers," he said he favors employment of local people in all instances and there is an unresolved legal question involved as to the use of outsiders.

## Storm Heads for Midwest States

A Canadian-born snowstorm headed for the Midwest today.

North winds set off a new outbreak of cold Arctic air carried gusts up to 58 miles per hour into the Dakotas and Minnesota and fanned out to offer heavy drifting from the Rocky Mountains east to Michigan.

In Alaska, Civil Defense workers organized rescue teams to evacuate 15 persons remaining in a flooded valley where an Anchor river ice jam threatened to wash out all roads 85 miles southwest of Anchorage. An estimated 18 persons were evacuated Wednesday.

Warm air rolled north from Delaware through eastern cities, forming a welcome respite from crippling cold and record snows since the week end.

The Weather Bureau predicted 40-degree temperatures for New York City. Garbage collection resumed in the nation's largest city for the first time since Monday and officials reported commuter travel and theater attendance approaching normal loads.

In Washington, police declared an end to the capital's snow emergency.

## Group Named To Distribute Income

Portland—UPI—The First National Bank of Oregon Wednesday named an advisory committee to help distribute income from more than \$600,000 left to charity by J. G. Edwards, Central Oregon land and sheep owner who died in 1945.

Named to the committee were Harold Wendel, G. E. Cannon, Rudie Wilhelm Jr., Mrs. Joseph A. Minott, James H. Polhemus and Edward P. Stamm.

The committee said it would limit allocation of funds to the income earnings of the trust and to charities operating within the boundaries of Oregon.

Edwards came to Oregon in 1898 after building a fortune in ranching in Wyoming. His ranch was in Crook county. He moved to Portland in 1910.

## Christmas Program Scheduled Tonight
