

# Senators, Angels Officially In Business After AL Draft

Boston—UPI—New Washington and Los Angeles American League baseball clubs were officially in business today, and the St. Louis Cardinals acknowledged the fact by putting in a prompt bid for Bobby Shantz, the Senators' newly-acquired southpaw.

The Cardinals were only one of five major league clubs that contacted Washington General Manager Ed Doherty Wednesday shortly after he had participated in an un-

precedented selection of players together with Los Angeles General Manager Fred Haney.

Between them, Doherty and Haney spent a total of \$4,325,000 for 61 players. Each of the two new clubs selected 28 players off a special American League roster at a cost of \$75,000 per player.

The Webfoots meet Penn State at Philadelphia's Municipal Stadium Saturday in the second annual Liberty Bowl. Philadelphia is blanketed with 14.6 inches of snow. The temperature here early today was 7 above.

## Aparicio Leader of Shortstops

Boston—UPI—There's fresh evidence today of what Manager Al Lopez of the Chicago White Sox has been saying for the last two years: Luis Aparicio is baseball's modern "Mr. Shortstop."

American league fielding statistics released by league president Joe Cronin disclose that the slick-fielding Aparicio's .979 percentage in 1960 was by far the best in the circuit. It was the second straight season in which Aparicio led the shortstops and his average this year was nine points higher than his 1959 mark.

With Aparicio and catcher Sherman Lollar showing the way, the White Sox led in team fielding with a .9819 mark—shading the Baltimore Orioles for the honor by .0002. It was the fourth straight season in which the White Sox were tops in the league in defense.

Lollar, another key man for the third-place White Sox, committed only three errors to lead the catchers with a .995 figure.

Rounding out the best-fielding infield in the league were first-baseman Vic Power of the Cleveland Indians with .996, second-baseman Pete Runnels of the Boston Red Sox with .986 and third-baseman Brooks Robinson of the Orioles with .977.

The best-fielding trio of outfielders in the circuit were Charlie Maxwell of the Detroit Tigers with .996, Gene Woodling of the Orioles with .995 and Jim Piersall of the Indians with .992. Pedro Ramos of the Washington Senators had 60 total chances to top a list of 46 pitchers who did not commit a single error during the season.

The White Sox also led in double plays, with 175, the Orioles' 108 errors were low for the league and the Senators made the only triple play of the campaign.

## British Soccer Pros Vote To Go on Strike

Manchester, England—UPI—The threat of a total soccer strike, involving 82 clubs and 2,700 professional players, is growing stronger each day.

Players representing England's Northern section overwhelmingly voted on Wednesday, 25-6, to go through with a walkout prior to the Jan. 14 games if their demands aren't met.

Earlier, the Southern section had voted unanimously in favor of the strike. The final group of players, representing the Midland area, was expected to go along with the others.

The players want the present maximum wage limit of 20 pounds (\$56) a week removed and they want freedom to negotiate contracts which do not tie them to a club for life.

Soccer officials fear that if there is a strike, the game would never recover to its present standards. Many clubs are existing on a week to week basis and they eventually might have to close operations.

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# Bridge Approach Bids Too High

Olympia—UPI—The Highway Commission Wednesday delayed action on a low bid submitted for construction of approaches to a Cowlitz river bridge near Longview.

A commission spokesman said the \$389,060 bid made by John Havlik Jr., Scappoose, Ore., contractor, was considered too high and would "probably be rejected."

The job includes building approaches to a bridge on State Highway 12 just outside Longview for a distance of about .3 of a mile.

# Neuberger Asks Help for Oregon

Washington—UPI—Sen. Maurine Neuberger (D-Ore.) has asked a special committee on economically depressed areas to include Oregon in its studies.

She wrote to Sen. Paul Douglas (D-Ill.) chairman of the 15-man committee named by President-elect John F. Kennedy, suggesting help to bolster the sagging lumber industry. She also suggested low cost power from Columbia river dams to help in industrial expansion and "credit policies with more flexibility than those in vogue during recent years."

Mrs. Neuberger also suggested specific studies of Astoria's economy, pointing to withdrawal of Navy ships from Tongue Point and asking "special emphasis on defense contracts."

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# Professor Rates Penn Over UO

University Park, Pa.—A professor-statistician who rates football teams as an avocation picks Penn State over Oregon in the Liberty Bowl at Philadelphia on Saturday.

"The two teams are evenly-matched," says Roger B. Saylor, professor of business statistics at the Pennsylvania State university, "but I must give the edge to Penn State because of its tougher season schedule."

Ex-Coast Guardsman Saylor, who contrived his rating system between invasions in the Pacific during World War II, gives equal weight in his computations to wins-losses and "strength of schedule" formula.

Penn State lost three during the 1960 campaign — to third-ranking Missouri, 15th ranking Syracuse, and 24th ranking Illinois. Oregon lost to fourth-ranking Washington and 18th ranking Michigan and was tied by 30th ranking Oregon State.

The two teams are separated by 18 rating points in Saylor's final standings. Saylor says "about 25 points" represent a touchdown.

"This game is not unlike most games on the post-season calendar this year," Saylor says. "It should be close all the way."
