Hoffa Enters Not Guilty Plea

Orlando, Fla. - (UPI) - Teamster President James Hoffa sang out "not guilty, your honor" as he was arraigned on fraud charges today before a federal judge.

Two of Hoffa's associates also pleaded innocent to 12-count federal indictments charging them with misusing \$500,000 in teamster funds in a Florida land development which never developed very far.

Hoffa's attorney, former Florida Gov. Fuller Warren, sought to delay the proceedings in order to have time to study the indictments.

Federal Judge Dozier Devane gave lawyers for Hoffa and his two codefendants, Robert E. McCarthy Jr. and Henry Lower, 30 days in which to file motions.

Steamship Freed In Columbia River

Portland - (UPI) - The 738-foot steamship Transoceanic was pulled free in the Columbia river at high tide Thursday afternoon, 12 hours after the vessel went aground off Sauvie Island.

Officials said there was no apparent damage to the ship, which proceeded under its own power down the river.
