

Marshfield Victor Over Crater 59-53

Coos Bay—First quarter firing of Gary Crabaugh, mid-second gunning of Wylie Smith and the work under the backboards of Stan Traxler sparked the Marshfield high Pirates as they handed the Crater Comets of Central Point a 59 to 53 setback in basketball rivalry here on Friday.

Crater contributed the first points of the hassle and had a 3 to 2 starting edge. But the Pirates, spurred by Crabaugh had a 21 to 12 gap when the first stanza ended. The Marshfield guard put in six tries through this stage.

At the halfway stop Marshfield headed 30 to 22 and after three cantos it was 46 to 34. Crater applied a pressing game to close the difference in the final quarter. Over the last of the third and opening of the fourth quarter Smith got five field goals and two free heaves.

Higinbotham Has 29
Loyal Higinbotham, of Crater, with nine field goals on 15 attempts and 11 free heaves on 14 shots, was the games top point man with bulging 29. Crabaugh had 18 and Smith 17 for the home aggregation.

Traxler had 17 rebounds for the Pirates. Tom White was the workhorse and scrapper for the Comets. He collected 11 rebounds. Dennis Edwards pulled down 13, getting a good share of them in the later stages of the ruckus. Higinbotham combined some good floor play with his high scoring.

Crater put in only one field goal in the second quarter, when the Comets "just missed" in their efforts to tally. That the Central Point club tried only nine shots in the third session was attributed to good Buccaneer defense. The Comets made 10 points in the second stanza to Marshfield's nine despite the field drought. Higinbotham tossed in seven charity points. Crater had 19 points and the Pirates 13 in the last quarter.

Crater had better full game shooting average than the Coos Bay club .378 to .375 but did fire as often.

Traxler put in all eight of his gift heaves.

The host Pilots rolled up their fifth win of the season in six starts by squeaking past Santa Clara, 43-41, and the unbeaten Bulldogs got their sixth straight victory by defeating Inona of New York, 73-64.

Portland edged the Broncos after trailing most of the game. Free throws by Bill Garner with 2:08 remaining and Frank Bosone with 46 seconds left provided the winning margin.

Garner paced the Pilots with 14 points and Art Easterly added 11.

Gophers Are in California

Pasadena, Calif. - UPI - The National champion University of Minnesota football team arrived Saturday for the Rose Bowl encounter with Washington Jan. 2, and Coach Murray Warmath immediately expressed surprise over the Golden Gophers' being six-point favorites.

A crowd of several hundred predominantly Big Ten and Minnesota enthusiasts welcomed the 47-man traveling squad when it landed at Lockheed Air Terminal in Burbank.

Coach Warmath was the first off the charter plane and accepted the welcome of Tournament of Roses President Arthur W. Altshouse and Tournament Queen Carole Washburn.

Two famed Minnesota figures, former Athletic Director Frank McCormick and Track Coach Jim Kelly, also were in the greeting group.

The players wearing dark blue blazers with a Minnesota emblem on the pocket were cheered as they stepped off the plane with the biggest cheer being accorded all-

America guard Tom Brown. They stepped into a 70-degree weather after having left Minneapolis this morning with the thermometer reading 7 above zero.

Coach Warmath said the team and squad had a perfect and enjoyable trip. He said the pilot circled over the Rose Bowl so the players could get a first look at the stadium.

"I saw Washington play last year, and I know Coach Jim Owens has tremendous squad," Warmath said. "They are not as large as we are in the backfield, but they are about the same size in the line of best."

"Personally I feel Washington is one of the best teams to represent the West since the start of the Rose Bowl pact with the Big Ten."

"The Huskies should be even better than last year and you know what they did to Wisconsin then."

Warmath attributed the Golden Gophers' success this year to a lack of injuries and far more depth than last year when Minnesota brought up the rear in the Big Ten.

Asked about Tom Brown, Warmath said, "He is a tremendous football player - one of the really fine linemen in the game and one of the best I have seen or coached in 25 years."
