Two Ministers Comment On Church Merger

Dr. Eugene Carson Blake, chief executive officer of the United Presbyterian Church in the U.S.A., on Dec. 4, proposed the merger of four major Protestant denominations. The four denominations given by Dr. Blake were the Protestant Episcopal, the United Presbyterian Church in the U.S.A., the Methodist, and the United Church of Christ. The Mail Tribune has asked the four local ministers of these denominations to give their views regarding the proposal.

Today the Rev. George R. V. Bolster, rector of St. Mark's Episcopal church, and Dr. George G. Roseberry, First Methodist church, write about the proposal. Next Friday the Rev. Thomas McCamant, Congregational church with the United Church of Christ, and Dr. D. Kirkland West, First Presbyterian church, will comment on the subject.

I have been asked several times to comment on the church unity address by Dr. Eugene C. Blake in San Francisco.

Dr. Blake says that he is not making an official statement for his church. He is indeed making a statement for church unity that is in accord with other statements made by church leaders for many years.

Dr. Blake's proposal was not a surprise to anyone who is familiar with the church unity work that has been going on among the something less than 40 denominations which works to a greater or lesser degree in the National Council of Churches. The churches that work in the World Council of Churches includes an even larger number of denominations that carries on mission work among the peoples of the earth.

I do not understand why Dr. Blake did not make mention of the work that has been going on for years among the very denominations which he invites to unite. These four churches work together on missionary work in the United States and the nations of the world in their boards of missions and through the local state organization of Councils of Churches.

I fully agree that there should be church unity. I mean by that organic church unity and union. If the churches really mean to unite let them so closely unite that they will give up their denominational names as they are now incorporated and choose an entirely new name. It will be a long time before that is done.

There are too many sentimental heritages by all denominations to expect the various denominations to give them up hastily.

I hope that Dr. Blake's daring sermon will hasten the day when denominations will unite and eliminate the wasteful duplication and competition, not to mention the often expressed jealousy that crops out in the places of higher leadership in all the denominations.

I have often wondered what will happen to the "blue-bloods" when they get to heaven. How will people carry their denominational isolation practices into heaven with them? I am sure the angels of heaven will rejoice everytime the denominations do something to get a little closer together.

I am glad that the denominations of Christendom are working closer together all the time. As in the past, so for the present and the future, the Methodist church will be found ready to talk church unity with any group who in the words of our founder, John Wesley said, "If your heart is right with God, put your hand in my hand and we work together."

The proposals for unity, voiced by Dr. Eugene Carson Blake at San Francisco on Dec. 4, made headline news across the nation.

They did not however come as any great surprise to thinking Christians, who for many years have noted with gratification the growing interest of the churches concerned in studying and discussing possible approaches to a greater unity than presently exists.

That this trend should now have culminated in concrete proposals, which have so far met with overwhelming public approval, is a cause for real thanksgiving. That such a move is in accordance with the Will of God we cannot doubt. That the practical implications of the proposals will make good sense to the laity, as well as to the clergy, would seem reasonably certain.

This may well prove to be one of the great turning points of church history, this time, thank God, in the right direction.

There will be many problems to be solved before this great dream can become a reality. Not least of these will be that of making it crystal clear that what we seek is "Unity" and not "Uniformity." People cannot be legislated into stereotyped forms of worship any more than in- to stereotyped foods, clothing, literature, or recreation.

It is an instance where "the letter killeth, but the spirit giveth life," and the purpose of the proposed union will not be to produce Christians from a common mould, thereby stifling personality, but rather, through greater understanding, cooperation, and fellowship, to give wider scope and effectiveness to the "glorious liberty of the children of God," and to give fulfillment to the Master's great prayer, "That they all may be one; as thou, father, art in me, and I in thee: that the world may know that thou hast sent me."

Finally let me say with Gamaliel, "If this work be of men, it will come to nought; but if it be of God, ye cannot overthrow it."
